BEEKEEPING MONTH BY MONTH

Over the next months, Ruth and Ian Homer of Bride Valley Apiaries, Litton Cheney, are giving us an insight into the world of Bee-Keeping.



RULES AND REGULATIONS

As a food consumer, you have a right to expect that the food you purchase will be of the very highest quality. In general producers also have quality as one of their prime objectives and, in the case of honey, this is backed up by a rigorous set of regulations and standards at National, European and International level.

Up until a couple of years ago honey could, in the UK at least, only be sold in very specific quantities but we now have the opportunity to sell in whatever size containers we feel that our customers will prefer. Most beekeepers have stuck with the good old 454g (1lb) jar, but a number have adopted a 340g (12oz) jar as their standard. As with jams and marmalades, they often look like 454g, and the price is often very similar, so do be aware of what you are buying.

The International Standard is the Codex Alimentarius which, in effect, defines what honey is and what it should and should not contain. It defines the minimum content of sugars, such as fructose and glucose, maximum limits on the water content and on the sucrose content (another sugar) and, rather curiously it specifies acceptable levels of electrical conductivity. This is apparently guite an accurate measure of the naturally occurring ash content of honey (blossom honey has a low ash content compared to other honeys).

There are also a couple of ways



of determining whether the honey has been excessively heated during extraction, processing and bottling. Although most beekeepers would give you a blank look if you asked them what the diastase level or the hydroxymethylfurfural (HMF) content was of their honey, Trading Standards do analyse honey to check this from time to time!

Now we come to labelling of the honey. This is an area which sometimes causes confusion amongst beekeepers, largely because they may not be fully aware of the current regulations. There are a number of what are called "reserved descriptions" of honey; these are the only terms which can be used in order to avoid misleading descriptions. If a recognisable flower is depicted, the consumer could reasonably expect the honey to be from that source (whilst monofloral crops are readily achieved in some countries, the only one we generally see in the UK is ling heather honey). Similarly if a specific location is mentioned, other than as a brand name, the honey should be from that location.

Lastly we come to the thorny problem of veterinary medicines and pesticides. Thankfully, the Veterinary Medicines Authority (VMA) has approved very few medicines for use in honey bee colonies. Each of those which have been approved has its own maximum residue limit to ensure consumer safety and this can be checked by analysis of the honey. Anything which has not been approved should, in short, not be used.

I do hope, if you are a honey consumer (and if not, why not?) that this will have given you an insight into the measures taken to ensure a top quality product.




free concert and cream teas were served.





PACT - YOUR COMMUNITY, YOUR SAY

PACT is an acronym you may have seen on posters or notices, on the sides of police vehicles or elsewhere, but what does it actually mean? It stands for *Partners and Communities Together* and is a process, which allows the police and their partner agencies to engage

with all sections of the community. Through PACT your Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) will identify the issues that affect you. With the community and partner agencies the top three priorities will be agreed, along with how everybody can best work together to resolve them. It is important that the priorities chosen are ones that can be achieved.

Dorset is considered a safe place to live. However, not unnaturally,

communities are concerned about what happens in their local area and sometimes this can create considerable apprehension about the level of crime. Your SNT is there to identify, through you, the issues that concern your community and then work with you and partner agencies, e.g. local councils and housing associations, to address those issues. Their aim is to make every neighbourhood a place where the residents are safe and feel secure.

There are several elements to PACT. These include PACT Surgeries; PACT Public meetings, PACT Panel meetings, Virtual PACT Panel, PACT Surveys, PACT Postcards. Whatever elements are employed, the aim is to identify issues that are of concern to local residents in any given community, agree, from these, three main priorities, how they should be resolved and by whom.

A very important part of PACT is telling communities what has been done to deal with the priorities they have raised and the results. This could be provided in several ways, follow up meetings for example. Also each SNT website displays the current priorities for their neighbourhood and the work done or that will be done to deal with them.

OUR COMMUNITY PROJECT NEEDS YOU.

Please can you help our voluntary project at Thorners School? We are a very small group of families who have been working for a year now to tackle the thorns and regenerate an acre of land at Thorners School into an outdoor learning and conservation Discovery Area. The project once cleared and completed will be also available for use from the other Bridport Cluster Schools.

Last month we won the Dorset Wild Life Trusts second prize as community wildlife garden, so we must be doing something right! We have planted an orchard, funded by the Dorset AONB, a living willow Story Dome, An Edible Forest Garden, where all the plants have been donated from Freecycle. We are sowing a wild flower meadow area, building study decks and a wetlands area, butterfly and bird gardens, history and science zones, and much more.

How can you help us?

There are many ways in which we need your help. So far we have relied on word of mouth, but wanting to push the project onto its next stages,

we felt it time that the Valley know about our cause.

Firstly, we are falling short of many materials for the project, and still need paving slabs, bricks, wood, cut hazel and willow, fruit bushes, native plants, bulbs, plastic 1 litre drinks bottles, car & tractor tyres, wooden posts, broken tiles, garden tools and wheelbarrows, tree slices, sand, gravel and so much more !

Secondly if you are someone who likes being outdoors, and would like to help us develop the plans, we would love you join us - everyone welcome, any age !

Lastly, we need woodworkers to help us make structures and benches, and people who would like to try their hand at wildlife gardening too.



THE WELL

Since the cream tea in July, people have been asking: "What is the Well?"

A lot of people do not know that I have a day job. In fact, ministering in the Bride Valley is what I do in my *spare* time alongside supporting Bob as the Rector's wife, caring for my family, looking after the Rectory and its gardens, rescuing dogs, being a yoga teacher, spinnng, felt making, Godly Play and all of the other things I like to do as hobbies and interests.

My day job is licensed by the Diocese and I am answerable to The Bishop of Sherborne. I work for The Well, whose aim is to provide Spiritual Direction and Retreats, and to promote prayer in the Christian Tradition. That all sounds very worthy and posh, but what it actually means in practice is that people consult me about their life, their beliefs, hopes, dreams, sense of vocation and aspirations, as well as their challenges, struggles and problems. As we travel along my job is to ask "where is God in all this?" and to help them put together their faith and what they actually do about it in a coherent whole. In spirituality parlance it is called praxis – putting together theory and philosophy with day to day practice. I also provide quiet space and Retreats, here at the Rectory and by invitation elsewhere, training locally and in the Diocese and a storytelling technique called Godly Play.

At the moment the Well is a new and small charity. I am the only deliverer of its aims and it has very small funds. However, in time it is hoped by the Trustees that the Well will grow and help others who provide Spiritual Direction, Retreats etc. by supporting training and day to day work in this area.

Through the donations given to my work and fundraising, the Trustees

and I are hoping to grow the work of The Well. If you are interested, do talk to me and I will be delighted to respond to your enquiry.

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
