LETTER FROM BOB

The 17th of May is the Ascension, one of the feasts of the Church that seems most odd to a world that likes to weigh and measure things, and calculate with numbers. And to Christians too, living in the same world, who have been taught from an early age that thought and analysis is the one means of learning.

The understanding of the mechanical mind does not cope well with Jesus ascending to heaven on a cloud. There are too many questions about gravity, cloud density and what after all is "up" in terms of a spherical planet.

One of the services we will hold on Ascension starts at St Mary's Church, Puncknowle. From there we climb up onto the Knoll where we will celebrate Holy Communion. Then we will come down again.

Going up a hill is hard work, and there is a purpose to it – to get to the top. Sitting on a hill is contemplative: looking at the view and letting the imagination soar and fly. Going down the hill again begins to make sense of going up in the first place. If we are effected by what we have seen and felt, we are obliged, as changed people, to live differently, and to do different things in a new way.

The disciples went up the hill. What they experienced at the top changed them. What they did when they got back down again was live the change, and they were given the power of the Holy Spirit for the purpose.

There is no empirical demonstration of the effect of walking up hills – no change of colour in a test tube, and no difference in the totals of columns of figures. The closest a mountaineer gets to describing the point of climbing a mountain is to claim that he or she does it because it is there, which, as a bit of reasoned philosophy, hardly hangs together.

All the same, if you would rather not imagine, and are suspicious of dreams, it is probably best to stick to the lowlands. Avoid slopes. Eschew hilltops. Steer around the contours, and especially on Ascension day.

FUNERALS

A service of thanksgiving for the life of Freda Mary Bonner was held on the 21st March at St Mary's Church, Puncknowle. A Cremation had taken place on Monday the 12th, and the service at St Mary's was held so as to allow time for Freda and Max's daughter, Anne, to arrive from Madagascar to share in the arrangements. Mrs Pam Coventry spoke movingly at the service about Freda, and the firm and lifelong friendships she had made with so many people in all parts of the world. Max will shortly be returning to his native Australia, where Freda's ashes will be interred. Many family and friends of the Late Mildred Trenchard attended her funeral, held at St Mary's Church, Litton Cheney on 15th March. Mildred had lived in the village until moving, six years ago, to Portesham. It was the Vicar of Portesham, the Revd Pam Thomas, who gave the address at the funeral, speaking of Mildred's life of faith, her humour, her abiding sense of right and wrong and her determination in life. Mildred was buried in the Churchyard near her beloved sister who died many years ago.

Kathleen (Kaye) Bugler died on the 4th March, and her funeral service was held at Weymouth Crematorium on Monday the 19th.

Her early life was remembered, including her love of sports, and her business life. It was recalled how in her younger days, working as a telephonist in Churchill's office she put through the call that launched the D day bombardment. Her life in Burton Bradstock, and her involvement with many societies and organisations in the village was recalled, before the quieter years of age and increasing infirmity. She is remembered fondly by family and friends alike.

BURTON BRADSTOCK VILLAGE SOCIETY

Roman Dorchester

Bill Putnam made a welcome return visit to us on 9th March when he gave us a second talk on Roman Dorchester, this time describing the Roman Baths and evidence of a Roman Fort in the town. The Baths were excavated in 1977 but are now buried under the Waitrose car park! In Roman times they were more like a leisure centre with all sorts of services on offer and large amounts of staff to administer them. There was an entrance fee but thousands of people used them. The Dorchester Baths were on a smaller scale with a sauna, cold plunge pool and several heated rooms. It was fed by an aqueduct bringing water from Frampton.

We do not know for sure, where the fort was in Dorchester. There has been little evidence found at Maiden Castle to suggest this as the site. The most significant evidence lies in the Maumbury Rings built in 50 AD by the Roman army as a military amphitheatre and capable of seating 5000 souls. It may be that the original site lies somewhere under Victoria Park estate area but this will never be excavated.

At the meeting of Shipton Gorge Ltd., held on Friday 6th April it was agreed that the acre of land between Brook Street and St. Martin's Church would be restored to an orchard, as the records show that it was for at least 100 years up to the 1940's. It will be known simply as "The Orchard, Brook Street". A committee was set up to research the type, size and number of apple trees required, with a view to planting during the autumn/winter. The meeting heard that a grant of £1,820 had been awarded from the Community Action Fund for Dorset and that this would be used to clear the land, erect a fence on the western boundary and a gate at the bottom of the footpath into Brook Street. Just over £2,000 had been received in donations since the meeting in February and this had enabled repayment of the loans to begin.
