GOD SAVE OUR GRACIOUS QUEEN.

There can be very few national anthems that are a prayer, but this is certainly one, praying for her Majesty's long life and her saving. Victorious rhymes with glorious in a crowd pleasing sort of a way, interjected by the intention for her being happy. which is nice, before again the bidding "God save the Queen."



Prayers do not have to be great poetry. God, even if he speaks English as a first language which is doubtful, will not count syllables, test rhymes, count metre or even spring or unspring rhythms. Prayers do not have to be in a correct form of words. It is too confusing to speak of him as Thou and Thee in current verbiage. Thou who visualisest, or who utilisest, or who emonitoreth and evaluatest flow in a way that even Shakespeare might have struggled to set running freely.

The point of prayers is their sincerity. We do not lie to friends or family. We should not lie to strangers or even enemies. We should not say prayers with our fingers crossed behind our back. So the best thing is to say what we mean simply, and then mean it.

The opposite is also true, because the next point of prayers is to say them. Even prayers unmeant carry some intent, and are better than no prayers at all. I know this because my father taught me how to sing "God save the Queen" long before I knew who she was. At the village regatta after



the crowd had danced up and down the long evening road and chaotically in and out of peoples' houses, I was told to stand upright and not to fidget, which I did while the grown ups sang to the last of the brass band. I did not know what it meant. There was no sincerity in it, but there would be one day.



JOBS TO DO

Plant out annuals and summer bedding and thin direct sowings of hardy annuals. Sow seeds for next year's hardy biennials such as sweet william, wallflowers, foxgloves. Cut back foliage of spring bulbs. Plant out courgettes, sweet corn, runner beans. Use insect-proof mesh or horticultural fleece to preent carrot fly attacking carrots. Harvest first and second early potatoes - tubers should be ready when plants begin flowering. Take softwood cuttings of many deciduous shrubs.

Take Care During The Summer

With the summer period the population of the area is increased by holiday visitors to the area, these numbers could be significantly increased this year due to the Olympic sailing events at Weymouth and Portland. Many of these visitors and locals too will be out and about, parking at various beauty spots, parks, walks etc within the area. So it is perhaps a good time to just be reminded of a few precautions such as:

- Ensuring vehicles are securely locked before leaving them.
- Not leaving anything on display in your car.
- Removing all your possessions whilst vehicles are unattended. This includes vehicle registration documents, cash, chequebooks, mobile phones, satellite navigation equipment and i-Pods and if possible take any stereo equipment out.
- Use a mechanical immobilizer like a steering lock if you do not have an electronic immobilizer fitted.
- Locking wheel nuts can prevent your wheels from being stolen.
- A professionally installed alarm can be effective in deterring thieves.

Equally when at home:

Always ensure doors and windows are locked when leaving your home unattended however briefly, or when you are outside in your garden for example.

- Try not to leave valuable or important items on show when you have windows and doors left open.
- Beware of bogus callers, check identities of anyone coming to your door ask for ID card and if you are unsure do not open the door, or keep it on a chain when you do. Get a number that you can call to check them out. Do not let anyone into your home that you are unhappy about. If you are still worried, refuse them entry and if you feel safer doing so phone 101 for Dorset Police and ask for their advice.

BURTON BRADSTOCK VILLAGE SOCIETY

At our April meeting, Dr Lucy Goodison, ably assisted by her husband Carlos gave us a fascinating talk entitled "Holy Trees, Myths and Legends"

Lucy, an Archaeologist and Author, lives in Bridport and as well as being an expert on Minoan Tombs has amongst her many other activities given lessons in Dance Music Therapy in Holloway Prison.

With such wide ranging talents we were not surprised



that she could tackle the subject of sacred trees and the content of her talk was every bit as intriguing as the title. She covered a period ranging from the times of Ancient Greece to the present day and we journeyed with her throughout Europe, North Africa and the Americas.

We were shown many examples of Holy Trees often depicted in exceptional glazed tile work particularly from Spain and Portugal. They were based on visions seen by peasants usually herdsmen or shepherds of the Virgin Mary within a tree holding Jesus either as a child or after the Crucifixion. The trees quickly became places of pilgrimage where people sought guidance or healing.

Icons were placed in the trees and sometimes the Church Authorities of the day tried to remove them but they moved (or were moved) back. In many places the Church took the view "if you can't beat them – join them" and built churches around venerated trees. In one case the altar incorporated the remains of a very ancient tree.

A sacred tree grew near the village in France where Joan of Arc lived and its existence and the local beliefs were referred to in her trial but she cleverly side stepped attempts to trick her into admitting that she was such a believer.

The ancient Greek legends are full of associations between the Deities and various trees and these were illustrated in a variety of carvings and pictures.

Similar events and stories were spread around Europe and across the Atlantic. For example dead branches grew into trees again in Greece and elsewhere. Here the story of the Holy Thorn at Glastonbury is reputed to have grown from the staff of St. Joseph of Arimathea.

Holy trees often have thank offerings hung in them and they are credited with helping people in many different ways. We were encouraged to be open-minded about such happenings and beliefs.

OLYMPIC TORCH PROCESSION 12TH JULY

The Olympic Torch will be carried through Burton Bradstock on the afternoon of 12th July. It will arrive about 4.45pm and be carried by the runners through the village. From about 3.15pm there will be activities on the playing field opposite the Spa shop and the procession can be viewed from there or along the route.

There will be *no parking* anywhere along that stretch of the B3157 including in lay-bys. All residents who normally park



anywhere between the start of Barr Lane and Beach Road will be advised later where to move their vehicles for safety. All visitors arriving to watch the procession will be able to park free of charge in the top field of the National Trust car park which has kindly been made available to the community for the afternoon.

Drivers need to be aware that they will not be allowed to cross the B3157 at any time after it is closed and so they need to be in Beach Road before the closures. Parents collecting children that intend to come and watch and enjoy the festivities need to be aware of where they will park that day after school closes.



BEEKEEPING MONTH BY MONTH

Over the next months, Ruth and Ian Homer of Bride Valley Apiaries, Litton Cheney, are giving us an insight into the world of Bee-Keeping.

THE "JUNE GAP"

Tradition tells us that "the March winds and April showers bring forth May flowers" and that, despite the best efforts of climate change, still seems to be very much the order of things. But what happens then? Well, even though you may not have noticed it, there is often a dearth of flowers for the next month or so to the extent that honeybees often have no flora to forage because not all flowers are of any benefit to insect pollinators such as the honeybee.

The benefits to beekeepers of many of the highly decorative flowers seen in gardens up and down the country are limited as, in order to achieve their decorative effect, they have been bred specifically and have often sacrificed their nectaries in order, for example, to create an extra row of

petals. In the wild, plants need to attract pollinators so that fertilisation may take place and that the species continues to flourish. In the case of many of the decorative flowers and certainly the F1 hybrids, the nurseryman or plant grower has displaced nature – the plant reproduction is done by mankind.

And so, we look to the range of flowers to which honeybees in particular are attracted – mostly





wild flowers though some agricultural crops are also beneficial, and we find that mostly the spring flowers, for example, dandelions, cherry, sycamore, apple, plum and pear are all over and gone by May. Oil seed rape may hang on a little longer though many of the current varieties which are grown are claimed to be self -pollinating and not needing insect pollinators. During June there is very

little in the way of flora for any self-respecting honeybee to get excited about and they have to wait until the blackberry (in many parts of the country a major honey producer), rosebay willow herb and lime trees come into flower. It can often be well into June before any of these make an appearance.

The dilemma for beekeepers is what to do about this situation. Many of the spring flora produce a honey which is rich in glucose which causes rapid granulation; beekeepers often want to remove this spring crop as quickly as possible to avoid having to extract honey which is set like concrete. But if all of the spring honey is removed at the end of May, will the bees have enough stores remaining if they are unable to win any income during June? In a bad year, typically a summer which is cold or wet where, even if the bees choose to venture out, there is little for them to forage and starvation may not be far away. And this can have a knock-on effect as, if there is no income, the colony will reduce the rate at which they feed the queen, she in turn reduces her egg laying rate or goes off-lay altogether leading to a shortage of bees to carry on the work when the late summer flowers appear.

The solution to this problem which many beekeepers adopt is to feed their colonies during this period. We are disinclined to do this as the artificial feed, sugar syrup, can easily get mixed up with the summer nectar if it has not all been used. An alternative approach is to remove less of the spring honey, leaving some of it for the bees to survive on, and then monitor the colonies carefully to ensure that they are not approaching starvation. The objective after all is for the colonies to maintain maximum strength to take advantage of that main summer nectar flow when it comes.

The apparent changes in our weather patterns, whether due to climate change or not, reinforces the need to align our beekeeping to the environment and the weather rather than to the calendar. There is an old adage in beekeeping that the right time for the first colony inspection of the year is when the flowering currant is in full flower and another that says it should be done when one can stand in shirts sleeves for 10 minutes without getting cold. Both of these bear truth as some years it can occur in late February (as this year if you can remember it) whilst in others it happens as late as early April. All good stockmen know that livestock cannot be kept just by the calendar alone and will read the signs which our environment offers. Ruth & Ian Homer

MONSTER MUNCHIES


75 g (3 oz) margarine 3 normal size Mars Bars (thinly sliced) 3 large tea cups Rice Crispies 100 g (4 oz) chocolate cake covering (melted) Grease and line a swiss roll tin.



In a heavy based saucepan, gently melt the margarine. Add the Mars Bar pieces and stir until no lumps are left.

Take the pan off the heat and stir in the Rice Crispies – adding more if the mixture will take it. Spread the mixture in the tin and press it down evenly with the back of a spoon.


