

There was an ordination service in Salisbury Cathedral on Saturday 8th of October. I was there as Rural Dean to support Shuna George who was being made a Deacon along with eight other people from around the diocese. Shuna lives in Lyme, but will be working with The Revd. Canon Andrew Evans in Bridport. He was there to do the official bit as Shuna's incumbent which meant that for me it was one of those "once in whiles" when I actually get to go to Church without having either to do or remember anything.

And so you might understand the sense of liberation I felt when right at the beginning of the service, without any notice, a single, solo clarinet began to play. The sound was thin but clear and pure across the thousand or more in the congregation. All murmuring stopped, and for all I know all breathing such was the beauty of what we heard. The simple melody swooped and pitched in unexpected turns, and yet returned to its place in perfect resolution. There was a lilt of loveliness in the air which continued to be held throughout the service until right at the end. When the great words had been said, the commissions given and the big singing had all been sung, the same clarinet gave to our heart the repeated melody.

The point of all of which is to say that I have misunderstood all my life the expression 'clarion call." I had assumed it was to do with a fanfare of horns, blasting trumpets, bold as brass summoning attention and gathering people for the great purpose of some noble cause. Now I know that the clarion call as of the old fashioned clarinet is gentle and lovely, quiet, modest, and gentle on the soul to the point that one cannot help but follow.

The village of Burton Bradstock was in shock at the death of young **JAMES THORNER**; the circumstances of which I will not burden the heart to repeat. His funeral, on 7th October was held at St Mary's Church in the village, following which there was a ceremony at Weymouth crematorium.

The Church was full to overflowing with members of James' extensive family. friends from the village and from the learning base at Beaminster school, and neighbours who gathered to grieve him. Heartfelt tributes were bravely given in his memory in speech, song and poetry. The prayers were led by the Revd David Harknett, the chaplain of Beaminster school. It is hard to imagine how an occasion can be at the same time grand, dignified and unutterably sorrowful, but so it was.

The funeral of the late **DOREEN MAY PRINT** was held in St Mary's Church, Puncknowle on Thursday 13th October. Doreen came to live in the village some 17 years ago with her mother, Lily.

They arrived from Newbury where Doreen had been a headteacher of an infant school. She was one of the founders of the village art group, an accomplishment in which she had talent. She delighted in cycling, and with friends explored large areas of the country, including Scotland and Ireland.

In latter years, following Lily's death at the age of 102, Doreen began to lose her memory of things about her and her grip on her ability to live alone. She moved to Broadwindsor House, and died there at the age of 95.

She had no immediate family. Mr John Lavender, a cousin, led those who gathered to mourn her. After the service she was borne from the Church she knew so well and the village she loved to Weymouth crematorium.

May they rest in peace, and rise in glory

"You, too, can become a Creative Wildlife Photographer," according to David Boag, speaker at the first night of our new season. "And you don't even need an expensive camera or lighting equipment" (though surely it must help). No more meter readings of sky, shade and shadow, David maintains that anyone these days can point and shoot with a digital camera and get marvellous results, as long as you use a little imagination and look deeper into the scene you are capturing.

David's first book "The Kingfisher" was published in 1982 and 17 more books have followed, ranging from puffins, the wild coast, the quiet garden and the changing river, to a series on the wildlife and natural beauty of quarries. His hobby became his passion, so he gave up his first career and became a professional wildlife photographer, not seeking fame or celebrity on TV, but preferring to remain behind the scenes, writing books, making educational DVDs and running tutorial workshops for photography enthusiasts who already have a basic knowledge, but wish to develop their creative skills.

He loves natural history in every shape and form and showed us magnificent photos of ladybirds, a wood mouse, a turtle swimming off the Great Barrier Reef in Australia (taken with a simple £80 undersea camera), a duckbilled platypus, a sand lizard, an oyster catcher, rainbow lorikeets and galahs (which he describes as "parroty jobs"), an otter and so much else. He reckons British and European wildlife is the most difficult to photograph, whereas American bald eagles just gaze down on you and follow your every move – David had used his wife to illustrate this point and luckily the giant bird had not swooped down on her, though it would have made an exciting photo, I suspect. His close-up of a dozing male lion, and his leopard with kill high up in the safety of a tree demonstrated his versatility and range of subject, and he has led exciting, stimulating and thrilling safari trips to Kenya, Tanzania, Zambia and Zimbabwe (we know, we went with him a couple of times). He

also loves flowers and chooses the west coast of Scotland as his favourite area of outstanding scenic beauty. His enthusiasm, exuberance and passion were lively, boisterous, entertaining and extremely noisy and, for once, hearing aids did not have to be adjusted (and perhaps could even be turned off) as he could surely be heard as far away as the village green. These days David can be found giving regular lectures on cruise ships, and the Saga fleet is his favourite. As he slowly approaches retirement, he says he is thoroughly enjoying becoming a grumpy old man. How refreshing to meet a man who actually admits he is!





According to Farmers weekly the top 5 most stolen items are, Tools, Ouad Bikes, Oil and Diesel, Tractors and Metals. 

BEEKEEPING MONTH BY MONTH

Over the next months, Ruth and Ian Homer of Bride Valley Apiaries, Litton Cheney, are giving us an insight into the world of Bee-Keeping.



NOVEMBER SURVIVAL

As the nights get colder we begin to think about how our bees will survive the winter. As with most creatures, it is not the cold which will kill them but the damp so we must make certain that there is adequate ventilation to prevent condensation build up. However, providing ventilation does create a risk that the hive will not be weather-proof – a delicate balance has to be achieved.

Whilst the queen will continue to lay eggs throughout the winter, except for the very coldest period, the rate of egg laying is dramatically lower than at the height of the season. This means that the majority of the bees in the colony during the winter are bees which were produced during the autumn. They will live much longer than summer bees (who only live

for around 6 weeks) largely because they have a much reduced work regime – there are few if any flowers so there is no foraging to be done and, as fewer eggs are being laid, the brood feeding and rearing duties are also much reduced.

A typical colony of bees, which may contain as many as 60,000 individual bees during the summer,

will see the population reduce to around 15,000 by the middle of November and then to 10,000 or fewer by the end of January. This reduction in numbers is a careful balance between having enough bees to keep the colony warm and rear enough brood yet not having so many that the food stores run out before the end of winter. Whilst the outside temperature may be showing negatives on the thermometer, bees maintain their temperature by clustering within the hive and they



keep the temperature of the cluster somewhere in the range 20°C to 30°C, the actual temperature being regulated by the tightness of the cluster. At the centre of the cluster will be a little brood (eggs which develop into larvae and then pupate before emerging as a full adult bee) which will be maintained at around 35°C which is the optimum brood

development temperature. Honey bees are, arguably, amongst nature's best heating and air conditioning engineers as, in addition to regulating temperatures to within 1° C, they can also regulate the humidity inside the hive to within 0.5%.

During the winter, colonies of bees can be susceptible to attack by various pests including mice, green woodpeckers and even blue tits. Mice, if they can get into a hive, clearly enjoy the warmth but can also destroy brood combs in the process of making their nests. Woodpeckers have been known to penetrate the sides of beehives (causing

significant damage) in search of a tasty meal and blue tits have been known to tap on the hive entrance to attract the attention of the guard bees. When they do come out to see what is happening the blue tits swoop on them to enjoy a mid-winter snack. And so we do all we can to prepare our colonies for winter by providing a weather-proof and, hopefully, pest proof environment the rest we leave to the bees! Fortunately, we can report that in recent years we have not lost a single colony in the winter - long may it continue that way.

REMEMBRANCE: Cenotaph


Every year, on Remembrance Sunday, the television will show pictures of the Queen, politicians and those who have served in the armed forces at the Cenotaph in Whitehall. They stand in silence for 2 minutes to honour those who have given their lives for others.

But do you know what the word 'cenotaph' means? It comes from two Greek words 'kenos' meaning empty and 'taphos' which is a tomb. The cenotaph is a monument to people whose bodies are somewhere else. 




