

It is a Strange Time at the Moment

As I write this, there are still two and a half weeks to go before the Petertide Ordinations in Salisbury, yet by the time you read it I shall be your newly ordained deacon. After three years of study, and all the anticipation in the build-up to the big day, it would be easy to think that once the Ordination Service is over that's it; job done. Yet it is only another step on the journey of faith and learning that began with my baptism and which we shall continue to walk together.



We are not ordaining you to ministry; that happened at your baptism. We are not ordaining you to be a caring person; you are already called to that.

We are not ordaining you to serve the Church in committees, activities, organisation; that is already implied in your membership.

We are not ordaining you to become involved in social issues, ecology, race, politics, revolution; for that is laid upon every Christian.

We are ordaining you to something smaller and less spectacular; to read and interpret those sacred stories of our community, so that they speak a word to people today;

to remember and practise rituals and rites of meaning that in their poetry address humanity at the level where change operates; to foster in the community through word and sacrament that encounter with truth which will set men and women free to minister as the body of Christ.

We are ordaining you to the ministry of the word and sacraments and pastoral care.

My ordination marks a new phase of our journey together responding to our individual call and carrying out our respective ministries. It will at times be daunting, but as we were reminded at our final weekend of the course, "God doesn't call the equipped; he equips the called."

stalls and games and to those who gave generously of their time beforehand to organise and collect for the stalls.



DORSET COUNTY COUNCIL

is to spend £17 million in rural Dorset with contracts expected to be placed with

their supplier in August/September this year! DCC will decide who gets a share of this major investment based on how many households/businesses in each village register their interest. Time is tight, so this is almost certainly your last chance to help the village get SuperFast Broadband!

Sadly, as of 6th June, Dorset County Council reported that Burton Bradstock had only 96 registrations out of some 600 households/businesses! (Each household counts one vote). We need at least 200 for DCC to consider us seriously. Some 5% of rural Dorset will not get it as funds are limited, so we have to fight for our corner now!

Why is it important to have it? You may not think you need it now, but you will tomorrow! As technology is moving on at an ever faster rate, we will soon find it absolutely essential! Examples of use are:

- R Healthcare: for complex monitoring of medical conditions at home
- R **Education:** to enable interactive tutorials and lectures, for children as well as adults at home
- R **Communication:** to facilitate talking to friends, family, business colleagues etc. on very high quality video, with no delays
- R **Business**: for rural businesses & organisations it is also increasingly important for them.
- R **Speed**: to offer considerably faster upload speeds
- R **Entertainment**: to watch high quality films/videos e.g. Smart TVs will use the internet and will need faster & faster speeds.

And it, almost certainly, will increase the value of properties in the village as potential residents and visitors will demand it!

By the time you read this, you should have had a leaflet and questionnaire from the Parish Council through your letter box. If you haven't registered already, it is very important for the village community, and its businesses, that you do so as soon as possible. Please help to improve our chances of having the new fibre optic service installed, by registering your interest with Dorset County Council (with absolutely no commitment on your part).

- R Phone direct line to the DCC Broadband team on 01305 221 048
- R Fill in the paper questionnaire and return it to Burton Bradstock Post Office.

If you don't have a form, there are spares in the Post Office. It doesn't matter if you don't have a computer, your vote would still count. Perhaps you could get help in the Library, or from a friend to enable you to register?

At our May meeting our speakers were Chris and Heather Robinson, who open their garden 'Q' under the National Gardens Scheme. They introduced us to the history and



diversity of clematis, showing us how, with careful planning, it is possible to have clematis flowering for the full 12 months of the year.

On June 10th a group of us spent an enjoyable afternoon in Burrow Farm Gardens at Dalwood. Following a brief introduction by the owner, Mary Benger, we were able to wander among the different 'gardens' which included rhododendrons, azaleas and candelabra primulas set in glades, before completing our afternoon in the tea rooms.

The next meeting is on Monday 15th July when the subject will be 'Water Plants and Marginals' with Julie Riley from the Bride Valley Nurseries in Litton Cheney.

JOBS TO DO IN JULY

Feed, water and deadhead flowers in containers regularly. Layer and take cuttings of carnations and pinks. Plant autumn-flowering bulbs. Transplant seedlings of biennials sown earlier. Divide bearded irises. Keep harvesting vegetables as soon as they are ready, most taste better when they are young. It's not too late to sow vegetables for harvesting in autumn, e.g. lettuce, beetroot, turnips and carrots. Pick herbs regularly; sage, rosemary and thyme can be cut and hung up to dry in an airy place outdoors, e.g. a shed or garage, where they are protected from the rain. If we have a dry spell, don't forget to ensure there is water available for the birds.

ANYONE CAN DO IT

Which couldn't be said for Flt Lt Ben Plank, of the Red Arrows display team, who pushed the wrong button over Shropshire and sent out blue smoke behind him, rather than red, thus rather ruining the usual meticulously colour-coded show of red, white and blue.

- 2) **Dennis Laroux**, a US tattooist, angered three members of an all-girl chapter of Hell's Angels when he tattooed Stan's Slaves on their breasts rather than Satan's Slaves.
- 3) **Sophia Hadi** drove all the way from Leeds to Washington, Tyne and Wear, after a friend there reported hearing a rare song thrush, only

to find it was, in fact, the noise made by a fork lift truck reversing at the local Asda.

- 4) Spinach as a health food... an error in more ways than one
- 5) **Peter Crawford**'s self-defence in a New York court suffered slightly after he asked the key witness, "Did you get a good look at my face when I snatched your bag?"
- 6) **Maj Gen John Sedgwick (1813-1864)** was unimpressed by Confederate sniper fire at the Battle of Spotsylvania, "They couldn't hit an elephant at this distance!"
- **7)** Rommell decided that he could go home to celebrate his wife's birthday because Normandy was so quiet in June 1944.

- **10)** The popularity of spinach as a health food, which resulted in Popeye the Sailor Man and generations of children staring miserably at a plate bearing the canned product, resulted from a misplaced decimal point in calculations of the amount of iron in it.
- **10)** In Sonning Common, near Reading, in 2003, an unidentified motorist you know who you are collided with and knocked down the sign reading, "Sonning Common welcomes careful drivers".

Actually, to demonstrate how easy it is to err, I should mention that there are doubts about Rev Bradford's authorship of "Going but for the grace of God" (although it is true that he was burnt at the stake). But, as you will have noticed, human error is notoriously difficult to eliminate (as I might well have inadvertently illustrated).

What to do? There is no shortage of advice, from Sophocles to Einstein, about learning from them: Sir William Preece soon changed his mind about the telephone, for example. My favourite comment, however, remains this, from the late Peter Cook: "I have learned from my mistakes, and I am sure I can repeat them exactly".

ST JAMES THE LEAST OF ALL

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek eters From 'Uncle Eustace:'

On why we don't bother to lock the church

The Rectory St. James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

Since I happened to be in your area last week, I tried to call in at your church, and was sorry to find it was locked and bolted, with surveillance cameras watching me.

We tend to be a little more relaxed about matters of security. The key to the medieval lock was lost some time during Queen Victoria's reign and never replaced. How someone managed to misplace a foot long piece of cast iron, weighing about 10 pounds is a mystery. If it had fallen out of someone's pocket, it would certainly have broken their foot. Ever since, no-one has bothered with locking the door – which makes me wish our burglars last year had thought of trying it, before wasting so much energy smashing a stained glass window when they visited in the early hours one morning. On the other hand, were the key still in use, I should probably be arrested these days for carrying an offensive weapon.

As with most rural churches, keys which open just about everything in the village are hidden in various parts of the church. The vestry key is under my seat cushion, the organ key under a vase on the altar, the church hall key on top of the hymn book cupboard, and Miss Simpson's spare front door key inside the font. I have never been certain whether the latter is there for safety, or as a general invitation. I am sure someone could usefully produce a book suggesting the many places keys are likely to be found secreted in churches for the use of vergers, flower arrangers, cleaners – and thieves wanting to save themselves time and effort.

I suspect that the burdened look that many urban clergy wear is not because they are weighed down with parish troubles, but because they are obliged to carry with them a superfluity of keys needed to negotiate every door in church, hall, school and vicarage. And why is there always one for which no one has any idea what it opens?




FREEDOM


Over the centuries many men, women ... and children suffered for their beliefs. Christians were killed by other Christians who argued that their way was the right way and everyone else was wrong.
