And a note from the Revd Jean Thorn. BASIX.

Basix has been running for two weeks now. We have looked at God the first Person of the Trinity, and although we tend to call him "Father" we have seen a multitude of his other roles through various Bible texts. We then moved on to the Holy Spirit and looked at her (I always call her "her" but you do not have to!) through the medium of worship, in this case hymnody. In both sessions there was lively discussion and, because lots of people came, we split into groups. Next we focus on the second Person of the Trinity, Jesus. We have done it this way round so as to be looking at his death and resurrection at Passiontide. I always try to use approaches that are straightforward but a bit different from what you might imagine.

After Easter there will be a break and then Basix will continue

for all those who wish to come along. We are refreshing our memory and filling in the gaps about the Holy Spirit. You do not have to come to all the sessions and, if you did not make it to the Lent course, you can still come to the après-Lent bit. If it seems popular, I hope to be running other teaching programmes in the future.

FUNERALS

On Wednesday 14th February a thanksgiving service was held in memory of Ted Forsey, who until recently had been a resident of Burton Bradstock. His last months were spent near his family on the Channel Island of Jersey. Friends and family gathered at St Mary's Church to pay their respects, and following the service Ted's ashes, with those of his late wife Annie who died some years ago, were laid to rest in the churchyard.

On Friday, 23rd of February the funeral of the late Derek Spinney was held in St Mary's Church, Burton Bradsock. A cremation service at Weymouth crematorium was attended by members of the family in the morning. In the early afternoon a thanksgiving service saw the Church filled with friends who came to remember Derek and support Jill and the family. Derek's ashes were interred in the Churchyard the following day.

Doris Richards, at one time a resident of Litton Cheney, died at Castle View nursing home on 14th of February at a great age. Her funeral took place at Weymouth crematorium, and on Monday, the 26th of February her ashes were laid to rest with those of her late husband in the churchyard of St Mary's Church, Litton Cheney.

The funeral of Beee Epplestone, late wife of Lt Col John Epplestone of Shipton Gorge, was held at St Martin's Church, Shipton Gorge on Friday 2nd of March. Members of the family gave readings, and Mrs Brierley, an old friend gave a full and heartfelt tribute, telling of Beee's life; her love of her family, her talents and accomplishments, and her irrepressible sense of humour. Following the service Beee's mortal remains were laid to rest in the Churchyard.

Diana Dawson, who lived for many years with her husband, Charles, in the

Parsonage House at Littlebredy, had moved away to be with her family following Charles' death. Diana, loved and respected by all, died at a great age, and her funeral was held at St Michael and All Angels on Friday 2nd of March. Members of the family spoke movingly of all that she had meant to them, and a tribute was given. She was buried beside her husband in the churchyard.

On Friday 9th of March, the funeral service of Tony Phipps was held in St Mary's Church, Puncknowle, following a cremation service at Weymouth in the morning. His nephew, Robert read a lesson, and the tribute was given by Richard Curtis, a lifelong friend. Tony had been a resident of Burton Bradstock for some years, having moved down from London. Many stories were told of his great zest for life, which ended all too soon at the age of 55. He is mourned by many,

including his brother Jon and his family.

They will then visit the Churches and walk the paths of the Valley, blessing the fields and the farms of the Valley. We meet at Long Bredy Village Hall every Wednesday in term time, from 10am until 12noon.


For babies and children from birth up until starting school. "Essential play and socialisation for your little ones"

THORNER'S CE VA PRIMARY SCHOOL

Another month passes and the signs of Spring are all around us – the bulbs in our flower beds and pots are bursting into life and the fields beyond our grounds are beginning to look green again. Well, that's today! Perhaps the weather will improve soon – ever the optimist!

With all the publicity in the press about obesity in young people, we are proud of the range of opportunities for physical education and outdoor activity that we offer here at Thorner's. We end our assemblies with daily exercise to music, which helps all the children to 'get moving' - lively bodies mean lively minds! Staff are also encouraged to join in, although the Scottish dancing routine defeats some of us!

In addition to the regular curriculum P.E. and Games, we offer a netball club and this half term, all the children are getting weekly football skills sessions with the Team Theme organisation which has been funded by our School Association. Our membership of the West Dorset School Partnership means that we benefit from training and coaching provided by teachers from Colfox School and last half term all classes had gymnastics sessions. Our Year 3 and 4 pupils are taking part in a Dance Festival with other partnership schools this week.

We use the Outdoor Education Centres in the county, such as Carey, in Wareham Forest, Weymouth Oudoor Education Centre and Leeson House at Langton Matravers, where children can enjoy a variety of physical challenges. We have also recently developed links with Kingston Maurward College and 2 classes will be visiting there next term.

Although not all sports are competitive, we do take part in football and netball tournaments with other 'cluster' schools and we are delighted when we bring back a trophy! We also enter a team for the Cluster swimming gala during the summer term. Having our own swimming pool means that most of our children can swim, or are at least confident in the water before they leave us.

We hope that the opportunities that we can offer will mean that

our children will respect their bodies as they grow older and continue to keep fit and active.

Oh, and finally, a word about the staff - most of us are taking part in the 'Race For Life' in aid of Cancer Research UK at Kingston Maurward in July. The training schedule begins soon.....!?

JOBS TO DO:

A busy time of year now. Plant all potatoes before the end of the month and start successionally sowing main-crop peas, carrots. Sow hardy annuals. Seedlings and young plug plants need to be potted on when large enough. Make sure these are well watered, but not drowned, and apply well balanced liquid fertiliser every fortnight or as needed. Alternatively place pellets of controlled release fertiliser in the bottom of trays or pots to help avoid plants running

out of nutrients. Prune early flowering shrubs such as forsythia and lonicera and trim winter flowering heathers.

BRIDPORT OPERATIC WORKSHOP

When Rex Trevett retired after a legendary career as Head of Music at Colfox School, he decided to form a Youth Music Theatre Group - Bridport Operatic Workshop.

With help from his wife Margaret and support from his daughter Julie, Head of Music at Weymouth College, he embarked on the challenging vision of giving young people from the Age of 11 the chance to learn theatre, music and performance skills. With productions such as 'Dracula Spectular', 'The Secret Diary of Adrian Mole' and specially written pieces 'Angels' and 'Feet', the group flourished.

Rex's life was tragically cut short, and when it was clear that he was too ill to carry on, he asked Miles Bell and Viv Ironside to take over, with support from the Bridport Arts Centre. The new team decided to carry on as before, but with the addition of a series of Workshops in Music, Vocal and Drama Skills, leading into a Major production each year. Their first production, 'The Demon Headmaster' was a great success, and was followed in 2006 by 'Little Shop of Horrors'.

It is always difficult to find suitable material for this kind of group, and Miles wanted to present a piece that would be specially tailored to suit the group. He was delighted when Herbie Treehead, locally based professional theatre/circus/comic performer offered to create an entirely new piece.

Through last Autumn, Herbie and local pianist/composer Rob Lee worked with the young people developing confidence and skills, while starting to devise and improvise storylines for this year's production. Rehearsals are well under way, and the 'World Premier of WOB!!!!' - a fantastical musical adventure - will be presented at Bridport Arts Centre on April 11th, 12th and 13th.

BURTON BRADSTOCK VILLAGE SOCIETY

Reading the "Bridport News" in future will not be quite the same for members of the society who were at the village hall on 9th February to hear the ex editor of the paper, Marjery Hookings give a talk entitled "Bridport: My Kind of Town"

The News was started in 1855 by William Charles Frost – same family as the newsagents in West Street. It was printed in Bridport and cost one penny. The circulation in those days was about 750 copies – today it is more like 11,500 copies.

We were shown examples of early news items such as the opening of a railway link to Maiden Newton, a cottage available for rent of £6 per week, and complaints about the state of the pavements! The origin of the nickname "Wip Wop" is not clear, but it maybe associated with the sound of the printing press behind Frost's shop!

The print works closed in 1962 and the paper is now printed in Weymouth and is owned by a company called Newsquest.

Marjery joined the News in 1982 and became Editor in 1999. She now works for Dorset Farm Radio and in public relations – but we were left in no doubt that her heart still lies in the Wip Wop!

We are very pleased to welcome – as our final speaker this season, Minette Walters on "Crime Writing and Crime" at 7.30pm on Friday 20^{th} April.

SUGGESTION:

display your DCC 'WE DO NOT BUY FROM DOORSTEP SELLERS' card (more available via 01308-897935);

use your door-chain when opening the door;

if accepting literature do so without any commitment;

if they say they will call back say 'no thank you - if I am interested I will only handle it by post' (and if they say that will not be possible that way, then say you will not be able to do it anyway); always get 3 quotes anyway; never start a discussion that could lead to a sale that day, or you may find it uncomfortable not to invite the representative into your home to sign the papers.

Be firm throughout: they are uninvited visitors to your home after all!




