

ST MARY'S MISSION FUNDRAISING

There may be global financial uncertainty, yet the deep hearts (and hungry stomachs!) of Burton Bradstock came together once again, this time achieving £1,319.32 for charitable good causes both locally and overseas.

Sales at the Reading Room raised £693.24, while the summer cream teas generated £526.08. There was also an extremely generous donation of £100. The funds raised will be divided between Emmaus and the Tear Fund.

The contribution to Emmaus will be used to help homeless people in Exeter. The city has the fifth highest homeless figures in the UK and our donation will be used to develop a supportive community offering rough sleepers accommodation, work and the opportunity to rebuild their lives. Plans are for the unit to open in the next two years.

> The festival in August was undoubtedly a great success. There was music to suit all tastes, performed to the highest of standards in a friendly and informal atmosphere, and a colourful display of many artistic skills at the exhibition of fine paintings.

The music played by professional musicians who so enjoy coming to the village to perform, was very varied in form and style. David Juritz led the Festival Players in memorable chamber and orchestral concerts; it was an exciting evening of jazz with 6pac; splendid soloists gave us a wide range of wonderful recitals; youngsters enjoyed a workshop leading up to a family concert and a barn dance, which was a lot of fun finish off the week.

This year's festival maintained the traditions established from the outset by Mary Ryan and continued over the past twenty-nine years. Such is its unique character and high standard that it is now firmly set in the Dorset cultural calendar.

This eventful week requires much hard work by a small committee, which puts in considerable effort over three-quarters of the year in publicising, preparing, staging the event and tidying up afterwards. The support of the catering team and the ad hoc 'heavy gang' in stage rigging, chair shifting etc is vital, as is the accommodation provided by many

hospitable folk around the village. I am very grateful to everybody who has helped in these various ways.

Having been involved for a number of years, Anne and I feel the time has come to give up our central role in organising the Festival at the Burton end. (David Juritz and the London team put the programme of music together and engage the musicians.) Other members of the committee feel the same. We are prepared to do it for one more year but after that the Festival will cease unless others are prepared to take over the central responsibilities for directing the administration and doing the 'donkey work'.

There will be a meeting in the Reading Room at 2.30pm on Tuesday 24th November to explore if and how the Festival can continue beyond next year. You are urged to attend if you are concerned about the future of the Festival and are prepared to take an active part in keeping this splendid event happening in the years ahead. 

Where a payphone is converted in this way, users will be able to make the following types of calls; Debit and Credit cards (which necessitates the inputting of the account number and not the insertion of the card), BT Chargecard, prepaid calling card, to the BT operator (100), 999 emergency and freephone calls (0800) and reverse charged calls. I hope this answers the question.

Our holiday this Summer was probably like everybody else's. Reading the last couple of pages of my Anita Brookner just to check, at the outset, that the story would *not* indeed develop, I settled down for some relaxation. But it was not long before I became absorbed by the foibles of our group.

Dave was the most competitive; always at the front of the queue for everything, always in the front seat of the charabanc, a combination of the conceited "Cheeky Chappie" and the garden gnome, at every crossing, he would fling himself (like Christ the Redeemer in Rio de Janeiro), before the oncoming traffic: not to ensure our safety, but as a kind of "police activity" joke, in pursuit of the tolerant smiles, which progressively faded from our faces daily until Thursday, by which time we all sincerely hoped he might become another statistic in the path of the surging traffic (now, in 99 words, that's what I call a sentence worth parsing!).

There was Mrs Complacent, who had an endless (and, for me, irritating) repertoire of inane platitudes: "I'm just stepping of this kerb, assuming I'll end up in one piece" (she did...); "Well, Rome wasn't built in a day" (this *in Italy!!*); "These are called melon balls" (Really?); "My husband is a *very* good cook, he can follow a recipe to a fraction of an ounce."

Bragging, bellowing Brunhilde bounced breathlessly to breakfast each morning: her repertoire: cruise stories. Bad ankles, but danced everyone else off their feet on the final night; frightening even the hotel staff gigolo to death. At a strangely egotistical level, very interesting; unmoved by even the most blatant snub.

And the two old dears, squabbling like Siamese kittens in a basket all day (Cynthia Widow taking herself off ostentatiously, mid-journey, to sit elsewhere in the coach), yet like Siamese twins by the evening.

But the point I am coming to, is the depressing evidence there is, everywhere, of a growing selfishness and narcissism. Why does everyone seem to just speak of themselves endlessly? Why do they have such a lack of interest in others? Where did this *id*-cult begin? (Clearly in their subconscious, you might jest).

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

POPPIES

Poppies flower in the summer, don't they? So why poppies in November? You will see them everywhere in the next week or so, and everyone from the smallest Rainbow or Beaver to the Queen will be wearing a poppy on Remembrance Sunday. We wear poppies because, among all the mud and chaos of the

We wear poppies because, among all the mud and chaos of the battlefields of the Great War, men were amazed to see the humble field flower of home spring up where the earth was disturbed – a blood red splash of colour in a sea of khaki.




When the British
Legion started an
appeal to help those
whose bodies or
minds had been

smashed by war, the poppy seemed an ideal symbol. And even now, when World War I and II seem so far away, our troops are fighting, being wounded and dying; reminding us that the poppy is also a symbol of sacrifice.

PRINT A POPPY

How? Well the answer lies in your own hands. You will need a white paper plate, red and black finger or poster paint and two margarine lids or saucers to put the paint on. Put some newspaper on the table and start. Squeeze some red paint onto one lid or saucer and put black paint on the other one. Put your thumb into the red paint and use it to make 5 overlapping petals in a circle on the edge of your plate. Put your index finger into the black paint and use it to stamp a centre for your poppy. Continue printing poppies all round the edge of your plate to make a wreath. Leave it to dry and then you can write 'Lest We Forget' or 'Remembrance' in the middle of the plate. You could hang the plate in your front window to share with others.


