FROM THE RECTORY

THE REVD. BOB THORN A.K.C THE RECTORY, BURTON BRADSTOCK, DT6 4QS TEL: 01308 898799

Over Autumn a group of people have been meeting at the Rectory in Burton Bradstock to study and to pray about the ministry of healing. This is a very important thing to Christians. Jesus himself is described as one who heals the sick and preaches the good news. For us this is not a matter of doing one or the other (or neither if we are the sort of Christian who finds all this sort of



thing a bit keen). Nor is it a matter of doing both. It is going to be how to know that both healing and preaching are the same thing – which we would know if only we truly found to the root of ourselves who Jesus is.

We began by saying to ourselves that having services for healing at which we would wait to be amazed by the healing power of God were probably not the point. The point is likely to be that we should not be amazed – we should be so caught up on the will of God, and so trusting and expecting of the gifts of providence that nothing should surprise us. In a funny way we should be taking things for granted. Miracles are for disbelievers.

The starting point, then, is not straining to believe or working for wonders. It is getting into the place where God is, within us and among us and over us. The route is by saying prayers and being prayed for. To this end we are going to be starting by setting up chains of people praying for one another. Quite how this works may well be for different Parishes to decide. Each Parish has its own character and way of doing things – even when we do them together. But in essence it is very simple in that each person is given two people to pray for regularly; as if a number of people were sitting at random in a big circle and were asked to pray for the person either side of them. The voice of prayer is never silent. When our prayers become the background chatter of the atmosphere of the Christian life we try to live, we will have taken the first step in our ministry of healing. What comes next is not entirely clear, and nor should it be. We will wait upon God for that. But it is clear that without our praying and being prayed for we are like a crowd of people facing the wrong way when the band goes marching by. We are like people in an abandoned railway station waiting for a train. We are likeyou say.

Easter is very early this year. This is not a plea to start weaving bonnets and buying chocolate because there are only so many bunny weeks till egg day. It is really to say that if Easter is early then so is Lent, starting 40 days beforewards.

Ash Wednesday is on 6th February, and the Lent series this year will follow our pattern of Wednesday evening meetings at 7.30pm in St Mary's church, Burton Bradstock. They will begin on Wednesday, 13th February and go through until Wednesday 12th March. This year we are going to be looking at the 12 minor prophets, as they are called. The ones that bring up the end of the books of the Old Testament. Some are familiar stories, like Jonah and the whale, while others, like Habbakuk lurk as the names of oddities, seen once in the index just before the onset of an overwhelming lack of curiosity.

So we are going delving. We will look at the life and times of these people to see how they lived and believed - why they spoke and wrote as they did. That is the discovery trail that leads us way away

into some quite strange places of the imagination. The homeward journey is that which returns to our own times with the treasures of our wanderings, to use them for our own life and witness. These are the gifts of how to look at the world through the eyes of God, so that we can find his will for us and know his love for his creation.

No small ambition here. A major task for a minor prophet.



FROM THE REGISTERS

On Monday, 12th November the funeral of Jean Mary Langdon was held at St Mary's Church, Burton Bradstock. Her brother, David and his wife Joep, led the mourners, including Jean's five nieces. Fleur gave an account of her life, and Lucy read a passage in her memory. Jean was a frequent visitor to her parent's house in Shipton Lane, before she herself retired into the village in 1996.

The funeral of Derrick Geoffrey Shepherd, known locally as Geoff, was held at St Martin's



Church, Shipton Gorge on Wednesday 14th November. Geoff and his wife Betty moved into Shipton Gorge in 1988, and from the first were involved in the life of the village. Geoff bought with him organising skills from business, and also from having helped arrange archery competitions in the Munich and Montreal Olympics. Geoff's brother, Bill, overwhelmed by the affection in which Geoff was held in the village, and by the tributes made in his memory, asked me very particularly to thank those many who came to fill the Church at his funeral.

Ray; Raymond Edgar Lee, died quietly and at peace on 3rd November at home, following a long illness. Ray and his dear wife Betty were long time Puncknowle people, who loved the place, and are loved still. Both were involved in the life of the village from their early days; Ray in particular as a member of the Royal British Legion. He had served during the war, ending up as a guard of Japanese prisoners at the notorious Changi prison in Singapore. His nephew spoke of his life, and we sang the hymns Ray had chosen for the service: "O for a closer walk with God", "Crimond" and "Now the day is over".

On Wednesday, 21st November the ashes of the late Frank Maunder of Shipton Gorge were interred in St Martin's Churchyard. It was a cold clear day for a short but heartfelt service for a good man who loved, and was loved by, his family and a wide circle of friends, and is now laid to rest under the sound of the bells he loved to hear ringing over the valley. The ashes of Betsy Freda Mary Connor were placed in the Churchyard of St Peter's Long Bredy on Friday 23rd November. According to her wish she was laid to rest near the grave of her mother, Mary Shelton. People from the village, and many members of her family old and young, were led in mourning by her two sons, Tim and Bob. The sun shone on the lovely setting of the Church among the surrounding hills, and the birds circled high above in a clear sky.

On Monday, 26th December, at Weymouth crematorium, the funeral was held of Frances Elizabeth Willis, lately of Burton Bradstock, but more recently living in Axminster. Her daughter, Andrea and her husband, Chris live in Middle St in the village. Chris read the beatitudes, and Andrea, with great courage, gave a tribute to her Mother. They were a great sporting family, and were actually at the 1966 world cup final. The hymn, "Abide with me" was played for its footballing connections and for happy memories. We sang "Crimond" and "Praise my soul the king of heaven", and bid Frances be at peace and in glory.

John Alexander Christopher Tennant of Burton Bradstock was buried in the cemetery in the village on Wednesday 28th November. It was a quiet, graveside service, attended by a few friends and neighbours. John, formerly a mariner, was a reclusive man who seems to have kept up no family connections. The words of the sailor's hymn, "For those in peril on the sea", were read over him, and the words of the service commended his soul to God and committed his mortal remains to the earth. It was a cold day with a keen wind, threatening rain. John is buried just in sight of the sea.

The funeral of Edgar Howard Seadon, of Burton Bradstock, was held on Monday 3rd December. A quiet ceremony was held at Weymouth crematorium at which a tribute was read from his daughter-in-law, who, living in Australia, was unable to attend.

On Monday, 3rd December Harold Douglas Percy was laid to rest in the cemetery at Burton Bradstock, following a funeral service at St Mary's Church. Many people of the village joined the family in remembering him and giving thanks for his long life and the gift of his many blessings. His three sons gave tribute; Douglas in a remembrance of his life, David in a poem by Hillaire Belloc of a boy that sang on Duncton Hill, recalling Harold's youth in rural Sussex, and Richard a poem "Just another merchant sailor man" in memory of his service as a radio operator in the Merchant Navy and R.N. The prayers also remembered and gave thanks for the life of Dorothy, his beloved wife, who survived him by only a few days. They are at rest and forever re-united.

FROM THE PARISH COUNCILS

ATM - BEWARE

Latest advice for when the ATM apparently swallows your card is to seek help immediately from the *owner* of the machine, i.e. the bank or other business where the machine is installed. **DO NOT** accept any assistance from a casual passer by! He or she may not be as casual as it may seem.

The scam is that the "passer by" helps you only in order to learn your PIN. When your back is turned he/she returns to the ATM and retrieves the card (which has not been swallowed, but has been trapped in by a simple strip of thin plastic that can be withdrawn by the "crook"). Shortly after, your account will be somewhat lighter!

And whilst we are on the subject, beware of the telephone call that purports to come from your credit/debit card issuer. The caller will refer to a suspected fraudulent use of your card. It will be very polite and will give an impression of businesslike efficiency.

However, at some point the caller will ask for the security number or issue number of your card "just to be sure that you are still in possession of the card.

DO NOT TELL HIM/HER your number(s), and report the call to your card issuer as soon as you can.

BURTON BRADSTOCK PARISH COUNCIL FUTURE OF THE HIVE

At the Community Consultation over the weekend of $13^{th}/14^{th}$ October, the National Trust presented three options for the future arrangements for the car park and café facilities at the Hive Beach.

The Parish Council displayed information on what had been involved in the management of the facilities in recent years. Everyone attending was invited to comment and indicate their preferred option and were also asked to suggest alternative options and ways in which the Trust could work with the community should funding become available. At the same time, leaflets outlining the background to the review and setting out the options, with the invitation to respond, were distributed around the village.

By 11th November, a total of 209 forms were received and 48 'post-it' notes were completed at the open meetings. These have now been analysed and 192 people have given a clear preferred option.

Their choices were;

Option One : To renew the lease to the

Parish Council with changes to the term Option Two: The National Trust runs 21% (40 people)

2% (4 people)

the whole site. *Option Three:* The National Trust takes over the site and leases the café direct to the current tenant.

77% (148 people)

There was also a significant level of support for the current way in which Steve Attrill and his team run the café, along with the many other wide-ranging comments and suggestions.

Taking into account the preferences expressed as above and on receipt of more detailed information from the Trust, the Parish Council will decide how it wishes to proceed and then have further discussions with the Trust.



BURTON BRADSTOCK HIVE BEACH CAR PARK CONSULTATION

The people of Burton Bradstock have had their say about the Hive Beach car park and café and now the National Trust, which owns the site, is using those views to take forward plans for this popular spot.



The local community gave their comments as part of a review into the leasing arrangements of the Hive. The review set out options for the future of the Hive and, of those people who expressed a clear option choice, 77% wanted the National Trust to take over the car park with the current tenant continuing to run the café.

The Trust's West Dorset property manager Helen Mann said: "The message from the majority of the local community was very clear. We have also analysed all the comments made and there was strong support for the café tenant which we endorse. Many people felt that a Hive user group should be set up to work with the Trust and we will certainly be looking into this."

The Hive is currently leased to Burton Bradstock Parish Council, which sub-lets the café, and the review was prompted by the impending expiry of the lease in 2009 and the need to improve the condition of the car park. The National Trust will be negotiating

arrangements with the parish council over the next few months.

HOME WATCH - COLD CALLING CONTROL ZONE Burton Bradstock has been nominated by Dorset County Council's Trading Standards Service in partnership with Dorset Police to become a Cold

Calling Control Zone.

Doorstep crime incidents are on the increase all over the Country from rogue trading right up to distraction burglaries. Anyone can be duped and this initiative has proved to be a useful way of deterring the uninvited.

At the Parish Council meeting on Wednesday 9th January a Trading Standards Officer will give a short presentation covering such subjects as giving local residents the confidence to say "No" and also encouraging people to request ID from cold callers and take the time to check them. Villagers will be invited to report these traders to Trading Standards or the Police who will try to respond immediately.

Many households are already displaying the "No Doorstep Traders" signs and whilst a budget has been set aside to cover this operation for the benefit of Burton Bradstock, British Telecom has donated money for signs to be put at all main entrances to the village stating that cold callers are not welcome here (probably within the same sign as the Home Watch area).

At the end of January a short questionnaire will be sent to all households giving a little more detail on what the zone hopes to achieve, find out whether local residents would support the scheme and what the current levels of doorstep trading are.

BURTON BRADSTOCK VILLAGE SOCIETY

We were all taken on a whirlwind history lesson on 16th November when Bob Ayers gave us a talk entitled "1000Years History of London Hospitals in One Hour".

Many hospitals in London are named after saints. They were really started around 1000AD by the Knights Hospitallers and their eight pointed cross still forms the basis of the emblem today. The first hospital to be built in London was at Smoothfield (Spitfields) in 1123 where pilgrims could find hospitality for the night and

"miracles" could be worked there. This was called St Bartholomew's. Then St Thomas's was founded as a religious house followed by Guy's, established by a wealthy merchant called Thomas Guy.



The first surgeons were the barbers. Hospital surgeons were not allowed to let blood so this job fell

to the barbers who would hang their bloody bandages on white poles outside their shops to dry. When the wind blew they got wrapped around the pole – hence the present red and white barber's pole.

During the London plague of 1665, the apothecaries wore protective leather overcoats and "beaks" stuffed with straw and herbs to filter out air borne infections. They looked like ducks and hence the nickname "quacks" for doctors.

The best and most successful hospitals were built within the city walls for the well off whilst the hoi polloi were consigned to the outside establishments of ten to die. Just as well times have changed more than a little.

2008 gets off to a good start with two Village Society talks. On Friday 11th January, David Barnikel, who gave a much appreciated illustrated talk in 2006, returns with more visual delights under the title of "Images of China today". On the 4th of February, Paul Attenbury, well-known to regular TV viewers, will present "Behind the

scenes at the Antique Road Show". Paul, who lives locally, is a leading expert of 19th and 20th century art and architecture,. Please do not, however, bring things for him to look at on this occasion.

Since then, the garden has been transformed by their enormous commitment, energy and skill, as many visitors under the





DorBAG is already asking Town, Borough and Parish Councils to help support this petition, and has provided not only an online petition on the web site, but printable & downloadable petition forms, plus promotional posters (A4 and A5) too! The campaign to achieve local coverage of Dorset news & events on Radio & especially TV is well under way. (We think most people are more concerned about news on TV. Nevertheless, if we do not fight for, and win, the case for BBC Radio Dorset, we fear that the BBC will not take much notice of us fighting for news and events coverage on Television! THE DORSET REGIMENT GREAT WAR MEMORIAL PROJECT

The aim of this project is to provide a lasting memorial to the officers and men of the Dorset Regiment who died in the Great War. 27000 officers and men served in the Dorset Regiment, of whom 3,929 died on active service, some 15%. It is proposed to place the

memorial on the Somme battlefield where many of the regiment made the supreme sacrifice.

The target is to raise $\pounds 25,000$ to cover the expense of production, erection, the cost of negotiations with the French and the formation of a fund for long-term maintenance. It is intended that the memorial shall be of classic design but the actual complexity and size will be determined by the amount of money raised.

St WULFSTAN 19th January

St Wulfstan was Bishop of Worcester from 1062-95. He lived during the Norman Conquest of England and was the only Saxon bishop to remain under William the Conqueror.

Wulfstan was a caring and hardworking monk. He rebuilt the cathedral at Worcester, cared for the poor, and struggled to ease the harsh conditions imposed by the Normans on the Saxons. Unlike some priests, he baptised children of the poor without charge. It is said that he never turned away people asking for help.

Wulfstan fought the slave trade in Bristol (slave trading didn't just start with slaves from Africa but had been going on for centuries with slaves from England being sold to Ireland and North Africa).

Wulfstan died whilst washing the feet of 12 poor men during a service in the cathedral. He died as he had lived, serving God and caring for others.




