I am writing

in April about the warmth of May, and hoping that I am right in saying goodbye to

But I remember well climbing up from St. Peter's, Long Bredy, a year or three back now, under the gaze of curious cows until we stood over St. Peter's Church. Sitting in its bowl below us, it seemed a hand's reach away. We were there when the mist moved in from the West covering the tumuli up over the hill and wrapping the valley in mystery.

And I remember, too, the delight of a Communion service we held on the Knoll, having strolled up from St. Mary's, Puncknowle, when the breeze busted along from Lyme, and the coast, all the way round from Portland to Dartmoor, stood out clear around the bay.

This year I am catching up on going up a hill in search of another such a rare and holy moment. We have thought that it would be good to be up at Chilcombe, up by the little triangle where we turn off to park in the field above the Church. The keen ones will be walking, no doubt, from here and there up and down the Valley. Then we might stay there, or else wander up Shipton hill from the East, depending on the weather and how we feel. But we will celebrate communion, and remember again the vision of our Lord ascended in glory, which, when we get our remembrance right, will not seem so very far away.

Times and details will be talked over and announced in due course. But for now the preparation is in remembering things that we have seen, and others that are yet to be. Bob Thorn.

FROM THE REGISTERS

On Wednesday of Holy Week, March 31st, the funeral took place in

St. Martin's, Shipton Gorge, of Ambrose Branton Smith. Ambrose was a brave man, having flown agents and equipment into occupied France during the war, before becoming a Pathfinder pilot - one of those who went first over a target to mark it with flares for following bomber squadrons. People in



the Valley, and in his beloved Shipton Gorge, remember him for his fund of stories borne of the jolly, impish humour that marked the delight with which he looked upon the world. Ambrose's nephew, Hamish, spoke at the service of the life of his uncle, remembering his devoted Christian faith, and his love of the Church in which we were gathered.

Ambrose was a bell ringer, well known in the towers of the Valley and the surrounding area. There was therefore a goodly crowd of ringers to ring before the service, and again after Ambrose was laid to rest in the Churchyard. They also stayed to drink his health in a bottle of whisky he had instructed to be set aside for ringers at his funeral.

He was also a keen beagler, and following the funeral a horn was blown over the churchyard, making the call "coming home." A sound that will echo long in the memories of those many friends and family who had come to pray for the repose of his soul.

May he rest in peace, and rise in glory.

BRIDPORT & DISTRICT U3A

Members of Bridport & District U3A have made two important historic finds in the past month: a previously unknown section of an 11th century abbey which has been dug up in a member's back garden, and a rare fossil.



Six feet under the lawn at his home in Abbotsbury, Peter Laurie has unearthed what Dorset County Museum believes to be the ruins of an outbuilding of the former Benedictine Abbey. Peter, who leads the U3A's landscape archaeology group, thought there was a chance that there could be a Roman road running through his garden. So to test his theory he started digging with his 16-year-old grandson, Oscar.

They discovered a substantial freestone wall about one metre thick and one metre high, and among the first to see his find were fellow members of the landscape archaeology group. He plans to resume digging in the next few months. The abbey at Abbotsbury was dissolved during the reign of Henry V111 and the buildings were then demolished so that the stone could be reused.

Members of the fossil hunters group went to Monmouth Beach, east of Lyme Regis, where the most exciting find was a vertebra from a plesiosaur, an aquatic reptile from the Jurassic period. Other fossil finds included ammonites, brachiopods and belemnites.





Here are some of the tricks of the trade that were revealed:

- a) a cardboard cuckoo and a recording of its call does little to attract other birds, but fascinates passers-by;
- b) calling, "excuse me" to a fox will cause it to give the photographer the look he could only dream of;
 - c) mirrors encourage males to display rather like humans..
- d) entering and leaving a hide can be a complicated matter: birds are thought not to be able to count very well, so two people enter the hide one wearing a bright yellow coat and red bobble hat the other leaves carrying the bright clothing that the other wore to go in, on a coat hanger (it is strange that birds, though less numerate than might be expected, are sharp enough to notice the appalling dress sense of the "other" watcher…).

There were many delightful and unusual photographs and some stories of terns and shags that cannot be repeated in a magazine like this one (e.g. "That's the nearest I've ever come to a tern").

Having probably asked for it, came the question, "How do you photograph a mole?" (asked almost seriously). Colin patiently explained the routine:

- 1. screw a broom handle vertically to a board;
- 2. cover the board with a conical pile of sieved earth;
- 3. unscrew the broom handle;
- 4. find a dead mole.

Most were amused (again), but a serious questioner repeated it, to discover that you can't (photograph a mole). Asked (by E. Fry) which he had enjoyed more, bird watching or his former profession, bricklaying, Varndell began to explain to those not in the know, "Well, I once worked for Eddy Fry..." "Only the once," quipped Fry.

Philip Howse (not Howes as previously reported – sorry!) proposed the vote of thanks, particularly for the tips on how to dispose of a dead mole. We had had a most entertaining evening and some glorious, even stunning, pictures from a real professional; Colin Varndell knew his subject and so did we a little more, at the end. He will be judging the entries at the Village Flower and Produce Show later in the year.

TIME TO CHERISH OUR CHURCHYARD!

Thousands of churches are preparing to celebrate Cherishing Churchyards Week this June as part of the UN's International Year of Biodiversity.

The nationwide project is being run by conservation charity Caring for God's Acre (CfGA) and is supported by the CofE's national environmental campaign Shrinking the Footprint. There are an estimated 12,000 CofE churchyards. Around half of them already run biodiversity projects, in rural and urban areas, while remaining respectful to their users, particularly family and friends of those buried there.

During the week (Friday June 18 to Sunday June 27) CfGA is encouraging churches to run an event to raise awareness and celebrate the treasures of their

churchyard. Last year, activities included; church tower tours, scything workshops, guided walks and talks, flower identification, family events and storytelling.

Shrinking the Footprint is encouraging churches to submit wildlife discoveries and projects as part of a new central database.

Churchyards are unique and special places. Each one is packed full of interesting natural and built features ranging from the beautiful ancient yew trees to the gravestones telling the stories of past Parish inhabitants. David Shreeve, the CofE's environment adviser, said: "With its thousands of churchyards in both urban and rural settings, the Church has a major national park involving a vast amount of biodiversity in its care for the whole community. As this is a special year for biodiversity, we would like to start recording this so that we can make everyone aware and appreciate just how important the country's churchyards are for both nature and people."






