I was still weak and inclined to be easily weary, but at the same time I had had a long and generous time to build back up again. I know this because of how tiresome Jean was finding my impatience to be up and doing things.

That I had all that time is a debt I will ever owe to the Revd Ryder Rogers, who worked so hard over those weeks and months. I was going to say that he worked tirelessly, but that would be as untrue as it would be the opposite of what I mean. He worked tiringly, and got tired. But he kept on going, as did so many others. I mention Mike Read and James Webster, our Readers, Yvonne Buckland and now Sue Linford, in training for ministry, the Worship Leaders and Pastoral Assistants who kept the services going and the Christian ministry alive and visible in the Valley, alongside many others - Churchwardens, Church officers and members of the congregations all played their part. So much so that when I did begin again, the transition was easy and gentle.

Beyond all I am devotedly grateful to Jean for having nursed me, guarded my weakness and clucked over my agitation. Many of the details of those days are now fading, as memories do, into impressions of a time preserved in stories that are passed around the family, eroding into the legends of tales that will be told in years to come. But Faith, Hope and Charity; these abide. The distillation of help in kindness and kindness in generosity of so many people, remains in the spirit of what is holy; so that I could quite envy myself as I remember how it was with us all last year - were it not for the year to come.

Being part of a local Home Watch or Neighbourhood Watch group can help. It is one of the best examples of how the police and community can work together to prevent crime. It involves a group of residents getting together to make their neighbourhoods a better and safer place to live. Residents of a community possess a very specialised knowledge of where they live. A police officer might not recognise someone in your garden as a stranger, but a neighbour would. This is what Home Watch is all about. It can give comfort knowing that your neighbours are looking out for you and keeping an eye on your property.

There may be an existing Home Watch group in your area that you can join or you can set one up. Setting up a group is very easy and doesn't require much time or commitment. EASTERN VALLEY

Here's hoping you remember who I am as I haven't written in your magazine for a little while, my apologies for this. I am your local PCSO Sarah and I get out around your areas where and when I can. If you do want to contact me for any reason and haven't bumped into me recently then please call on the numbers below or drop me an e-mail.

This is to give you an update on some recent ideas we have had and will be implementing to give you another way of voicing any issues/problems you may have.

The Rural West Safer Neighbourhood Team, i.e. PC Sandy 178, and myself PCSO Sarah 5410 have taken delivery of 4 post-boxes, which have been placed in suitable locations, e.g. shops/village halls. Attached to these boxes will be postcards for you to take write down what you wish with regard to any problems or concerns requests for information etc. You can then post the cards into the boxes and they will be collected on a regular basis.

What is done with these cards and the issues raised I hear you ask?

Well, we cover 5 valley wards and one person from each ward has been approached to represent you. Every 3 months I will collate all issues that I have learnt about, either from talking to people at PACT surgery, PACT van patrols, postcards, phone calls etc. These will then be passed to each ward representative and they will decide which is the top priority in their ward and pass it back to me. I will forward the 5 results onto the PACT panel, this is comprised of different agencies, e.g. housing highways, Dorset Fire and Rescue, councillors etc., who will then choose one to take forward.

You will then be made aware what the priorities were and which one was chosen to be resolved via our SNT newsletters that are distributed quarterly.

Bride Vale C.C. has begun its season with one defeat by Dorset Wanderers, draws home and away with Winchester College Staff, and three victories: against Cerne Abbas, the Alba Morphics touring team, and Milton Abbas. The game against Powerstock was cancelled because it clashed with a certain football match in Bloemfontein – maybe in retrospect the cricketers wished they'd gone ahead ...

In the Cerne Abbas game, Malcolm Stripp scored 29 with the bat, and then as wicketkeeper took a catch, made 2 stumpings and conceded not a single bye in the opposition's innings of 150.

This performance was eclipsed, however, in the following two games by young Dominic Gape. Alba Morphics' score of 82 for 9 in a 20/20 evening game did not seem too challenging at the start of Bride Vale's reply, but even less so after Gape retired with an undefeated 50 on his debut before BVCC won by 5 wickets. But even this was a mere warm-up for the away game at Milton Abbas three days later.

Milton Abbas batted first and scored 252 for 7 declared, which they must have imagined would probably be a winning score. Yet Bride Vale won by ten wickets with four overs to spare. While his opening partner scored 33 not out at one end, Gape hit a staggering 203 not out at the other, 158 of them in boundaries. It has to be recorded that the shell-shocked Milton Abbas players took this unexpected thrashing extremely well and sportingly afterwards.

SHSITY OF THE THIRD AGE

HISTORIAN'S APPEAL TO HELP FIND ROMAN ROADS IN WEST DORSET

Historian Peter Laurie is appealing to farmers and local landowners to help him in his search to find

Roman roads in West Dorset. He is the founder of the Dorset Roman Conquest Group which is seeking to find evidence of the Roman occupation in the area, and in particular he is looking for culverts that were built by the Romans.

He has a theory that culverts are one way of identifying the route of Roman roads. They were built by Roman engineers but not constructed again until the development of turnpike roads many centuries later.

So really old culverts, such as the ones he has found on the B3162 between Bridport and Chard, suggest that this is an old Roman road. If anyone knows of something like this, could they please let him know? Big ones are about 3ft high and 2ft wide at the bottom, while smaller ones are about 15 inches wide and high. On the perils of leaving your pulpit

My dear Nephew Darren

It was good of you to take Evensong here last Sunday while I was at my old college re-union - but I would prefer you used the pulpit in future when preaching. How could Colonel Brockle complete 'The Times' crossword and Miss Balmer her knitting with you constantly walking up and down in front of them? They found it most disconcerting, as out of politeness, they were obliged to listen to you. It was a unique experience they do not wish to repeat.

Those few who defy Anglican tradition and sit at the front of the church were also placed in the dilemma of trying to decide whether they should keep turning in their pews as you paraded down the nave and then rotating back to the front as you re-emerged up the side aisle. It did Lady Plumptree's vertigo no good at all. It also allowed people to see that you were wearing suede shoes. 

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
