On 28th May the Churches in the area remember their ancient lovalties at the Archdeacon's visit ancient loyalties at the Archdeacon's visitation - properly speaking a visitation court.

In the same way that medieval Kings went on procession round the country, the Archdeacons pay a series of visits to Churches in their area, to which they summon newly elected Churchwardens to attend and pay court. The Churchwardens are given instructions by means of a charge, and then they are asked to swear to uphold their office for the coming year.

Nobody wears armour, though the Diocesan Registrar turns up in a wig and gown looking very legal. Nobody bows the knee or kisses swords or otherwise pretends to be on a Hollywood film set, but for all those deficiencies, the vows are properly made and seriously undertaken.

Churchwardens, notionally are elected by everyone in the Parish. In times not so very long gone by they were responsible for the relief of the poor. They may have overseen the work of a Parish school, looked after alms housing for the elderly of the Parish.

and in some cases a local hospital.

Nowadays much of those former roles have been taken on by the state, and Churchwardens for the most part do Church things; being responsible with the Clergy and the P.C.C. for the buildings and churchyard, for worship in Church, fellowship in the congregation and Christian service in the community.










ST PETER'S, CHURCH Church Tower

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BEEKEEPING MONTH BY MONTH

Over the next months, Ruth and Ian Homer of Bride Valley Apiaries, Litton Cheney, are giving us an insight into the world of Bee-Keeping.



TAKING THE FIRST CROP

After the frenetic activity within the hive over the last three months with the colony population more than quadrupling between February and May, beekeepers like to see a return for all of their efforts ... or more particularly the efforts of their bees. It has been a delicate balancing act for the bees throughout this period; they have had to make sure that, when the weather is good enough for there to be pollen and nectar available, they maximise the collection of these substances but at the same time ensure that there are sufficient bees "at home" to tend the brood nest and keep it warm. Pollen is used to provide the protein necessary to developing bees whilst nectar is their source of carbohydrate but neither are fed directly as they are prepared into a more digestible form by the nurse bees (these are young bees who have not yet developed into foragers) for feeding to the brood.

And so, May is usually the month in which the first honey crop is extracted from the hives. I sometimes wonder whether we should make more of the new season's honey, rather like when Beaujolais nouveau enters the shops in November but, in truth, the new season's honey is already ripe and perfect when it is sold whereas the BN hardly deserves the title wine at that stage.

Honey extraction will be described in more detail in the July issue - it can be a tedious and sticky job and is said to be the most significant reason for beekeepers giving up beekeeping (possibly also the major cause of marriage breakups in beekeeping households!!)

In this area, the nectar which makes up the spring honey crop will be gathered from a variety of sources. Blackthorn (the bushes that sloes grow on) and related prunus species make a significant contribution as do, flowering currant, apple, pear, gooseberry and dandelion. Pollen is gathered from a variety of species such as willow, hazel and hawthorn and this year we have seen some stunning displays of celandine which are also a good pollen source. After a rather indifferent winter, the second half of March saw day time temperatures well above average which encouraged many of these flora to make a rapid and, in some cases, a rather early appearance. That the night time temperatures were often near to zero was of concern on several fronts. Firstly, it kept ground temperatures low which can restrict nectar yields and secondly the bees needed to consume more carbohydrate to maintain body temperatures.

Although many of the modern varieties of oil seed rape are said to be

self pollinating, as long as they are still nectar producing, honey bees will seek this crop out and work it eagerly. The presence of honey bees will considerably improve the pollination rate which, in turn, can lead to better quality and quantity yields from the crop.



In general the early season crop is lighter in appearance and tends to granulate (ie. set) more rapidly due to a high proportion of glucose sugar in the nectars collected. Oil seed rape can granulate so quickly that it can present an extraction problem for the beekeeper. As the season progresses then so we see the nectars gathered by the bees begin to contain a higher concentration of fructose which enables the honey to remain liquid for longer. These later season honeys also tend to have a more golden appearance than the early season ones.

The difficulty for the beekeeper is that as well as being a bee handler, biologist, botanist, woodworker and marketing specialist, he has also to be a weather forecaster. As the spring crop begins to dwindle, he has to decide just how long it will be before the summer crop is upon us and then make certain that sufficient stores are left for the bees to ensure that they will not starve before the summer crop arrives. Several times in recent years we have encountered beekeepers whose bees have starved at the height of



ST JAMES THE LEAST OF ALL

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from 'Uncle Eustace:' On how maintaining the churchyard can lead to turf wars

> *The Rectory St. James the Least*

My dear Nephew Darren

Consider yourself fortunate that your churchyard consists of no more than a small paved area, and that keeping it tidy requires ten minutes of picking up discarded takeaway boxes on Sunday morning. Our four acres of grass and randomly placed gravestones absorbs a large portion of the time and energy of half the parish.

By getting different people to adopt sections of the churchyard, the hope was that an element of competition would be introduced; Major Rutherford would never let Admiral Crompton's section look tidier than his and the local farmers would want to show the amateurs that they know far more about land maintenance.

Sadly, human nature has got in the way – as it invariably does. Miss Timmins has declared her section a nature reserve, so that the cuddly field mice and darling hedgehogs have somewhere to live in. This now means that crossing from her patch to the next feels like crossing from Kew gardens to the Amazon rainforest. Two feet high grass and a profusion of dandelions give way to manicured lawn with any weed daring to pop its head above the parapet being beheaded in seconds. Miss T is toying with erecting a fence round her plot, to keep her dear furry friends safe, and Sir Horace is threatening to have it electrified, to make sure they do not defile his grass billiard table.

Mr Tremble, a retired health and safety officer, whose wellmeaning advice on avoiding accidents is such a burden, is applying to have all the gravestones on his patch levelled, so that no one could be killed by having a fall on them. The fact that this has never happened in 600 years, seems an irrelevance to him. On the other hand, his neighbour spends summer evenings painting his stones with sour milk in order to encourage lichen. Mr Tremble's warning that some lichens can be quite poisonous have so far fallen on deaf ears.

A local farmer, who maintains the boundary walls, generously planted cherry trees all round the perimeter; not only for their looks in Spring, but so that the birds would have somewhere to roost. Sadly, Lady Lipton, while resting from maintaining her plot, tends to shoot them while she smokes her briar pipe. The only area which no one dares criticise surrounds the mausoleum of the Luscombes, maintained by the gardening staff of the present Lord. It contains such a collection of rogues and miscreants that parishioners fear their anger at being disturbed may even cross the divide of death.

I hesitate to admit it, but the thought of an area of concrete with a few pizza boxes scattered round does at times hold a certain attraction.

CHRISTIANS FLEE SUDAN

Thousands of Southern Christians have been fleeing Sudan since the government removed their citizenship rights last year after the South voted to secede. Last month, Khartoum set a deadline of 8 April for all people of Southern origin (who are mainly Christian and mainly African) remaining in the strongly Islamic and Arab Sudan either to leave the country or to be treated as foreigners.


Many of those entering South Sudan are taking shelter in camps set up for returnees from the North and elsewhere. In the Hai Salam camp in Malakal, people are living in desperate conditions. They lack proper shelter, medicine, food and clean water. Every day the women have to walk two hours each way to collect water from the River Nile.

Families are seeking help from the Church in South Sudan, but it is overwhelmed by the need. Barnabas Fund is helping by providing emergency supplies, including sorghum (grain), mosquito nets, blankets, water drums and cooking pots. It costs approximately: £10 to feed one person for a month; £40 to supply a family with plastic sheeting; £50 to equip a family with essential items including jerry cans and cooking pots; and £70 for water storage per family.

As Dr Patrick Sookhdeo, International Director of Barnabas Fund, said: "South Sudan is completely overwhelmed by the influx of people effectively forced out of Sudan. The Church in the South is doing all it can to extend Christian love and practical support to the thousands of families entering the




