
Following the service in Church a ceremony was held at Weymouth crematorium. John's ashes will be laid to rest in the churchyard of St Mary's at a later date.



PARISH COUNCIL

ROADS TO BE SALTED/GRITTED BY WDCC IN THE EVENT OF SNOW/ICE

In the event of icy roads this winter, the West Dorset District Council has committed itself to keeping various roads fit for driving. As main routes it will keep the A35 and the B 3157 clear. In order to give Puncknowle drivers access to the B3157 the road though Swyre up to the junction with Looke Lane, by the village hall, will be treated.

For those wishing to take a more direct route to the A35 the WDDC will also cover a single 'artery route:'

Rectory Lane to the T junction with Litton Lane Turn right along Litton Lane to Litton Cheney Through Litton Cheney to Long Bredy Left at Long Bredy to Littlebredy

At the V junction bear left (Longlands Lane) to A35.

This still leaves areas of Puncknowle with roads not covered by the WDDC plan which will need to be driven along in order to reach the cleared routes. In an attempt to cover this the Parish Council has called forward and stored sufficient salt for the needs of Puncknowle and West Bexington (Swyre is covered by the WDDC Plan but we have salt in reserve to be used as necessary).

Just having salt is not sufficient. People to spread it are required. Accordingly, the likely trouble spots in our villages have been identified and volunteers living by each of these trouble spots have taken charge of a sufficient quantity of salt to cover 1000sq m of road (or numerous coverings of a smaller, problem, area). There are ten such locations in Puncknowle and six in West Bexington. Re-supply of salt, as needed, can be achieved within two hours.



We were not expecting to hear about two world records, two poets and some special "gnashers" as he explained about the different size and design of railway carriages necessary for the high speed line which is capable of taking trains at 186 mph.

Much of the construction of the first section of the line up from the coast was relatively straight forward, but the process of threading the new line through the two M25 carriageways was an engineering and logistical triumph. The London end of the line is mostly in tunnels but then arrives at St Pancras at first floor level.

The station was badly damaged in both wars and threatened with closure in the 1960s. A campaign to save it led by the poet John Betjeman, whose statue now greets travellers, was successful and the building now has a Grade I listing. The restoration process has been exemplary as has the integration of a modern extension which more than doubles the size of the station.

The original construction in 1860 involved the building of what was then the largest unsupported arched roof in the world and necessitated the removal of part of a graveyard containing some 8000 bodies. Thomas Hardy as a young architect was involved with this process and later wrote a poem entitled "The Levelled Churchyard" clearly inspired by his experiences.

The new extension required the removal of a further 1400 bodies including that of a Roman Catholic Archbishop who was the owner of a splendid set of porcelain and gold sprung false teeth which were described as the "cutting edge technology" of their age!! His body has now been re-buried in a monastery in France and the teeth taken to the British Museum.

The splendid hotel which is part of the station complex has also been restored and the whole area, including a circulation space which links across to Kings Cross, has been regenerated.

The transformation has been inspirational and merits a visit whether you are travelling by Eurostar or are simply curious. You will be able to enjoy what is described as the "Longest Champagne Bar in the World"!!

Richard kindly donated his speaker's fee to the charity known as "The Railway Children" which helps runaway or abandoned children throughout the World, particularly those who live around railway stations.

BEEKEEPING MONTH BY MONTH

Over the next months, Ruth and Ian Homer of Bride Valley Apiaries, Litton Cheney, are giving us an insight into the world of Bee-Keeping.



JANUARY 2012:

KEEPING EVERYTHING IN ORDER

I was once told, many years ago, in my early beekeeping days, that you should spend the maximum amount of money that you could possibly afford when buying beekeeping equipment as it could last you a lifetime. That's pretty good value as, with the exception of a marriage license, I can't think of anything else that can give you 40 years or more of continuous pleasure for a single capital outlay. But of course, as with a marriage, continuous investment of time and care is needed for your beekeeping equipment to continue to be fit for purpose.

Although various beekeepers are experimenting with newer materials such as polystyrene, it remains the case that the vast majority of beehives in the UK are made of wood. In general, cedar is used as it is more durable than many other woods but even so, joints sometimes need attention and, unfortunately, the unwarranted attention of green woodpeckers to beehives can result in more major repairs being needed.

Beekeepers also need to be on their guard against the various diseases which can affect honey bees and the winter is one of the best times to act against them. Spare brood boxes and supers (these are the boxes which make up the body of the hive) can be scraped down to remove any build-up of wax or propolis (the resinous substance with which

bees weatherproof the inside of their hives), and then "flamed" with a gas torch to kill any bacteria which may be present. Old combs may have been removed from the hive during the summer and the wax removed from the frames. Winter is the time to clean up those frames and put new wax foundation (a very thin sheet of wax embossed with the shape of the cells) into them. When spring comes, this will enable more old combs to be removed (thus reducing the disease risk) and replaced with new foundation. Surprisingly, this new foundation also makes an effective contribution to

swarm control as it gives the young wax building bees something useful to do in the hive and diverts their attention from making swarming preparations!

Cleaning and repairing equipment is a practice which conforms to the law of diminishing returns and so, each year, we "retire" some of our equipment which has reached heritage status and replace it with new. This means that there is always some ongoing cost – last year we replaced the hive stands in one apiary (£400+), bought new roofs for 4 hives (£200) whilst new frames cost a further £80. New honey bottling equipment cost £80 and wax foundation cost around £60 though we keep this cost to a minimum by recycling and exchanging as much wax as we can.

We also need to clean, tidy and re-arrange the bee equipment shed every year or so in order that we have a chance of finding things when we need them – and unfortunately, that is a job that needs doing this winter (a couple of days each if we put our minds to it!). Each item is cleaned, disinfected and repaired before being returned to the shed for stacking. At this stage, there are always more repairs than I remember. So it inevitably takes a lot longer than planned.

Lastly, we try to plan the forthcoming season. What do we want to achieve, what are the priorities, what apiary sites are we intending to use and are there any repairs or maintenance needed at these sites? Each year is different as we sometimes concentrate on rearing new queens whilst in other years we focus on honey production or raising new colonies of bees to get the almost continual supply of new beekeepers up and running. Whatever we do, there is never a dull moment.

On parish accounts, teapots and Labrador retrievers

My dear Nephew Darren

Your annual accounts - all 146 pages, bound in their plastic covers and laid out in faultless detail - are really most impressive. I was rather envious to note you have a clergy 'discretionary fund'; were I given such a thing, my cellar of claret would improve immeasurably - although that is perhaps the reason why I am not given one.

The size of your office expenses makes me wonder if you have a staff rivalling that of the European

Community. I suppose that at least you are doing your bit for job creation. Our dear Miss Marigold, who spends two hours a week randomly filing pieces of paper, mistyping rotas and failing to re-order stationery, is only rewarded by being the first to find out who are booking marriages and having their babies baptised - and if they do not happen in that order, that will be another piece of information remembered for future use. All this is information beyond the price of jewels in village communities.

Our accounts have more by way of charm than they do of accuracy, generally consisting of one sheet of handwritten paper. There are only ever three copies for circulation, as that is the limit of Colonel Denster's carbon paper. It seems to be an unalterable tradition that they never balance, until we find the following year that the missing £20 was found months later under the teapot on the mantelpiece. One footnote to this was the occasion when the Colonel suspected an unaccountable £5 had been eaten by his Labrador. Our greatest expenses by far are categorised as 'miscellaneous', which is a catch-all for everything that our treasurer is unable to recall where it really went.

The thousands paid on church maintenance and diocesan fees are nodded through without comment - but if the money spent on Easter lilies or packets of tea for the Summer Fete increases by anything more than 50 pence, there will be much agonised debate and speculation about whether this is an indication of money laundering.

I see that your accounts were professionally audited. Fortunately, it does not matter too much about the accuracy of our own, as I have an arrangement with our auditor who lives in the village: if he refuses to sign them off, then I refuse to baptise his grand-children.

The tree was a hazel branch that he lit when the fire at the monastery had gone out. There is even the story of his meeting the wizard, Merlin, who is said to have become a Christian and been baptised by Mungo. Mungo died around 612AD and his tomb is in the crypt of Glasgow Cathedral.





CREATIVE OPPORTUNITIES FOR CHURCHES WITH YOUNG CHILDREN



The first years are critical, a pivotal time when children have powerful curiosity, exuberance for learning, and make strong connections through their experiences. This is also when a child's attitudes, values and perceptions are formed: "Do I belong here?", "Am I good enough?" Our grasp

of how children learn has developed

sharply in recent years.

Schools constantly review their approach, but churches frequently employ antiquated practices. Many alienate children because our methods don't meet their needs, and because we don't realise that some of the strongest messages are hidden. Without knowing it. we are inoculating our children against church. The intention is to challenge churches about their children's work; to inform children's workers about the latest research; and to provide practical ideas. The authors suggest ways of developing music and movement, creativity and touch, so that children's experience of church is positive, enriching and intriguing.
