Of course I may not, in which case Jean will be more than a little cross with me. And I may not, because things happen. The most unlikely coincidences seem normal at the time, and only later, looked back on, become on reflection an inevitable series of events.

Merry Christmas, but what if:

- 1. The birth had gone wrong?
- 2. The stable caught fire with all those people visiting?
- 3. Soldiers had caught up with Joseph and his family while they were fleeing to Egypt?

What if any one of a thousand things had just been that tiny bit different and Jesus had not been born, or been rescued, had not survived or grown up?

These are only notional questions, because of course he was born, did survive and thrived to adulthood. The what if question is to do with us saying "God sent his only Son" as if Jesus were posted express delivery; sent by special courier under police escort. If it is all so safely done and dusted we are left with the feeling that once his life had been set in motion the whole of it was going to happen with an effortless, rather dull inevitability.

But our God is a gambling God – or is it gambolling? He risks his only son, and we know this because the love he gives us with which we love each other is full of risk. When people are married they risk the rest of their lives



to be with someone. Soldiers do not often give their lives, but they always risk them for love of their country, and sometimes they lose. I have just become a grandfather, and was very aware at the time of the risks surrounding a child being born; and yet for love they are, as Jesus was.

So merry Christmas, but don't plan anything too confidently. I found out last year that this can be a mistake. In celebrating the Christ child born, take a deep breath, remember that for love of you God is risking everything. Then when it is all over we will greet each other on the other side, rejoicing. COAST ROAD SAFETY PROJECT MOVES AHEAD



A package of measures aimed at reducing RSET casualties on the B3157 coast road between Chickerell County Council and Bridport will be introduced by Dorset County Council over the coming months following discussions

with local communities.

The B3157 Road Safety Partnership Project Board, met on Tuesday 20th October to discuss the comments received at public consultation days held in September. Over 180 comments forms were returned by local people, expressing a range of views about the proposals put forward by the safety partnership.

After considering the feedback, the Board agreed to embark on a package of measures to support the goal of cutting the number of crashes on the scenic coastal route, which has a recent history of serious and fatal casualty collisions. These will include:

- introducing a 50mph speed limit for the 'rural' sections of the route between Chickerell and Portesham and Portesham and Bridport;
- · refreshing white edge markings along the whole of the route, and white centre markings at identified hazard locations between Abbotsbury and Swyre;
- maintenance to central cats eves along the whole route:
- work to repair and enhance lay-bys;

- landscaping of road verges to highlight known hazards; and
- working with local communities to rationalise signs and reduce nonessential sign clutter.

In addition, the board heard that the County Council is in discussions with the police and Dorset Safety Camera Partnership to increase enforcement and police presence along the route as part of a major countywide casualty reduction campaign beginning in January.

One of the issues still under discussion is the proposal to use centre lines where highlighting specific hazards. Elected members of the Board asked to see further evidence of where similar measures have been used to reduce casualties in Dorset and elsewhere in the country.

It was also confirmed that further, detailed consultation will take place within the communities along to route to consider enhancement to safety and access within the villages. The Board agreed in principle to the development of the concept of village 'gateway' features, which would highlight that road users were entering a different environment and enhance local distinctiveness.

The County Council said it would hold on-site assessments of areas of specific concern with local communities in early 2010. These would help to develop initial concepts presented at the consultation events by working with local people to consider how to meet safety and access needs most appropriately, while retaining the character of the villages.

The new reception children have all settled really well into life at school. The lovely weather has meant that all of our Reception and Year 1 wellie walks have been dry. The children have really enjoyed discovering the local area, learning about the colours and shapes they can spot within the environment. They have also been able to teach me some things on the walks, for example one child was able to point out a tree her Grandfather had planted as a seed when he was a boy! It is lovely to see such a continuity of community in a village school.

Our Harvest Festival held at St Mary's Church was well attended by members of our local community and parents. All of the children took part in our service of thanksgiving. This year we reflected on the desire for world justice as our theme, exploring the need to share all the gifts of God with those less fortunate. 



BANDMASTER FALLS FROM STAGE DURING CONCERT

"I said this would happen," says British Legion Spokesperson.

"This all reminds me of an ENSA show in Monte Casino," said Bride Valley British



Legion Branch representative, Lance Corporal of Horse Dave Bellows (late the Royal Bengal Kamikaze Lancers), "there was this Commando Bandmaster – reckoned 'e was good at rock climbing, 'e did – jigging away on the stage we had erected for him and his Band of Brothers: fell straight off when he got to the second eight. I warned him the stage was only trestle tables on a few breeze blocks, but 'e would 'ave it that 'e was, in real life, a gazelle ('e reckoned...). 'E was never the same again; ended up in the Caterin' Corps (which was no good for us, as he 'ad a passion for Gurkha food and everythink was dressed up in curries and we never knew what we was eatin'). Course, if they'd of had Health and Safety then, there would of been a Risk Assessment and it would never of 'appened. I blame the Italians, frankly, I see they've been playing up in Afghanistan lately."

Asked if this was relevant to the speculation that the Bandmaster of the St Swithun's Band would fall from the stage at the British Legion Annual Band Concert at the Village Hall Burton Bradstock, Mr Bellows replied, "Well, actually, yes. A Risk Assessment would, quite properly, of required 'im to be attached to a safety wire (with harness) for the duration of the concert, as well as a safety net and the local Fire Brigade in hattendance; after all, one can't rely on a Bandmaster also bein' a qualified trapeze artist or mountaineer these days; I 'ad a word with Sarn Major West about just this point, but 'e demurred. I think 'e was takin' a big risk, frankly: well out of order. Bowl meens take risks with your own, but it's not on to imperil those who give so generously of their time for such a good cause."

Our Bride Valley News reporter has established that, in fact the Bandmaster did *not* fall from the stage, despite a number of anonymous financial incentives to do so - clearly made by those who were involved in the substantial sweepstake on how many minutes into the show it would take for him to step off. It was also announced that such was the interest in this "event within an event" that well over 100 people attended and a handsome £640.50 was raised for this year's appeal. "This was the finest turn-out we have seen for some time," said CoH Bellows, "I trust the said Bandmaster can be tempted to try this again – though, in order to stay within the rules, I fear we may 'ave to erect some kind of blanket, or maybe attach 'im to some safety helium balloons."

My dear Nephew Darren

I am sorry you will have to take your Christmas Services sporting a black eye, but I have no sympathy. It doesn't matter what competition you are asked to judge - biggest marrow, best decorated shower cap, most beautiful goldfish - the winner should always be the muscular entrant with the steely glint in their eye. The meek may well be destined to inherit the earth, but they will never win the best decorated Christmas cake competition. You should have known that a lady who works at the "Rose and Crown" pulling pints and throwing clients out at closing time is not one to be awarded second prize.


Lady Bartle has won ours every year for the last 50 years even though we all know that her French pastry chef will have spent the previous month laboriously decorating the thing. Someone once rashly asked her how she came up with such novel ideas every year. Lady B. promptly started to talk about grouse shooting with a look that made it quite clear how she would have dealt with her interrogator had she herself been feathered.

As you are now well on your way to learning, the Christmas Fair presents a minefield of potential disasters. 


along the bottom half of the centre of one tree and along the top half of the centre of the other




tree. Slip the two trees together along the slits. To help the tree to stand firmly, use sellotape to fasten the parts together where they meet.


