He has said that he would like to do the baptism and confirmation service on the beach, and so it might also become a kind of picnic. Another thought is that if we are to start having baptisms, and we are on the beach already, why are we not using the sea?

Because, West bay or not we know how the Chesil beach shelves away, leaving a wide opportunity for a kind of "Carry on Christening" comedy moment.

Well, in case it rains, they said, or in case it is cold, leaving the rest of us, mindful of the cold wet sea, to wonder whether they were being consciously ironic, or if, in missing the point so completely they were suffering from terminal plot loss.

But for all that we may be using the sea anyway - because we can. If





Her funeral was attended by family and many old friends from the village who sang her favourite hymns, including "I danced in the morning when the world was begun." She was laid to rest in the cemetery at Burton Bradstock.



MAY YEATES lived and farmed in Swyre. Her late sister, Dora, looked after the inside work, and May the outside. May went for a stretch of 17 years without missing a milking. When I first met her

she had hurt her leg at the age of 85 lifting a sheep across a barn. She was as strong and tough as she was kind and generous; an extraordinary person whom it was a privilege to know. A woman of faith, she was in Church the Sunday before her unexpected death. Her funeral was held at her beloved Holy Trinity Church in Swyre on Friday the 15th April. Her niece and her great niece, Avril, spoke of her life. They told of her love of horses, her work on the farm, her wisdom and her ever-bubbling wit. Mourners, led by May's nephew Peter, escorted her mortal remains into the churchyard where she was buried amid great respect and many fond memories.






EVENING SONGS OF PRAISE will take place on each Sunday throughout August.

The fete committee would be pleased to hear from anyone who would like to help on the day by contacting any of the following:



Patrick Stokes, a "direct descendant of Jane Austen", got the full treatment when he addressed the Village Society, the last in the present series. Being the former Chairman of the Jane Austen Society came distinctly second. One the one hand, Patrick clearly revelled in his ancestry (who doesn't?), though, to be fair, he did say that if he were a *direct* descendant, it might hint that Jane's relationships with the opposite sex were more intimate than most would wish to acknowledge. Knowing that his grandmother's grandfather was a brother of Jane Austen, he said, had never drawn him to the literary world; as a child he had hated *Pride and Prejudice* (who doesn't? – "Ouch!").

That was a safe start, for one could *just tell* that there were literally dozens of audients who knew every word she had ever thought, let alone written. A chance trip to Bermuda with a couple of Admirals called Austen had done the trick, however, and Patrick had realized that there was something in all this Austen business, aside from literary stuff.



So we had some diverting lowdown on the family: Brother George was "not quite right";

Edward was the lucky one: being adopted by the rich Knights family, he inherited their vast Kentish estate and produced 1,000 descendants (clearly over a number of generations), though not our speaker;

Henry, who became a banker and parson, was rather witty; Francis and Charles both entered the Navy;

George looked like John Lennon (we saw some pictures of the family, though there is only one authorized picture of Jane [by her sister, Cassandra], to be found in the National Portrait Gallery).

Some say that Jane made it to Chatsworth; her accounts of the route certainly confirm the details and the Rutland Arms apparently claims that she slept there. "Jane may *not* have slept there," concluded our speaker, "but the Jane Austen Society certainly went there to eat Bakewell Tart". A series of PQs revealed much evidence of the huge depth of humour and irony with which Jane Austen was blessed, which "so readily adapts to modern media," added Stokes.

There was much of this humour and irony to be found in John Grantham's novel vote of thanks. Getting our speaker to his feet again – twice: once to iterate his exact antecedents; then to recite a tale of his appearance on a German television programme based upon "What's my Line?" And then, just when we thought it was all over, Bob Hynds sprang to his feet to implore all those present to complete the Library Questionnaires to be found in the Post Office.

In all, very eclectic; very Burton Bradstock!



SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD TEAMS

I have been asked by one of "my" villagers if I could write a piece with regard to my role as a Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) from a personal perspective. I hope the following will serve.

When first starting my role as a PCSO assigned to the Dorchester Rural West beat I thought it would be quiet and not particularly busy. Now after four years I realise how wrong I was, there are just not enough hours in the day. The area I cover is quite large and varied encompassing part of the Chesil Bank coastal area and inland areas including Cerne Valley, Frome Valley and the Maiden Newton and Martinstown areas. But I am blessed with 'my' lovely villages and villagers and I feel it is really quite a privilege to be able to 'look after' such a beautiful region.

My duties are diverse and, by necessity, fairly variable day-to-day. As well as foot patrol, which I feel I don't do enough of sometimes, dealing with anti social behaviour by any age group, gathering information from the community, dealing with abandoned and untaxed vehicles, and myriad other tasks. There are also ever increasing community engagements. These may include one to one visiting with someone, PACT (Partners and Communities Together) surgeries, PACT van visits, village events, group talks, attending multi-agency meetings with housing associations, local councillors, community workers, etc.

With regard to crime I do get quite protective when I hear of break-ins etc happening in my area. I was speaking with a gentleman the other day and we agreed that due to the fantastic area we live in we can get quite complacent about leaving buildings unlocked, items in gardens on view and so on. But there are opportunist and professional thieves out there, so please please do all you can all the time to secure your home and land. If you need any advice then do get in touch with myself or my colleagues and we will be happy to help. The various contact methods are listed below.

COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP ISSUES WARNING

Motorists, remember to secure your vehicles and empty them of valuables!

As weather improves so does the popularity of Dorset's beauty spots. With many vehicles being left in remote locations, it is important that people remove all valuable items, such as handbags, mobile phones, laptops and satellite navigations systems, from their vehicles.

Councillor Ray Nottage, Chair of Dorset Community Safety Partnership, said: "Our message is clear and the advice is simple. If you want to reduce the chances of your vehicle being targeted – while parked on driveways, roadsides, in towns and villages and particularly remote locations and beauty spots – remove **all** valuables from your vehicle and make sure it is secure."

"Often people are far too complacent and leave things like laptops, bags and cash on display in their vehicles. This leaves their vehicles vulnerable and more likely to be targeted by any would-be car criminal"

Dorset Community Safety Partnership is giving the following advice to members of the public:

Don't leave any valuable possessions in your vehicle – not even in the boot. Satellite navigation equipment is a favourite among thieves – make sure you remove the unit AND the cradle, rubbing out any sucker marks

Lock your car's doors and boot and close the windows and sunroof each time you leave it unoccupied, even when paying for petrol.

Use the security devices in your vehicle – fit an alarm if you do not have one. If your vehicle is broken into, call Dorset Police on 01202 or 01305 222222. Park in well lit and open locations.




Of the three main festivals in the Christian year, Pentecost or Whitsun is the least celebrated today.




