FROM THE EDITOR

THE REVD BOB THORN 10.07.55 - 07.04.14

This edition is being put together with a heavy heart a few days after the news of Bob's tragic death. We join with those many people who were touched by his life within the valley and far beyond in sending our deepest condolences and prayers to Jean and the family. We have lost a priest, pastor, musician and poet — a great character and a man of many talents. His love of ideas and language, and forming these into a type of poetry, whether in the pulpit or playing folk music in a pub, will be sorely missed. We will miss the bass notes of his BMW around the valley.

Rest in peace Bob.

FROM THE ARCHDEACON

The last few weeks have obviously been very difficult for everyone in the Valley as we come to terms with Bob's death and his loss to us as parish priest and friend. Thank you for the love and care you are showing to Jean, Adam, Emily, Rachel, Tom, Bobby and Anys. They have some very hard times to go through and I know that the Bride Valley community will continue to give them all possible loving help and support.

Bob's funeral, falling as it did between Good Friday and Easter, spoke of the heart of the Christian truth, that the resurrection of Jesus is the measure of God's power over death, a power at work in us every day we live. Easter and Good Friday inextricably belong together. For Easter doesn't mean that suffering and death is suddenly banished, but that through the resurrection a new song and strength for life has entered. The moments when death raises its head become those very occasions for hope. Our failures become the occasion for repentance and renewal into life, and physical death is now accompanied by the sure work of God's new life through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Our life is therefore filled with an array of possibilities, not simply waiting for us somewhere out in the future, but at work in all our frail and hesitant struggles here and now. And so St. Paul can declare to the Colossians: you were dead; but you have been raised to life with Christ. And so he can pray, in his letter to the Ephesians, that they might know with their whole being '...the immeasurable greatness of God's power for us who believe...which he put to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead...' Bob knew this well, its truth sat at the heart of his own Christian life and journey, and it was in this context that we commended

him to his Lord and redeemer.

The huge number of people who attended Bob's funeral eucharist was in itself tribute to him and all he has given to so many. As a colleague, which he has been for me over ten years, I most appreciated his deep honesty and profound integrity. This meant that Bob would speak the truth in a way that was refreshing, as it invariably came from deeply held principles, and cut through the avoidance that we are all too prone to. Bob was of course no 'shrinking violet', but he was also someone who exuded genuine humility, combined with a deep commitment to those around him. Bob cared: about his faith and about his people.

As we know Bob believed passionately in the importance of pilgrimage, in journeys, where there is an abandoning of the securities and trappings of life, in order to be able to see God and our place in his world more clearly. Pilgrimages demand the courage to step out into the unknown. They remind us that Christianity is not a backwards looking faith but a forwards looking faith. Bob knew that Jesus calls us to step out into the future with confidence and hope, with the assurance that we will always have the accompaniment of 'One who goes there before us'. We commend Bob on the next stage of his journey in that confidence, and pray for ourselves that we also may step forward with that faith.

Every year around this time Litton Cheney Parish Council holds its annual meeting when it elects officers for the coming year. Prior to that meeting a Village Gathering/Assembly is held to allow those on the electoral role to exercise their democratic right (if they so wish) and raise matters they

consider worthy of the Parish Council's attention and response. Just to get you in the mood we have arranged for the team from the Dorset Waste Partnership to come and talk "A Load of Rubbish" and guide us through the new arrangements for collection of rubbish which start in October. Dorset Waste Partnership briefings were held recently to explain to town and parish councils about the new set up. They are now visiting Litton Cheney to explain arrangements to local residents and perhaps more importantly to answer your questions. We hope to see you there.

LET'S TALK "A LOAD OF RUBBISH" at the Litton Cheney Village Meeting on Tuesday 13th May

It might sound like rubbish but it is important that YOU know about the new waste and recycling collection service which will be introduced to Litton Cheney and other parts of the Bride Valley on October 20th this year. Dorset Waste Partnership who have been tasked with introducing this new regime to Dorset will make a presentation on what the new



service will mean to you – amongst the changes are that plastics, including milk bottles, will now be included in the doorstep collection. There are a number of reasons why you might need a non-standard collection service (currently registered for assisted collection, larger bin needed to accommodate disposable nappies, need to use bags instead of wheeled bin for general waste, etc) and the deadline for registering for this is June 19th. We are assured that all households will shortly receive information from the Dorset Waste Partnership about the new scheme (you may have received this already); the Village Assembly (7 pm on Tuesday 13th May) is also an opportunity to view the assortment of collection containers on offer and talk about practical aspects of the new service.

Don't waste this opportunity corny, but very apt.





The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-incheek letters From 'Uncle Eustace':

On the perils of building a kitchen in church

The Rectory St. James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren

It never fails to amaze me how in church life, an issue can suddenly become an Issue. In the last month, we have acquired an Issue: a proposal to convert a space at the back of church into a kitchen. Inevitably, battle lines have been drawn and trenches dug. Attendance at church council meetings have soared and unofficial sub-committees meet in the car park after Services.

It's obvious that feelings are running high, because people have become remarkably polite to one another.

Some who are wildly in favour see it as an opportunity of being able to leave the pews ten minutes early in order to get ready for the rush for weak coffee and damp biscuits. I can already hear in my mind the final hymn being drowned by kettles being filled, biscuit tins opened, cups thunderingly placed on saucers, while the volunteers discuss the dress sense of others in the congregation in deafening whispers.

I was a little surprised to hear that Colonel Wainwright was all in favour - until I realised that it would give him a place to totter into to read his newspaper once he got bored with my sermon, which usually seems to happen in the first minute. Naturally, smaller turf wars have broken out alongside the major battle. There is conflict about whether we should get Maltby new crockery, what colour carpeting tiles would look right - and most importantly of all, who will take charge of the coffee rota.

Others are totally against the project: the treasurer dreads the thought of signing yet more cheques, the churchwardens worry about removing pews which have quietly hidden the dry rot, and the theologically angst-ridden agonise about the fact that St. Paul never mentioned coffee after Sabbath worship.

JULIAN of NORWICH

Julian was a woman who lived in Norwich, and in 1373, on the 13th May, she had a series of visions of Jesus that were so important to her that she spent the next 20 years learning to read and write so that she could share these visions with others. Imagine the hard work and trouble that must have caused because it was very rare for any woman to read and write at that time, let alone an unimportant countrywoman. Julian lived most of her life in a small room that joined onto one wall of St Julian's Church in Norwich. And you can actually visit the room (it was bombed during the Second World War but rebuilt).

Dame Julian wrote about the love of God and you can still read her book The Revelations of Divine Love' today. The book ends with the words "before God made us, he loved us". Before we were born, God chose us for the work we are to do. And as we know, God doesn't make mistakes. He chose you and me, and he loves us. What a wonderful promise!


