Assistants do what they are. They assist the Pastoral work of the Church, at which Assistants do what they are. They assist in

point it may be as well to say that the Pastoral work of the Church is the practical care and help with which people are looked after in the community in the name of Christ. At which point it may be as well to say that Pastoral Assistants do not choose or discriminate in their work between those who are "Church" and those who are not – any more than Jesus did. They happen to believe that saying prayers for people does help, and so will be inclined to pray for people as part of their work of service, but they do not do their work with a hidden agenda. The need calls out the help.

At this point, it may be as well to point out that the 'people' concerned may be anyone. It is not necessarily those who are ill, or housebound, or elderly or in any other kind of category. Pastoral Assistants can concentrate on work with young people if that is their particular gift. They can work with the homeless as much as with the housebound, and the fit and well just as much as with those who are a bit off their feed. A lot of what they do depends upon the call of those in need.

But there is another part which is the Assistant's own particular and personal calling. This too determines what they will look to find, and so what they will be given by their calling to do. In many ways Pastoral Assistants are doing what Christian folk have always done in the name of Christ - the work of charity and care. Pastoral Assistants have the confidence that is given as a result of their training and commissioning by the Diocese, and the Parishes can begin to see work that is local and organised. There are now over 1000 Pastoral Assistants in the Diocese of Salisbury.

All of which is a very long unravelling of what is a very simple idea - that Pastoral Assistants do what they are. Underneath this headline there is of course the small print, only I have just written out the unreadable bits in larger letters because questions about who Pastoral Assistant are and what they do still come up, and I hope will continue to.

Some time ago now I put out a call to people who might wish to become Pastoral Assistants. At the time there was none active in the Bride Valley. We now have five people who do this work.



They do not all do exactly the same thing, but they are all involved in bringing the prayers of the Church to the people of the Parishes in practical ways, and the needs of the Parishes to the Church for prayer.

And now is the time to put out a call for more such helpers. There are one or two who have already expressed an interest. Our Parishes still need more of such help so that we can bring the ministry of the Church to those who need it. If you are minded to offer, or if you would like to enquire about such work, do please get in touch with me. On the other hand, if you know of people in need of someone to call and visit, do please get in touch with Mrs Ann Read, on 897445.





Is your new 'No Uninvited Doorstep Traders' card up on your door/front window? If so, thank you. If not, and you'd like a spare/replacement, please phone me on 01308-897935 now. (It should replace the old red 'sticker').

As one of Dorset's two first 'Cold Calling Control Zones' – we are being used as a test in the next 6 months - we must be firm with uninvited Doorstep Traders. If they continue to call and will not go away despite your request for them to do so, call 999 as it is a legal offence.

If they indicate they *will* go away please nevertheless report their organization's name, and what happened, to Dorset Trading Standards (if it is during working hours) on 01305-224012 and TSO will write to that organization telling them never to cold call again. (If it is not during working hours please instead phone the Police on 01305-22 22 22 and phone TSO also when they are open.)

Thank you to those who reported to me that Anglian Home Improvements had continued to go round calling despite the presence of the new 'No Uninvited Doorstep Sellers' cards. I reported them to Trading Standards and TSO have written to the company and requested, and got, an assurance that Anglian Home Improvements will never cold call in Burton Bradstock again.

Please keep the reporting back to TSO going on other organizations, and we'll achieve a quieter, safer-feeling and safer Burton Bradstock.





The estimate for re-hanging the bells in our church tower came as something of a shock. The church council discussed fund-raising at length. Someone suggested selling part of the Rectory garden for building, another for getting 200 parishioners to loan £1,000 each, interest-free. Mrs Ffrench suggested holding a jumble sale. The jumble sale won - mainly because it gives everyone an opportunity to see what their neighbours think of as junk.





A RULE FOR LIFE St. Benedict - 11th July

From the earliest Christian times there have always been those who felt a special call to give their whole lives to God. Gradually these people came together with others who wanted to live in the same way. 500 years after Christ died, St Benedict set down a series of rules for these communities of monks and nuns.

St Benedict called his Rule one for beginners, a 'school of the Lord's service' where the student is 'to set nothing before the love of Christ'. The Rule sets out a life of prayer, study and work, living together as a community.

Many still live by the Rule of St Benedict today - in the Church of England and in the Roman Catholic Church. They keep the same Rule and Office (seven times for prayer each day) that St Benedict set down some 15 centuries ago.




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

BENEDICT (C.480 - C.550) AUTHOR OF FAMOUS RULE

Benedict was an abbot and author of the famous Rule that bears his name. Because of his Rule, Benedict is also the Patriarch of Western Monasticism, and Patron Saint of Europe.

Surprisingly little is known about his life: born at Nursia, Benedict studied at Rome, which he then left before completing his studies to become a hermit at Subiaco. After a time disciples joined him, whom he organised into twelve deaneries of ten. After an attempt on his life, Benedict moved on to Monte Cassino, near Naples, where he wrote the final version of his Rule.

Benedict's Rule is justly famous and respected: not only did it incorporate much traditional monastic teaching from revered monks like Basil, but Benedict went on to modify this in a way characterised by prudence and moderation within a framework of authority, obedience, stability and community life.

Benedict's great achievement was to produce a monastic way of life which was

complete, orderly, and *workable*. The monks' primary occupation was liturgical prayer, which was complemented by sacred reading and manual work of various kinds.

Bendict's own personality shines through this Rule: wise, discreet, flexible, learned in the law of God, but also a spiritual father to his community. Benedict's Rule came to be recognised as the fundamental monastic code of western Europe in the early Middle Ages. Because of his Rule, monasteries became centres of learning, agriculture, hospitality, and medicine. Thus Benedict came to influence the lives of millions of people.
