I have now spent some months mending from the stroke I had just before Christmas, and have only recently discovered the intricacies of the operation that was done

to plant me back on my feet again. The surgeon was stitching blood vessels in my brain together while looking down a microscope to do it. The result is not just that I am up and about, but that the weakness that led to the stroke in the first place has gone. I did ask if my life had been shortened by the stroke and the operation, and was told it had not - I shall have something to say if it has. I was then told that for the first few hours I ought to be careful not to jump up and leap about too quickly, and that after 4 days I would be fine and fit to conquer a continent.

And so it has proved. It has taken a while to lose some pretty bad headaches, and longer to get my strength and fitness back. But now I am not only upright but back working, much to my delight. This is a gentle start for August, as I write, before

getting back up to speed a bit more in September, as you read. But it will not be the same as before.


During my enforced absence, one of the gifts that went on display was the way in which the people of all the Churches in the Valley worked together to make sure that everything was covered. All the services on Christmas Day happened, and ever since, through Lent, over Easter and beyond, the arrangements have been made and the services have been led – and this includes the weddings, baptisms and funerals that have taken place. And not just the services, the pastoral care of the people and the Christian witness in the parishes has continued.

Now I am back in circulation, the temptation is to pick up where I left off. I will try to avoid it, and if I do not please feel at liberty to tell me off. There are many parts of the life of the Churches that are working much better than they were when I left them. I shall try not to interfere by taking back control. Hands off, are the words to remember, because after all it is not my hands that do the work, and all hands are in His.

Many thanks from us all to the Revd Ryder Rogers, to Mike Read and James Webster, our Readers, to the Pastoral Assistants and Lay Worship Leaders for all that they have done. And thanks too to the Churchwardens and other Church officers who have worked so hard, and to the regular members of the congregations who have kept the faith.

And many thanks from Jean and me for the help that was given her during my excursion through the valley of the shadows. David Smith organised a team of drivers for the whole long and weary way to Southampton hospital and back, waiting for Jean while she watched over me. Then there was food waiting for her on her return, and visits. messages of encouragement and kindnesses all of which meant more I am sure, that the givers appreciate or would ever acknowledge. Thank you to all.

And my thanks for all the prayers, cards visits and help by which means I have been crowded with blessings over these past months. It has been a privilege to have been given so much in the way of blessing, good will and friendship. I am a much humbled man; not in the sense of having been belittled, but by having been placed securely and lovingly where I belong to be. Thank you, and through all of you, thanks be to God. **Bob**.



Jean recommence their ministries, let me say personally and on behalf of all the churches in the Bride Valley, how thrilled and grateful to God we are.

In this, my last clergy corner letter, may I invite everyone in the Bride Valley to make a special note of, and get involved in, Back to Church Sunday on September 27th. People get disconnected with church for a number of reasons - moving into the area and never getting involved with the 'new' church; missing a few weeks and then being embarrassed to come back again; generally losing the church-going habit with all the busy-ness of life;

getting disillusioned with God and the church; thinking what the church says and does is irrelevant; maybe something or someone that upset them; having questions about the Christian faith or some Christian practice that they felt unable to ask anyone about. The reasons are multitudinous. You name it, and it will fit the bill for someone.

This sort of thing has happened across the board, in all denominations and in all areas. So some churches got together and said, 'Let's make people feel comfortable enough to come back to their 'local' with no questions asked, no criticisms made, and no pressure put on anyone.' And it worked.

Last year throughout the country literally tens of thousands took the opportunity to return - to come back home on Back to Church Sunday. So all denominations and most of the church in the UK are getting involved this year.

You may be giving to a friend or neighbour, or be given, a simple invitation saying, 'Come back home, you are welcome.' Please look at the service grid on the back of the BVN and see what is available in your local church and make a note in your diary to come to one of the services on that day. We look forward to seeing you.

Assistant is a person who is trained and authorised to engage in pastoral ministry on behalf of the local church, working as part of a team of clergy and laity. The focus of all LPA ministry is pastoral care, but an individual's ministry will vary according to their gifts and skills, and the local situation. In all cases the ministry calls for a loving and compassionate heart, and a willingness to listen and support those in need.

LPA's may be involved in:

- welcoming newcomers to both our churches and our communities visiting families before and after baptism
- work with children and young people
- hospital visiting
- ▼ visiting people in their homes (not just the elderly and housebound)
- supporting the bereaved
- prayer and healing
- ♠ hospitality
- ★ training & nurture, including confirmation preparation & home groups
- ▼ evangelism, including Alpha groups
- participating in worship

Whilst through baptism into Jesus Christ, all Christians are called to serve Christ in one another and love as he loves us, a LPA is someone who is seen by the church as already having particular gifts in this area, and who has undergone a short training course to help develop those gifts.

Careful selection of suitable LPA's by their incumbent is vital. There is no single pattern of gifts or character that is looked for in an LPA, but the following are important requirements:

- maturity in the Christian faith and a member of the congregation
- a regular and developing pattern of prayer
- gentleness, tact, discretion and the ability to keep confidences
- ▼ a willingness to listen without comment
- a willingness to serve the church as part of a team led by the Incumbent or other nominated person.

Candidates must be baptised and confirmed members of the Church of England (or other denomination) whose pastoral gifts and skills have been identified and welcomed by the local church. As an LPA is seen as representing the church it is important that there is a careful process of discernment that this is the ministry to which God is calling an individual.

The course has been recently updated. There is a course starting in the autumn and the 'taster' meeting is on Wednesday 16th September at Beaminster. If you feel that God is calling you to this work and would like to be considered for the course, please ask any member of the clergy team or ring 01308 897445.

COMMUNITY LEADER FOR LONG BREDY & LITTLEBREDY

Alongside of Alison and Jeanne, Wayfinders for Long Bredy & Littlebredy (part of the Chesil Bank villages), I work as a Community Leader for Dorset POPP. My role is to challenge and change the way services are provided to older people. I work with service providers and older people to identify gaps in how these services and

and older people to identify gaps in how these services are delivered and opportunities for them to be developed locally.

Another aspect of my work is to support The Community Initiatives Commissioning Fund whereby older people have identified opportunities to start up new projects, for example: lunch clubs, computer classes, Neighbourcar voluntary transport scheme, Memory Cafes, Carers' Support groups, individual Senior Forums, coffee mornings, exercise classes and equipment, table tennis groups and many more. There is an application and appraisal process, led by older people, that has to date funded over 170 new initiatives throughout Dorset.

So if there is any group of people in Long Bredy or Littlebredy who are over 50 yrs of age, who feel that they would like to either start something new or perhaps extend what they already offer, please contact me to talk about your idea. Currently the funding available is not huge but may be just the boost you need to get something off the ground and for it to be sustainable. Unfortunately single events cannot be supported.

For those of you who are not familiar with the POPP message it is simply this:

"To build supportive communities enabling older people to remain living in their own homes for as long as they wish".

This includes appropriate housing, not being isolated, feeling safe and financially secure, free from discrimination, being able to make a positive contribution, be in good health in mind and body and have dignity and choice throughout their life.



Greetings from the National Trust West Dorset Team! No sooner has work finished to improve the car park at Burton Bradstock beach, and the National Trust is digging it up again – but this time it is part of local

celebrations to mark the completion of the project.

Wednesday 15 July saw children from Burton Bradstock Primary, helped by NT staff; bury a time capsule on the site. Inside were copies of local newspapers and magazines, National Trust information, contributions from local businesses, photos of the children, before and after shots of the

car park work, and a signed copy of the yet-to-be-released new CD from local resident Billy Bragg.

Children from Burton Bradstock Primary, with head teacher Mark Stratta, helped Bob Cornish, NT's Roving Recruiter; to bury the capsule, which was donated by Hansford Construction Ltd – the contractors who worked on the project.

The idea came from the Bob
Cornish, who is based at Hive Beach: "It's been really interesting watching the work from start to finish, and it came into my mind, wouldn't it be nice to bury a range of items and information about the village, National Trust and the project for prosperity.

"In many ways it's sad to think that we won't be around when the capsule is 'discovered', but it's nice to know our little bit of Burton may be of interest to future generations."

NT took over management of the car park back from the parish council in October 08 and just after Easter, started work to upgrade the parking bays and access, fill pot-holes, resurface the car park with a natural finish and install new drainage to permanently alleviate the regular flooding of the site.



On the peculiar stains and smells of old choir robes

The Rectory St. James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

Your withering comments, saying that our choir robes, were "surplice" to requirements did not go down well at last week's practice. I will concede that Mr Baddeley's robes smell somewhat kippered and are laced with burns - but you can expect little less from 40 years of enjoying a final cigarette behind a gravestone before the start of Mattins.

Certainly, Mr Timmins's surplice has that strange series of red and blue polka dots, but that is only because he uses his time in the choir stalls when not singing to catch up on marking his pupils' essays. And we are only too conscious of Miss Thripp's red gash down her front, making it look as if the choirmaster has just stabbed her for coming in one bar too soon - but trying to eat a jam doughnut just before that wedding five years ago was an unwise decision.

To give Daddy his due, he was clearly uneasy that trendy-Mummy should be so tolerant, encouraging even; but then, that's the modern way I suppose. As Daddy looked in our direction a couple of times, with a sort of apologetic half-shrug, we smiled wanly back in hypocritical reassurance.

Once out of the house, the gardens brought the peace that only nature and its beauty can provide. Clambering down to the boathouse brought the most gratifying moment of our visit. At the foot of the path, on the quayside, was a notice: "Stop. Do not go down these steps". The Little Orange Oxford Monster stood before it, mouthing the words, his mother nearby - though not really near enough, as he promptly descended the steps as he had been programmed to do. Three steps down, the slippery seaweed and the tide did the trick. "WaaaAAARRRGHH!! Gurgle, gurgle" and he was gone in an instant. As he rose for the first time, eyes wide in the disbelieving horror, his bright orange T shirt clinging wetly to his frail torso, Mummy was next to him, tearing him from the clutches of the River Dart, wading ashore, L.O.O.M., a chastened marmoset, clutched to her breast. Daddy, almost unmoved by the episode, looked across to us, raised an eyebrow in resignation and muttered acidly, "Hence the notice."

It is, of course, right to give children their freedom, not to chastise them or in any way inhibit their whims, even if it does risk their lives and result in a pile of smelly washing.






