A WEATHER REVIEW, OR, A TREATISE ON SUPERSTITION.

As I write I am looking forward to going off on a boat on Tuesday. The Diocese have decided it would do a handful of the Clergy good if they could get away together and do something other than worry for a bit. They could not send us off paintballing for all sorts of reasons. It might look bad, clergy pretending to shoot one another, and what if they all ganged up on the Archdeacon? But then they all might be struck by a wave of Christian self-consciousness and either refuse to shoot at all, or try to lose as hard as they could.

“No, my dear chap. After you.”

“Nonsense. I deserve to be shot much more than you do.”

Even worse, the devil of temptation to seek preferment could enter into the garden of violence, and they might all start competing to let the Bishop win.

They decided on sailing, and being about boats I shoved my name down on the list sooner than all the others who didn't do their Emails that day – there is a lesson in this, but not a very good one.

And so I pass on to the jollity of Thursday when I have been very kindly invited to watch the opening day of England and South Africa. What a rare and wonderful treat!

I should have known that trying to do two things in one week that depend upon the weather was asking for trouble, but the blasts and torrents of the weekend, and the waves of gales tumbling across the Atlantic over the coming days must be a bit exceptional. I should have known that the end of Wimbledon and the start of a Test match carries the promise of unsettled weather. I should have known that my driving the motorbike all the way to London was going to be the last straw that set off the terminal phase of global warming.

The trouble with superstition is that it inclines to the sort of behaviour little children have when they know themselves to be the centre of the universe. When we grow up we have a better sense of proportion. We make proper relationships with ourselves, with other people and with God. It is at odd times, when stressed or sad, that we link up with the little infantile voice in us that says



if something is wrong we are to blame, and if only we could find the right thing to do everything would be mended.

I should stop blaming myself for the weather, and for lots of other things. I should do, but probably will not. Most likely, if I recognise my behaviour for what it is, or more likely if I find that wearing my socks inside out has not and was never really likely to have worked, I will simply transfer my attention to another illusion. I will begin to remind myself to be nicer to the Bishop in future. And if that does not work, the Archdeacon had better watch out.



FUNERALS




A funeral service was held at Yeovil crematorium for the late Derek Sidney Gilbert on June 27th. He and his wife, Shirley had lived in Burton Bradstock for many years. Their working life was spent in building houses, living in them for a bit and then moving on, until at last they settled in the village. He was a man with a great capacity for happiness; whether on the golf course, in his beloved garden or helping neighbours with the skills he had developed in his lifetime.

Shirley was supported at the service by their two sons, Clive, and Simon who spoke of his Father. The funeral at Yeovil being more of a family occasion, a service of thanksgiving and remembrance for friends and neighbours was held on Friday 11th July at Burton Bradstock.

The funeral of John Read was held on 9th July at St Mary's, Burton Bradstock. John was born in Oxfordshire, and trained as a carpenter and wheelwright before the war called him to serve in the 7th Armoured Brigade. He was a great sportsman, and a favourite story was of playing cricket with Len Hutton, and scoring more runs than he did. Thirty years ago he came to Burton Bradstock with his second wife, Jenny, who died just a couple of years ago. John then moved from their home in Donkey Lane to Chesil Court. The "old rugged cross" was sung at his funeral, it having been his wish in remembrance of his Mother. He is mourned by his daughters, Glynis, Jenny and Chris, his stepdaughters, Lesley and Frances, and all their families. After the service family and many friends repaired to the Anchor, a place of fond memory.

A birthday service was held on 1st July for Victoria Mann, whose disappearance last Autumn remains a shock and a sorrow to all who knew her. The service was also an opportunity for family and friends to give thanks for the strength and support they have all been to one another over the past months. 



Setting up of tables etc. starts at 8.30 am on the morning of the Fete. All help for whatever purpose will be enormously appreciated.


The Church will be decorated with flowers for the day of the fete and these can be enjoyed until after the weekend.

BURTON BRADSTOCK VILLAGE SOCIETY FLOWER AND PRODUCE SHOW

Some of the many entrants to the Burton Bradstock Village Flower and Produce Show, held on 5th July, were miffed to read the comments made by judges of their work. On three of the entries in the Jam and Jellies category, the judge had criticized entrants for using the wrong jars! Even prizewinners were warned, “don’t forget to fill your jar almost to the rim”! One contestant commented, “I should have thought this was about the taste and texture of the contents, rather than the sort of jars we used or how full they should be; there was nothing in the rules about jars”.

In another flower category, - the Arrangement in a Shoe - the judge commented incredibly, “The handbag is out of proportion and hence spoils the design”; this, of a carefully-poised miniature 18th century handbag and be-flowered shoe” - the shoe and its bag both in exact proportion to each other. Did the judge have some sort of astigmatism?

That said, the Show was a delight and attracted bumper crowds. Best in Show was a delightful display around a candle by Susan Paul, who also scooped the prize for best photograph. Entries from the children, as always, attracted most interest: splendid driftwood monsters, photographs of themselves in a montage of flower pictures, everything fresh and innocent, without ambition and the better for it!

The entries for raspberries, currants and gooseberries were reminiscent of designs upon the porcelain of the finest houses in the village and the photographs of entrants in the Best Allotment class were exhibits themselves worthy of note.

In an interesting piece of political incorrectness, viewers were intrigued to see the category, “Men’s Iced Carrot Cakes” which, incidentally attracted the most constructive comment from its judge, “well done everyone”.

Such shows, though parodied in Little Britain, are the very essence of Merrie England and the whole afternoon was a roaring success and a tribute to the organizers, rounded-off by the hugely entertaining auction of

produce, where all pretence of gentility went to the wind as buyers bid for cabbages, trifflids, artichokes and beans at a fraction of their street value.




Welcome to Chris and Bev Robbins who have moved into Little Newbold. We hope they will enjoy living in Long Bredy.







STATISTIC OF THE MONTH

During the 1990s, total church income rose on average by 4.6% a year. This is half as much again as the average increase in prices in that period, 3.1%. It is very likely that church income has continued to grow in the same proportion in the 21st century, perhaps averaging 4.2% a year. If so, that would make church income average about £75,000 per church in 2007.

Given there are over 48,000 churches in the UK, this means that a lot of money is received collectively

by the churches - some £3.7 billion last year.

However, this money is not spread evenly across the churches. While half the churches in the UK may have an income of £50,000 or more, half have less, with a tenth receiving less than £10,000 and a further tenth between £10,000 and £20,000.

Nor is it spread evenly across the various denominations. New (or House) Churches and Pentecostal Churches receive most, over £110,000 and over £90,000 each

on average. Both denominations teach and practice tithing among their members, many of whom give more than just 10% of their income.

Anglican churches probably averaged £80,000 in 2007, while

Methodist and United Reformed Churches received least - less than £50,000 each on average, and with a third receiving under £20,000.

WIDER WEDDING WELCOME

Thousands of couples dreaming of a wedding will find more churches to choose from 1st October 2008 - the day when the new Church of England Marriage Measure comes into effect. It means that the Church of England's network of 16,000 churches; ancient or modern, intimate or grand, simple or spectacular, can offer a wider wedding welcome than at any time in the Church's history.

The Marriage Measure, recently completed its parliamentary process, has made it possible for the Bishops to issue the official guidance to clergy on how the new rules will work.

Existing law established a right for a couple to marry in the Church of England in the parish church where one or both of them live, whether they are baptised or not, and whether they are churchgoers are not. To marry in any other parish requires a special licence or six months of regular attendance followed by entry on the local church electoral roll.

But new laws, initiated by the Church of England and now approved by Parliament, will add to this right of residency, making it just as easy for couples to marry in a church where they have a family or other special

connection, even if they don't live there.

The General Synod decided that the existing laws were too restrictive in a mobile society and took the initiative to change them last July. Synod wanted churches all over England to be free to celebrate more weddings and support more marriages.

The changes will mean an engaged couple are welcome to be married in church in a parish if just one of these applies:

- ◆ one of them was baptised or prepared for confirmation in the parish;
- ◆ one of them has ever lived in the parish for six months or more;
