of Christmas is about risk. The story is THE STORY told so often, year by year, that it can come to us as something inevitable, as if it were bound to happen that way. The

characters move from one tableau to another. God shoves them about because he has a plan, and it all works - like clockwork.

But Mary might have said no to the angel, or closed her ears as so many do to the voice of God calling. Or the child might have miscarried, as sadly many do. Or Mary might have died in childbirth as many Mothers did in those days. Or they might have got lost and not arrived in Bethlehem in time. Or the inn might not have been full. Or the shepherds might not have woken. Or any one of a hundred thousand tiny events may or may not have

taken place, any one of which might have meant that God's plan, seen years before by the prophets, might not have happened as it was supposed to do.

It is an idle speculation to wonder what would have happened if the smallest thing had gone wrong at the first Christmas time. or indeed at any



other time during the life of Jesus Christ, to his death and resurrection. It is idle to play with such ideas, because in the end the wonders happened, and that is that.

But it is not idle to appreciate the risks that God took in playing the whole of his love for the world he had made, and all his heart's adoring of his Son, against the hazard of events. I hope that we would never take such a risk for ourselves and all that is dear to us, because we would be right to think it a horrible wrong for us to do a thing like that. But he did. He is God. and his ways are not our ways.

He did this thing despite the risk. And he still does, when every day he places all his love on you. Bob

THE NATIVITY ON BBC1 THIS CHRISTMAS

Look out for The Nativity on the BBC this autumn. The script has been written by Tony Jordan, hailed as one of the top television scriptwriters in Britain. His work



includes Boon, Minder, Eldorado, Holby Blue, and Hustle, not to mention 250 episodes of East Enders.

This time he is telling the story of the Nativity, over four half-hour episodes on BBC1 on the run-up to Christmas. Jordan says: "I want this film of the nativity to be accessible, all right? I want it to be watched by the people who watch *East Enders, Hustle*, everything I do. I want them to watch it, believe it and sob like a child.

"I do have a faith....I believe Jesus Christ was the Son of God, and that he came to take away our sins. So, I have written a version of the nativity that I can believe. The people who watch it who aren't already sold, they can watch it and see that it's truthful and they can say, 'That's really cool.' "It's really helped me, writing it. It's helped me to make sense of the story. It's made sense of the birth of somebody that I believed in. Before, I had nagging doubts. Now, I don't have any doubts."

SALISBURY VISIT

On 30th October, a small group from the Bride Valley went to Salisbury Cathedral for another special event. Four of our young people, Jess and Lucy Haley and Toula and Nia Kanellaki, joined 63 other candidates who travelled to the Cathedral to declare their faith, some in baptism, and all by being confirmed.

It took three bishops to lay hands on all the candidates - Bp Stephen of Ramsbury, Bp Graham of Sherbourne and Bp John, who will be helping in the diocese when Bp Graham finds himself on his own in the new year.

The service began in the dark as everyone sang Veni Sancte Spiritus. Then after a reading from Genesis about creation, the Paschal candle was lit and then gradually the cathedral lights, enabling us to sing the hymn Thou whose Almighty word chaos & darkness heard.



Standing in a circle near the west door all 67 were presented and after the affirmation & re-affirmation of baptismal vows, Bp Stephen signed the baptismal candidates with the mark of the cross before leading the whole party to the font.

Later, after collective and personal declarations of faith, those to be baptised had their heads immersed in the water while Bp Stephen slowly pronounced 'I baptise you in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.' Each person emerged smiling.

The service was punctuated by short homilies. Everyone then paraded up to the nave to the hymn *O Jesus I have promised* to serve thee to the end where the circle was re-formed.

Candidates came forward to stand before the three bishops as they were named by their sponsors (Ann Read for Toula and Nia, and Sue Lindford for Jess and Lucy). The three bishops individually laid hands on the first three people and simultaneously declared, 'Confirm O Lord your servant with your Holy Spirit.' After this prayer everyone was encouraged to give one another a sign of peace.

During the closing hymn, *For all the saints*, candles were lit from the Pascal candle which had proceeded all the people and events, and a light was given to all who had been confirmed. They then carried them head high up the aisle and out through the west door to much applause after the dismissing words 'Go in the light and peace of Christ,' 'Thanks be to God'

VILLAGE SOCIETY

For two years now, the Hall Social Committee (a sub-committee of the Management Committee), has been arranging and managing events in the Hall. They have arranged the highly successful evenings with the London based Vintage Blues Band, Autumn Bazaars, the Chicken Evening, the recent Curry Evening (each with associated quiz), and the forthcoming History Morning and Christmas Fayre. All these events were arranged as social events for the three villages, but with the underlying motive to raise funds for the maintenance and improvement of the Village Hall.

Because of this committee's close association with the Management Committee, it has been restricted in what it can do, by the rules governing the the activities of a Registered Charity. As a result, it has been suggested that a Village Society be formed for the three villages.

The society would be entirely separate from the Village Hall, and would therefore not be constrained by Charities regulations, enabling it to organise functions specifically for the benefit of the three villages or any other purpose (hopefully making use of the Village Hall as much as practical/appropriate), but free of the aim of raising funds specifically to meet the needs of the Hall. Being an entirely separate entity from the Parish Council, would also allow the committee to access grant and other funds for the benefit of the villages (e.g. for the Playing Field) to which the Parish Council (as a public body) has no access.

There is a down side of course. A new committee means another chair, a bank account, some form of constitution, another secretary, another treasurer and such *active* committee as members may be thought

necessary. If you have any thoughts on the matter and/or would be willing to participate, please contact either Carol Bennett (897771: carol.dorset@btinternet.com) or Mike Brown (897953: mike brown@hattiemaths.com). If there is sufficient interest a meeting will be arranged for some time in the new year



Some say it is remarkable how many regularly turn out for the Burton Bradstock Village Society talks each month; it's not really, when you consider the high density of cultured inhabitants the Village has.......

At the October meeting, David Hutchinson, a former guide at the New Tate, treated us to a no-nonsense examination of Vermeer's paintings of women. There were not many of them

Having died at the age of 43 years, he is known to have painted between 55 and 60 pictures, of which only 36 survive. Vermeer's leitmotif was the intense detail in every aspect of his work, which was particularly portraiture. There was much audience involvement and a little disagreement at times, which made for a most interesting evening, which far overran: a good sign!

We were encouraged to ask ourselves about what we were viewing: where was the light source? is she pregnant? what is the man doing with his hand? (such a question always lights up a few faces, I regret to report). We ended up feeling quite expert; the gaze of "Girl with the Pearl Earring" left us in no doubt that the link between pearls and eyes was death: easy!

Hutchinson felt that it was Vermeer's almost detached professionalism in the painting of his women that set him apart from others; someone asked, "What about Augustus John?" "Yes," he conceded, "there is a difference." Vermeer's paintings of women are possibly captivating precisely because of his remoteness from his subject.

John Grantham gave his usual articulate and thoughtful summary and a vote of thanks, saying that he would now give much more thought to what he should be doing with his hands and when he should wear a hat (which was asking for it, as he was promptly offered one from the audience).

The December talk will be on Friday 3rd, by Clive Kennedy, and will be topical: "A biologist among the Reindeer in Lapland" – certainly a more

original title than, "I don't care what you want; get that reindeer of my roof".

The pre-Christmas meeting is always packed so make sure to put this in your diary.

Dorset Police have a new page on their website www.dorset.police.uk called 'Scam Busters'. This gives details of the latest scams and high-pressure cold calling incidents. If you have any non emergency calls with information to help the police then contact them on 01308 222222.

Finally – garden sheds have been broken into again. It seems a good padlock is not enough. I would suggest an alarm, also a sensor light plus a good window lock and curtains could be installed pronto to protect your tools and lawn mower.

DORSET BROADCASTING ACTION GROUP

Ofcom are carrying out a survey of Digital TV (Freeview) reception in West Dorset, beginning 15th November for a week. They are investigating some of the many complaints received by DorBAG on the quality of digital TV reception in their area. Many stated that their neighbours were also having problems. DorBAG has highlighted the areas most affected to Ofcom who have agreed to carry out a survey. So look out for a van with a TV aerial on a tall mast in your area.



Please approach them if you see the survey vehicle, and you have reception problems. Also, would you please tell your neighbours of this as they may also wish to talk to them.

Even if all is now well, please tell them the detail of the problems you

have encountered. Points to emphasise (if they apply) include having a satisfactory analogue signal before switchover, particular times of day when reception is unsatisfactory, differential loss of programmes, for example loss of BBC but not ITV. We really do need to get Ofcom to understand that something has to be done. The status quo is not acceptable, and cannot be allowed to stand. It would be useful (again if it applies) to emphasise that people have been forced to abandon the terrestrial service, and resort to a satellite solution with the additional costs involved, where this is possible without contravening the provisions of planning regulations.

May we remind you that this is a technical survey. Ofcom have been warned of the fury of those being served by relays over the comparative paucity of programmes, and, especially, the loss of ITV 3 and 4 after the national retune. It will do no harm to mention it if you so wish, but this team has no influence on which programmes are transmitted on which multiplex. Be assured that we have the people who are responsible in our sights as well.

JOBS TO DO:


KEEPING WARM WILL HELP YOU TO KEEP WELL.




