#### **FUNERALS**

and their respective wives, Eve and June. Paul, one of her 5 grandchildren spoke of her long life and her devotion to her family. One of the hymns we sang at her request was, Now the day is over, a childrens' hymn not sung so much these days, but taking us back in musical time to a little girl in Sunday school learning to sing in the faraway days before the first world war. To be there was a privilege. To have lost her was a great and evident sorrow to the family.

On January 10<sup>th</sup>, following a ceremony at Weymouth crematorium in the morning, a thanksgiving service was held at noon. **DAVID GEORGE FULLARTON TAYLOR** was Churchwarden at Litton Cheney, a good and faithful man and a much loved and respected member of the community.

Before he and his wife, Wendy, had come to the village they worked for the B.B.C., David as producer of many of the game shows that are household names to us now. He loved gardening and adored cricket among his many enthusiasms. He was a school governor at Thorner's, a bell ringer and a moving spirit in the building and development of the Communityhall in the village.

St Mary's, Litton Cheney was full for his funeral, at which his son Andrew Taylor and his daughter, the Revd. Jo Neary spoke beautifully, amusedly, lovingly and respectfully of their Father. #### CHURCH OF ENGLAND RESPONDS

#### TO PM'S SAME SEX MARRIAGE STATEMENT

Responding to the Prime Minister's recent statement on same sex marriage, the Church of England issued the following statement:-

"It is important to be clear that insistence on the traditional understanding of marriage is not knee-jerk resistance to change but is based on a conviction that the consequences of change will not be beneficial for society as a whole. Our concern is for the way the meaning of marriage will change for everyone, gay or straight, if the proposals are enacted.

"Because we believe that the inherited understanding of marriage contributes a vast amount to the common good, our defence of that understanding is motivated by a concern for the good of all in society.

"The proposition that same-sex relationships can embody crucial social virtues is not in dispute. To that extent, the Prime Minister's claim that he supports same-sex marriage from conservative principles is readily understandable. However, the uniqueness of marriage is that it embodies the underlying, objective, distinctiveness of men and women. This distinctiveness and complementarity are seen most explicitly in the biological union of man and woman which potentially brings to the relationship the fruitfulness of procreation.

"To remove from the definition of marriage this essential complementarity is to lose any social institution in which sexual difference is explicitly acknowledged. To argue that this is of no social value is to assert that men and women are simply interchangeable individuals. To change the nature of marriage for everyone will be divisive and deliver no obvious legal gains given the rights already conferred by civil partnerships.

"We believe that redefining marriage to include same-sex relationships will entail a dilution in the meaning of marriage for everyone by excluding the fundamental complementarity of men and women from the social and legal definition of marriage.

"Given the absence of any manifesto commitment for these proposals - and the absence of any commitment in the most recent Queen's speech - there will need to be an overwhelming mandate from the consultation to move forward with these proposals and make them a legislative priority. In our view the Government will require an overwhelming mandate from the consultation to move forward with on these proposals and to make them a legislative priority.

"We welcome the fact that in his statement the Prime Minister has signalled he is abandoning the Government's earlier intention to distinguish between civil and religious marriage. We look forward to studying the Government's detailed response to the consultation next week and to examining the safeguards it is proposing to give to Churches."

Lift and divide mint plants. Start dahlia tubers into growth. Prune jasmines and late-summer-flowering clematis. Start tender perennials into growth under cover. Sow sweet peas, if not done last month, and pot up those sown in autumn

#### REGISTER FOR BROADBAND

Superfast broadband for Dorset would seem to be a year or two away so why should we worry about it now? No contractor has been appointed, so we don't know what we will get or when it will happen, but there is something you can do right NOW! Something which will help all rural internet users you, your neighbour and the whole community. Dorset County Council is running an on-line survey aimed at giving potential providers, such as BT and Fujitsu, information concerning the sort of demand for Superfast Broadband in each area around every exchange and all villages. The more people who answer this survey, the better the service we will get because the contractor will be aware of the potential demand for the Superfast service. It doesn't cost you to do this - it is a survey to determine your intentions and wishes, not a form to sign up to the new service. That will be coming from your present service provider and competition should mean it won't cost any more for a substantial improvement in speed and service. Even if you are lucky and are getting an adequate service for your needs now, think about those in our community who live in black spots and cannot get proper broadband. If we can persuade the contractors to give us all an upgrade,

they will get the greatest benefit. What you think is good now will not seem so good in a few years' time when those in the towns will have got something better and we won't. The contractor will only pass by here once, so register for yourself, your family, for your neighbour and for the Bride Valley. A visually stunning film, the Artist is set in 1920's Hollywood. George Valentin (Jean Dujardin) is the stereotypical silent movie star. When he bumps into young Peppy Miller (Bérénice Bejo) in front of on-looking press photographers, the flash bulbs



spark a hunger in the aspiring actress which drives her rise to stardom. Miller's career flourishes in the new world of 'talkies' cinema but Valentin's star wanes and his pride forces him down the road to ruin. With a little help from Uggie the jack russell, *The Artist* tells the story of their interlinked destinies.

Visually, the film is stunning – each frame is crisp and beautifully contrasted by cinematographer Guillaume Schiffman, winner of 5 Academy Awards.

#### BURTON BRADSTOCK VILLAGE SOCIETY

Despite the attractions of a meeting of Rotarians from the brown estate in Annings Lane, it was reassuring to find that there were enough bikers left in the village to produce a full house for "An Epic Motorcycle Trip by Two Upwey Women", given by Sheonagh Ravensdale and Pat Thomson at

the December meeting of the BBVS.

The pair had made a motorcycle journey through Central America, the West Coast, to Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Burma, Thailand, Laos and Cambodia. Their commentary, in couplets, and reminiscent of Psalm 119 (just as long, only more interesting and with nigh on 150 slides), held us to the last and induced a sense of timelessness, of space, and of a very long journey: many of us were soon whispering, "Where did they get their petrol?"

After Panama, they reached El Salvador, missing the eruption of a volcano by a week. In Honduras hundreds of bikers congregated to get their bikes blessed, while up the spine of Mexico, in a car park, they discovered literally millions of Monarch butterflies resembling Autumn leaves. In Xilitla was the concrete garden built by the English aristocratic nutter, Edward James, described by even Salvador Dali as "strange". Copper Canyon, bigger and deeper than the Grand Canyon, was followed by Ojo de Liebre where Gray Whales give birth.

From camping in Tokyo and a diversion to plant rice with a Korean farmer, their visit was completed by Hiroshima and Nagasaki with pictures of the ruins of the Town Hall. Korea provided an irresistible snapshot of Pat's (harmless) fall from her motorcycle.

Malaysia, they said, is the most bike-friendly country in the world; Thailand is lovely, said Sheonagh, provided you stay away from the flesh pots. They visited the site of the Bridge on the River Kwai and one of several Burmese camps housing 100,000 refugees, none marked on any official maps. Not far from the Ho Chi Minh Trail, outlines of casualties were taped to the road surface.

We were treated to a brief overview of eating-out in the various countries visited: crickets, BBQ rat, scorpions and seahorse. It was amusing to see pictures of eye-watering mechanical aids available to those using a water closet in Cambodia.

The talk raised money for Motorcycle Outreach, which enables motorcycle health workers to gain access to remote areas of rural Indonesia.

The Committee is fortunate to have two bikers amongst its members; Bourne-Taylor (Vincent-HRD) was persuaded to give the vote of thanks. He remarked that he was glad to learn that branches of the Ace Café were still to be found in remote places, that those present now knew how to park a bike on a steep hill and how to avoid having to bung a Managuan traffic cop. 





# ASH WEDNESDAY 13th February

The date of Ash Wednesday changes each year according to the date of Easter. The earliest possible date for Ash Wednesday is 4 February and the latest possible date is 10 March. So this year it is quite early.

It is called Ash Wednesday because of the church service where palm crosses kept from last year are burnt and their ashes mixed with water to make a paste. This paste is used to make the sign of the cross on peoples' foreheads.



For Christians these ashes are a symbol of being sorry for things that they have done which make God sad. It is

The mark of the ashes on the forehead shows as a sign of our commitment to Jesus Christ and God. And it reminds us that we are saved through Christ's death and resurrection.
