

How blessed we are to have such a great team who enhance and lead us in our Christian journey; how good it is to share with people across the valley; and all this in the most beautiful countryside.





#### FRIENDS OF BURTON BRADSTOCK LIBRARY

The Burton Bradstock Library Working Group would like to thank everyone who returned a questionnaire about possible support for a Friends of Burton Bradstock Library Association. We received almost a hundred replies indicating enough support in all the categories to enable us to continue our planning to keep the Burton Bradstock library open. We now have more information as to how Dorset County Council will proceed. The meetings between the 13 threatened libraries and the County Council team were completed by the middle of May, and the team are writing a report for the County Council describing the meetings and making

recommendations as to how the situation can be developed. This report will be finished in June, and will be considered by the Council Cabinet on July 11<sup>th</sup>. Depending on what the Cabinet decide it may go to a full meeting of the County Council later in the month. Whatever happens we shall know where we stand by the end of July.

Assuming that the outcome is positive the Working Group should be able to call a village meeting in September to spell out our proposals (and their implications) for keeping the library open. It will then be up to village members to decide if the proposals are realistic and whether to support them.






