A FESTIVAL OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETINGS.



LAST VILLAGE SOCIETY TALK OF SEASON

London Blitz Scenes – Then and Now – by Bob Ayers

Once again Bob Ayers gave us the benefit of his extraordinary knowledge of London in a talk that was a tour de force. The subject was serious indeed - London Blitz scenes, as viewed from previously unseen police photographs, and juxta-posed with the same scenes, as photographed recently by Bob Ayers in London while on 2012 Olympics organising duties.

The pictures depicted the ghastly horror of the Blitz. But there was also a sense of hope and pride that emerged from the pictures of today – what an incredible transformation, even if not all buildings such as the 'Gherkin', the 'Cheese Grater', the 'London Eye' or the 'Wobbly Bridge' are among everyone's personal favourites.

As ever, though the subject was serious, humour wasn't far away. One police photograph from 1941, that showed flames rising near to St Pauls, included a number 15 bus. In replicating the scene today, 70+ years on, Bob wanted to re-capture the scene from the very same spot, and achieved this by finding a slot on the third floor of a particular new building. But for the photograph to provide a true comparison he felt he needed a number 15 bus to pass by in exactly the same position: after 90 minutes of tentative waiting (during which Bob, a previous Chief Inspector of Police in the City of London, stood around – camera in hand - trying not to look suspicious!) the number 15 bus duly passed by and the mission was accomplished.

Another of many asides was that when the newly built Barbican Lakes had been stocked with carp and tench in the 70's, a local ne'er-do-well introduced a pike into the lakes, and the police had to search the law books for the exact offence committed. Eventually they identified an obscure provision of one of the theft acts, and the young man was duly charged!' We're delighted to say Bob will be talking again next spring, when it is likely that he'll again achieve a new attendance record for our talks. *John Grantham.*

Dorset Fire & DISPOSABLE BARBECUES Rescue Service A FIRE HAZARD

In 2012, Dorset Fire and Rescue Service attended 241 cooking related fires; these could have been easily avoided if more people were aware of basic cooking safety. Being aware of the dangers of fire and taking preventative measures could help save the lives of you and your family. Cooking outdoors is a hazard at this time of year, **please remember:**

- When using a gas barbecue with a gas bottle, always check your gas connections with a leak detecting solution after hooking up a new bottle.
- Pay attention to the proximity of flammable materials to your barbecue. We advise you do not cook too closely to combustibles.
- When using charcoal, always check to see that there is an ash catcher in place before lighting your barbecue. Hot embers have dropped down underneath a barbecue and start a fire on the shelf or other combustible surface below.
- Do not attempt to barbecue or use an open fire when it is windy. Hot embers blown from a cooking fire can start a heath, woodland or house fire.
- Educate your children so they know that they cannot play near a barbecue. Running or playing within close proximity to a hot barbecue is an invitation for a serious injury.
- Please make sure that the barbecue is completely out before you leave it unattended.

Kate Huelin, Home Safety Manager said, "As we approach the summer months, we see a rise in fires where people have left disposable barbecues or even camp fires unattended. These then spread to gorse and heath and can be extremely difficult to fight. If you are using disposable barbecues, please make sure you extinguish them fully and dispose of them properly.

JOBS TO DO IN JUNE


Once you have harvested your peas, cut down the top growth but leave the roots to return nitrogen to the soil. Keep sowing salad vegetables. Plant out runner beans against supports, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes and sweetcorn. Plant out brassicas and protect them from birds and caterpillars Sow annual herbs like basil, parsley and coriander. Plant out pot-grown dahlias and cannas; tender summer bedding; half-hardy annuals and tender perennials in containers. Sow delphiniums, lupins and hollyhocks outside. Support young sweet pea plants; train clematis and climbing roses. If possible leave a few nettle patches as these provide essential food for the caterpillars of some of our best known butterflies

ST JAMES THE LEAST OF ALL The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters From 'Uncle Eustace:' **Beware the church microphone**

> *The Rectory St. James the Least*

My dear Nephew Darren

Despite my assurances that it was unnecessary, it was kind of you to loan us your sound equipment, so we could experience the advantages of using radio microphones in church. Your assurance that everyone would then be able to hear with absolute clarity seemed to miss the point that everyone does *not* necessarily want to do so.

I have no doubt that members of your congregation hang on to your every word, eager to make sure you remain theologically sound, but for us, those who had blissfully slumbered throughout my sermons for the last 30 years found themselves unable to filter out a single syllable.

Colonel Wainwright decided to change the start of his Bible readings from the customary, "Here beginneth.." to "Testing, Testing" before giving the microphone a good biff, which made the verger dash outside to check if yet another mediaeval gargoyle had fallen from the roof. Also, forgetting that microphones pick up asides just as effectively, his own comment to his wife in the front pew, "I thought I read that rather well", did nothing for the pride he has always cherished for his humility.

I was also not convinced that the sixteenth century workmen who had devoted the greater part of their lives reverently carving the Lady Chapel altar had intended it to support an electronic console that would have looked more at home in an aeroplane cockpit.

However, the event which finally decided us against microphones came about an hour after the service. Several of the choir boys had crept back into the church and decided to improvise a rock concert with their guitars and the mikes turned up full blast. The church exploded in a perfect cacophony of noise which panicked a horse and rider going by. The horse bolted down the road. which caused two cars to veer violently to avoid it. A recent Joint statement from The Archbishops of Canterbury and Westminster, Justin Welby and Vincent Nichols, concerning the ongoing violence in Syria:

Since the very first days of the Syrian conflict in March 2011, we have prayed as we watched in horror and sorrow the escalating violence that has rent this country apart. We have grieved with all Syrians - with the families of each and every human life lost and with all communities whose neighbourhoods and livelihoods have suffered from escalating and pervasive violence.

And ... our prayers also go with the ancient communities of our Christian brothers and sisters in Syria. The (recent) kidnapping of two Metropolitan bishops of Aleppo, Mar Gregorios Ibrahim of the Syriac Orthodox Church and Paul Yazigi of the Greek Orthodox Church of Antioch, and the killing of their driver while they were carrying out a humanitarian mission, is another telling sign of the terrible circumstances that continue to engulf all Syrians.

We unreservedly support these Christian communities, rooted in and attached to the biblical lands, despite the many hardships. We respond to the call from the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate of Antioch and all the East, and the Syriac Orthodox Patriarchate of Antioch and all the East, urging churches worldwide to remain steadfast in the face of challenging realities and to bear witness to their faith in the



power of love in this world.

We both continue to pray for a political solution to this tragic conflict that would stem the terrible violence and also empower all Syrians with their fundamental and inalienable freedoms. We also call for urgent humanitarian aid to reach all who are suffering. We pray that Syria can recapture its tradition of tolerance, rooted in faith and respect for faiths living side by side.





right when both sides weigh the same and that all are equal before the law. The sword is there to show that the good are protected and the wicked punished.


