Lent Series

We had planned to do a Lent series this year, and follow it with a course on Christian basics after Easter. When Jean and I put our heads together we thought that this was a bit complicated. The result was we stuck the two together. Not only that, but Jean agreed to lead it, which will be good for us all.

The whole thing is called basix - not my idea - and there are two complementary parts to it. The first is a Lent series about what Christians believe: what is in the Bible, what we have inherited, and how we set about our faith. There are five sessions, and they will be held in

St Mary's, Burton Bradstock on Wednesday evenings in Lent, starting at 7.30 p.m. Each session will end with a simple, said Compline.

The description below is meant to be more of a guidance than a set curriculum.

28 th Feb	God the Father	Creation / Law / Choosing
7 th March	God the Spirit	Prophecy / Guidance
14 th March	God the Son	Jesus' birth to baptism
21 st March		Jesus' life and ministry
28 th March		Jesus' death and resurrection

We then have a pause for Holy week and Easter, and a couple of weeks to get most of the Church AGMs out of the diary. Then we have another part of our basic understanding of our faith; namely, what we do with it. This will be a four session series, leading up to Pentecost.

These sessions will be held at the Rectory, Burton Bradstock, again on Wednesdays at 7.30 p.m.

23rd May Hospitality / in the form of a party.

One of the features of these two lumps of basix is that they do stand alone. Ideally all of them together should give a pretty good understanding of our life of faith, but what I am trying to say is that you should not feel concerned that in going to the Lent course you are somehow committing yourself up to Easter when you do not want to do that. In the same way, if you are not around in Lent, the course up to Pentecost will make sense on its own, and there will be good value in dropping in half way through as it were.

I do hope that you will be able to join us.

Bride Valley News - Its finance explained

I have been given to understand that many people in the valley are unaware or unsure how the magazine is financed and how any profits made are used. I hope that this short article will help to clarify things but I am always willing to answer questions from anyone wishing to have more information about the "News" as well as the Bride Valley Team Council's finances.

The records I have show that the News as the Bride Valley Parish magazine started in 1979 and for the first 11 years ran at a loss subsidised by the local Churches. Since then, apart from 2 years, profits have been made, but not large until recently. Last year 2006 was our best year ever. The income comes entirely from advertising revenue thanks to the sterling efforts of the advertising managers. The costs are small amounts of expenses paid to the volunteers who help to produce the magazine and the printing costs this being the major cost. I will arrange to publish figures for 2006 once accounts are audited and approved by the Bride Valley Team Council (BVTC).

The profits each year make up a large part of the funding of the BVTC. The rest of the BVTC finances come from individual Churches in the valley. The costs are the expenses of the clergy team and some miscellaneous costs benefiting all churches. The Council includes members from each of the Bride Valley Churches and the clergy, who meet together to discuss parish issues and policy. Perhaps a future article explaining this in more detail can be arranged.

It is essential that the BVN continue, not only for the valuable financial contribution it makes to the BVTC, but for the large number of interesting and informative articles. It is also a valuable source of information to all residents and visitors as to what is going on in our wonderful locality. I give my personal thanks to all who have worked so hard in its production over so many years.

owl or a dead frog with guts hanging out, which was the most recent pleasure!


