JANUARY MEETING REPORT



We enjoyed an "Audio Extravaganza" when Peter Foster, ably assisted by a colleague and by his wife Heather, led us through the history of radio broadcasting and encouraged us to "Turn up the Wireless".

Peter has a wide variety of voluntary roles ranging from helping on the Swanage Railway to producing a Talking Newspaper but his speciality is sharing radio memories

which he does regularly on Dorchester Hospital Radio and on Radio Solent.

The first public broadcasts started early in the 1920s and the BBC London Station 2LO went on air in 1922 and the first Radio Times was published in 1923. The first extensive coverage was of the General Strike in 1926. The Charter ensuring the BBC's independence was granted in 1927.

Gradually more transmitters were erected and more people had access to the wireless and the variety of programmes and transmission times increased.

Great national events were broadcast live including royal weddings and coronations as well as major sports occasions complete with enthusiastic commentators. Television had just started but was stopped during the war when people like Richard Dimbleby and Frank Gillard became household names on the wireless.

The first TV challenge came with the Coronation in 1953 when, despite

an erudite commentary from John Snagge and all the sounds at Westminster Abbey, the number of watchers exceeded the number of listeners. The real challenge on the opening night of commercial TV in 1955 was met with the tragic fire and death of Grace on the Archers. Further competition from independent radio in the 70s and 80s brought changes at the BBC and more recent times have seen a resurgence of interest and a rise in the listening audiences.

Throughout the talk we heard many excerpts of the different events on high quality digitally enhanced recordings which brought back many memories and tingles in the backs of many necks. The atmosphere created by Winston Churchill's broadcasts was palpable and it was interesting to note that he celebrated the end of his item by smoking a cigar from which he tapped off the ash onto one or other of the microphones in front of him. One was called "Hitler" and the other "Mussolini" and which ever one was most out of favour at the time got the ash!! Churchill said that he did not need introducing and always spoke alone and was never interviewed.

The question time covered many of the old favourite programmes and soon theme tunes were being sung plus shouts of "Wakey Wakey" and similar catchphrases. Peter was able, thanks to his extensive knowledge and with his vast collection of copies of the Radio Times, to answer all the queries except one – "When did the Wireless become the Radio and why?" However, everyone had their own ideas but no one agreed!!

The Speaker at our next meeting will be the writer and photographer, John Miles, whose subject is, "Camera Obscurer" (sic...) Scenes of Dorset., to be given on Friday 11th March.

Varieties of deer in the woodlands, buzzard and sparrow hawk overhead, seldom seen species of plant on the ground and a thriving insect world at ankle level can also be discovered here.

Independent visitors are welcome at any time and our dedicated visitor centre is a great starting point with information, maps and guides available to make the most of your outing. Our conservatory cafe's selection of light lunches and delicious cakes is sure to sustain or refuel even the most adventurous of you!

A year round range of courses is also on offer at Kingcombe for you to discover the exceptionality of the area and its wildlife.

The highlight for March is Dr. Karin Mew's 'Sense of Place' from the $11^{\rm th}-13^{\rm th}$. Karin will discuss the history of the Centre and the area itself and why it is such an important 'time capsule'; its preservation crucial. This discussion will act as a springboard into themed sessions; including community ties, dislocation, banishment and emigration and the sources which provide this information. For example, you will be shown the ways William Barnes and Thomas Hardy capture a sense of place in their literary works. Other sessions will focus on the themes of rootlessness and displacement. Karin will consider with you the $17^{\rm th}$ century Dorset pilgrims who went to New England and the enforced evacuations of Milton Abbas in the $1780{\rm s}$ and Tyneham in 1943. Worth Matravers will feature as a case study of a Dorset village where locals can no longer afford to live. The weekend will provide much interest and opportunities for discussions as well as time to relax, study the sources independently and enjoy the sense of place Kingcombe provides.

The children in Eggardon, that is the 9,10 and 11 year olds, helped by making the Christingles for the Family Service at Puncknowle. This has become an annual event in school and the children do so enjoy making them ... more because they are allowed to eat the left overs I think ... no waste there!

As part of the National Farmhouse Breakfast week we served a healthy breakfast to all those children who wanted one after parents and friends joined us for a special assembly. Our Breakfast Club also had a special morning where they all became inventors or writers. Joni wrote:

All the children took part in the RSPB Big School's Birdwatch down in the Discovery Area. On the recording sheet they were asked to circle the greatest number of each species seen together at the same time. The cold, dull day kept most birds sheltering in the hedgerows, making identification difficult and many bypassed us by flying overhead but sadly could not be included in the survey. However, despite the difficulties, the children spotted eleven different species, the most at any one time being:

Blackbird 1 Blue tit 2 Bullfinch 2
Carrion crow 2 Chaffinch 1 Coal tit 2
Dunnock 3 Great tit 2 Robin 1
Greater Spotted Woodpecker 1 Long-tailed tit 1

This was a lovely experience for the children, some of whom had never been birdwatching before. One pupil searching the sky shouted out 'blackbird' even though it was a crow! Let's hope he knows the difference now. Thanks to Mrs Stazicker for organising this.

The children in Eggardon have now started their swimming sessions at the Leisure Centre where they will be able to improve their skills in the water over the next few weeks. It is hoped that all the children will be able to easily swim 25 metres by the end of these sessions .. even those new pupils who have not been able to build up their confidence in our pool during the summer months.

Both Chesil and Bredy children are having workshops with Weymouth Outdoor Education, either here on site or visiting the centre. It is a marvellous opportunity for the children to gain confidence in map skills as well as physical activities. Some of the younger children liked making an island and then drawing a map while others remembered the

communication signs used by scuba divers. Many of the younger children thought it was very 'grown up' to be allowed to use the special orienteering staples when finding their way around the school grounds.

The whole school took part in the 'Sign2Sing' event where groups all around the country will be singing and signing 'I'd like to teach the world to sing' as part of a Guinness World Record attempt ... we do not yet know how many took part but hope it will be the largest.

Major Premise: Sixty men can do a piece of work sixty times as quickly as one man.


Minor Premise: One man can dig a posthole in sixty seconds; therefore Conclusion: Sixty men can dig a posthole in one second.







ST JAMES THE LEAST OF ALL

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from 'Uncle Eustace:

On how to deflect those staff appraisals

The Rectory St. James the Least of AU

My dear Nephew Darren

So, your vicar has introduced staff appraisal for all the officers who work for your church, including yourself. It seems a very dangerous innovation; as far as I am concerned: ministry is only successful when parishioners have no idea what the clergy get up to.

I imagine that he will look at the number of services you take in a year. Funerals can only be increased if you resort to murder, which is likely to be frowned on - although I have often been sorely tempted during endless church council meetings. Perhaps if you take a flask of water wherever you go and if you find a baby unattended, you could resort to a spontaneous baptism. That would get your numbers up, even if returning mothers may marvel at the highly localised and brief shower that seemed to have taken place over the pram.

He is bound to want to see congregations increasing. Get your youth group to make cardboard cut-outs to place strategically in the pews, or maybe some of the local dress shops could loan you their mannequins for the day - preferably clothed, or it may make newcomers think that nudity is an essential part of worship at your church. That would be a shame if it discouraged them, but even worse if it encouraged others. With the electronic equipment your church has, holograms projected around the church would surely not be impossible; that way, it would look even more lifelike if the equipment made their heads appear to droop in sleep during the sermon.

Visiting targets are easily increased. Compile a list of when parishioners will be out and call on those days; a card through their letterbox will prove to your vicar that you were there. Should they happen to be in, mention that you are collecting for the fabric fund or that you want to discuss their prayer lives and they will immediately find a reason why they must excuse themselves for an important appointment. You are then free to move on to clock another visit.

And that brings me to your prayer times. There is a fine line between silent meditation and peaceful sleep. If you learn to take those 15 minute post-lunch naps in a kneeling position, they can then be logged as devotion, thus increasing your daily total. Trying to prove the effectiveness of your prayer life by claiming coincidences as miraculous answers may be a little presumptuous; you could just mention such things and then adopt a look that says you are far too humble to take any credit. That way, you earn double points.

But you must record everything you claim - because next year, further imagination will have to be applied to quantify another year of breathless success.

Ash Wednesday, 9h March there will be a service of Holy Communion at St Mary's, Burton Bradstock. This will include the imposition of ashes when we have a cross in ash drawn upon our forehead, and what always feels to me the chilling words are said over us "Remember Mortal that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Another service of Holy Communion will be celebrated in the evening of that day, 7.00 pm at St Mary's, Puncknowle. The words will again be rehearsed, carrying the same reminder.

Always to be aware of mortality can become a damaging fixation, to ourselves and those around us. Always to avoid the issue can all too readily be a vain effort not to grow up from the teenage years of being indestructible, or from further back the savage, infant years of Peter Pan.

Dealing with mortality need not be a huge and fearful struggle at reconciliation with darkness. It can be the sum of many little, guite dull events; such as writing a will, taking out life insurance, telling the family about wishes for your funeral. Now I think about it, even keeping the filing system and the address book current (O mea culpa) are things that come under this heading. These are little chores, almost nothing in themselves, which can be almost unnoticed moments of resolution, help to ease worry.

But to settle the soul in joy, to bring hope to one's own loss and light to the darkening day, that will take another kind of huge leap, or another series of little actions in tiny increments of courage. The huge leap can be a moment of great revelation in a foretaste of glory, leaving behind it an

assurance that no worldly fear can overcome. The small increments, almost nothing in themselves, are the prayer, quiet, stillness and peace which by a strange spiritual twist lead us away from grimly morbid obsessions with darkness to a deeper joy in light.
