The deed is done in the laying on of hands and the blessing. Now is the time when the every day in its way becomes an adventure; and every Sunday is Advent.

4th March What kind of a person he was 11th March The people who travelled with him


18th March The people he met – all sorts and conditions 25th March (the feast of the Annunciation) One small belief

FROM THE REGISTERS



"My sister Susan and I thought it would interest your parishioners (we believe that prayers have been said for her in Church) that our Mother, **KAY WHEELER** sadly passed away last Thursday and is to be cremated in Salisbury tomorrow, 23rd. She was 93 years.

Mother had been associated with Burton Bradstock and surrounding area for very many years, notably converting the old coach house back in the 1980s and

having lived in various houses until she left the Old Mill to live in Harbour House at West Bay. Latterly she was at Bymead House in Charmouth where she died peacefully.

Fittingly we think, Sue and I will return to her beloved Burton Bradstock in the near future to scatter her ashes."

On 9th November, at St Martin's Church, Shipton Gorge, the ashes of **ETHEL MARY HANSFORD** were laid to rest with those of her late husband Albert, Edwin Thomas, who died in 2002. The family had been in the village for many years, first in farming, and latterly in the village itself. Mrs Christine Baker, their daughter was born in the Mason's arms, she recalled, and went to the village school. Ethel moved away in later years to Haselbury Plunknett. Christine was joined in mourning by other members of the family.

On the 27th November a thanksgiving service for the life of **BRYAN HANSFORD** was held in St Michael and all angels, Littlebredy. Fond memories of a long term resident of the village were made, recalling the Hansford Panic Tours of his early years, succeeded by his East African adventures - his first hilarious efforts at work being succeeded by the very responsible position at Gatwick airport in which he finally found himself. His love of music was mentioned; love of art, travel, good living and above all his friends were remembered with great thankfulness, to the accompaniment of the panting of Prom, his faithful dog, whose devotion and lack of any kind of control are now legendary in the village. Bryan's ashes are to be in part in his garden, and also in the churchyard, whence they were taken at the end of the service. The company then repaired to the village hall for the kind of party of which Bryan himself would have loved to have been the centre.

The ashes of the late **FRANCES ELIZABETH WILLIS** were laid to rest on Friday, the 28th of November. They were placed with those of her late husband, James Henry in the memorial ground of St Mary's Church, Burton Bradstock. Her funeral service had been held in November 2007. The ashes were laid to rest with those of Frances' late husband, James Henry. Mourning, at the simple ceremony, was led by their daughter, Mrs Andrea Wilkinson.

The funeral of **Roy Tertullus Perry** (80yrs), who unexpectedly died in his car in Dorchester Hospital car park on 14th November, was held at St Mary's Burton Bradstock on 1st December and was followed by burial in the Cemetery.

Roy, who was brought up in India as the son of an Army Officer, escaped death whilst serving in the Army, and later as a Police Officer at Shepton Mallet, when involved in a motor cycle accident.

His first wife, June, died in her 40's of cancer. Roy later married Beryl, who was June's consultant's secretary. After over 30yrs of marriage, Beryl had a stroke. Roy was taking her to Dorchester for treatment when he died. Roy was a man who loved military music, participating in the Royal British Legion, driving sports cars, and owning King Charles spaniels. He had lived in many places in the locality and on special occasions attended St Mary's

Church. His niece, Sarah, is helping Beryl to find a residential home to move into.

An account of the funeral of the late **Roy Perry**, which took place on the 1st of December, will appear in the February edition of the BVN.

CHURCHES GEAR UP FOR YEAR OF THE CHILD 2009

2009 is the 30th anniversary of the United Nations' International Year of the Child. To help mark the year, many churches are planning to make 2009 'a year to remember' for young people and the Church.

It is an ideal opportunity for local churches everywhere to review and to celebrate the work they do with children and young people.

The Archbishop of York, Dr John Sentamu, has said: "Young people all over the country need to hear

the words of Christ's love for them in all manner of ways. So too, we the Church need to hear afresh God speaking to us through the life and witness of children. Come and join the celebration, be challenged and inspired."

The Revd Mary Hawes, National Children's Adviser for the Church of England, stresses that Year of the Child 2009 is not a prescriptive project or even a centrally driven programme:

"It is simply an open invitation to the Christian church in the UK to join in by making 2009 a special year for children and young people. There are no plans for big national events, but rather to create a spotlight to help churches focus on their work with children.

"We are hoping that 2009 will be a year in which the issues facing young people today can be highlighted, and for work with children and young people to be celebrated."

On the art of ringing in the New Year

My dear Nephew Darren

I am afraid you must concede that church bells are not to everyone's taste. The idea of switching on your recorded bells - no matter how digitally enhanced - at midnight in order to welcome in the New Year may have seemed inspired at the time, but considering that most of your inner city parish is Moslem, that you are surrounded on one side by a hospital and another by a care home for the elderly, it is not too surprising that the joyful sound was not well received.

If you really felt threatened by being confronted at the church door by irate nurses at one minute past midnight as you wished them all a Happy New Year, just think of your degree of discomfort were we still to have matrons. Never mind, curates are supposed to make mistakes; the only pity is that you seem to be so well endowed with them.

But to be fair, we too had a small misjudgement on New Year's Eve. Our bell-ringers - who practise the art of campanology, not on operating electronic equipment - have always been something of a trial. They ring with great enthusiasm for half an hour before services each week, but





Traditionally the gifts have a special meaning: gold is for a King, frankincense (sweet smelling incense) for God and myrrh (a spice used to prepare bodies for burial) for mortal man. Not the usual kind of gifts that people give to a small baby but symbols that show what Jesus was and would be.


