

In January I suffered an electricity bill of £11,622 and 94 pence. It was an estimated bill, calculated, I suppose, on the basis that the one for the same quarter the year before was £89 odd. I was surprised, but not alarmed in that my first thought was one of being thankful

that it was not on direct debit. It would have been interesting, and perhaps even educational, to try to go overdrawn at the bank by over eleven thousand pounds, and then to try to get the charges paid by the electricity company. In fact I am now so curious I think I will probably try it sometime just to see what

happens.

With any luck, if I go deeply enough into debt all of a sudden, and if I whine long enough about how you have to pay talented people top whack to mismanage things so badly, the government will take me into public ownership and allow me to pay



I apologise for the lapse from perfect tolerance, brought on by the sins of greed, anger and envy, as well as of sheer astonishment, if that counts as a sin. What this letter was supposed to be about when I started it was debt, beginning with the amount we all now carry as a nation, and going on about private debt and what it does to the soul. I was then going to turn the angle slightly to talk about moral debt, and the good we owe one another in a debt that is not always paid in terms of neighbourly generosity – neighbours including strangers, foreigners and indeed enemies in the Christian Creed.

The full turn is made in talking about the debt we would owe to God, which is our life and everything, if the charge had not been taken away by Christ on the cross. Which is all good straightforward stuff, but I cannot say it now owing to (notice the word owing) the aforementioned lapse in consideration.

So now, having told you about my interesting bill, which in humility I was very glad to receive as it reminded me of my complete indebtedness to God in Christ, I am bound to add how very happy I am for all those who lately have enjoyed a vast reward, however undeserved. I have to say this, and then I have to mean it. Try it. It's not as easy as it sounds. But if we can manage it, you and I, Lent may be a little shorter this year, even if it feels longer.





VILLAGE SOCIETY

The Village Society Meeting on 15th January turned out to be rather special, despite Bob Ayres's rival attraction in Shipton Gorge. We sat in excitement, awaiting the start of the talk by Peter Lawrie on Roman Roads in West Dorset. And we sat. And we sat. His picture show had decided not to talk (as they say these days) to the projector. But Valerie McRadio – the true professional as always – extemporised seamlessly, for what seemed an age.

Then we had some trailers, just like the olden days at the pictures, with Pearl and Dean, only it was Howes and Seymour, who gave us some previews of what else is on in this wonderful county. Philip Howes, with a run-down of speakers at the University of the Third Age (U3A) and Mark Culme-Seymour, giving one of his best talks yet (clearly he is better when extemporising!), chatted topically about the many disasters with which he had been involved over the years: none, mind you, of his making! Mark also told us about the Eype Centre for the Arts. But all this was not what we came for!!

Well, we got going, thanks to some very nimble footwork from Alistair and David in producing a spare cable and whispering threats in the ear of the computer (rather like the story of the Elephant That Shook Its Head...), and Peter Lawrie, who calls himself the Tony Robinson of Abbotsbury, set off on his marathon lecture about unearthing traces of Roman Roads in and around this part of the world; it was all a bit like "Life of Brian":

"What have the Romans ever done for us?" Peter's proposition that Vespasian may have inadvertently precipitated 9/11, was not a theory that caught on, the writer is bound to observe, but a novel way of beginning a talk. It was difficult to tell on whose side he was, as he mocked both the Ancient Brits, who "painted themselves blue, got drunk and made a fuss" and the "guys who came along in tin skirts and knocked their heads together".

It was an absorbing, if rather complicated story. There were many wordy overheads, which kept us all focussed as we followed them, and Peter! The Romans built brilliant roads; dug through hills to reduce gradients; they stopped for no-one, and made straight for their target. Nevertheless, "Six million trees in Marshwood Vale behind each of which was a blue madman, was a good match for Julius Caesar, the giant lawnmower": the roads reached little further than Exeter. We enjoyed working out how many tons of corn a Legion consumed in a day (26) and the logistics of this revealed why Roman Roads usually run parallel to sea ports – cheaper provisioning.

The next talk to look out for, on Friday 12 $^{\text{th}}$ March, at the Village Hall, will be, "Thirty Years of Wildlife Photography" by Colin Varndell.



And don't forget the Village Outing, on Wednesday 9th June, to Bishops Lydeard, Dunster Castle and a ride on the West Somerset Steam Railway!

It is the first time the film has had music and this will be the second public showing in the film's new guise. There will be a full

accompanying programme, including the second showing of the 1930's Symondsbury film. The showing is at 7.30pm on Saturday March 6th and tickets, available from the Bridport Tourist Information Centre, are £7.50 for adults, £6.00 for Friends of the Eype Centre for the Arts and £5.00 for children under 14.


This is an all action film set in August 1941, based upon a true story, and starring Daniel Craig as one of three Jewish brothers who lead a group of Jewish escapees into

St James the Least of All

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from 'Uncle Eustace:'

On the nonsense of a lavatory at church

The Rectory St. James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

This year, the rigours of Lent have taken second place to a far more pressing matter: the installation of a lavatory at St. James the Least. Personally, I entirely disapprove of this additional sign of decadence in our moral fibre; we have survived perfectly happily for the last 800 years without one, so why is there such an urgent need now? And being surrounded by acres of fields, there seems to be a completely acceptable alternative.

It also spoils the pleasure I used to take, informing ushers at weddings, having liberally refreshed themselves at our local pub before the Service, that we have no facilities and that they would just have to wait. Their look of pained resignation, developing to clear signs of repentance as the Service progressed, was most cheering. It also meant that wedding parties did not linger after the Service but disappeared with commendable speed to safe havens.

I anticipate that now we have the thing, a sub-committee will inevitably form to devise a commissioning Service for the person who will be in charge of its maintenance. I can already foresee Lady Bartlett proposing an appropriate set of robes for the office holder - although it will need some tact to select suitable insignia on the sleeves.

In fact, the project has not been entirely successful; we still need to have a lock fitted and so at present, occupants have been advised to sing hymns loudly, preferably something rousing; "Onward Christian soldiers" would be ideal. A hymn

book has been installed as an aide memoire.

The greater difficulty arises from our antiquated plumbing system. A member of the congregation can leave a Service perfectly discreetly; they can enter the lavatory unseen by anyone, but on flushing, water is drawn through pipes running the length of the inside of the building with a thunderous roar that obliges me to stop preaching until the cataract has subsided. By the time the customer returns quietly into church, all noise has ceased and they remain oblivious of the chaos they caused and the stoic politeness of the congregation.

I am sure that in your worship centre you will have lavish cloakrooms furnished with colour co-ordinated walls and towels, baby changing facilities and video monitors relaying everything going on, so that users will not be denied a single

second of your hour-long sermons.

Our congregation should be grateful for what they now have. And to think that someone even suggested it should have heating!


