# FROM THE REGISTERS

On 12<sup>th</sup> June in a sunbathed pastoral scene, that would have brought joy to her heart, friends and family of the late **Beatrice Anne Darby, "Bettie",** gathered in St Martin's, Shipton Gorge to celebrate her 97 years of life.



Born in Hertfordshire in 1917, she was a remarkable, adventurous and caring woman travelling to India alone by sea at the age of 18. She trained as a nurse, and midwife, later joining the RAF, serving in Germany, and flying in gliders on her days off! She became a long time supporter of the British Legion and RAF Association.

She spent time in London and Lancashire before meeting her husband Harry. Together with their two daughters Helen and Beatrice, the family moved to South Godstone in Surrey, before finally settling in 1979 in Sunny Bank Cottage, Shipton Gorge.

Bettie was a faithful and regular worshipper at St Martin's and a lover of choral music. As a member of Dorset Wildlife Trust and protector of orchids, her deep love of nature was a constant thread throughout her life as was her service to others.

The memorial service was followed by afternoon tea. Afterwards, in a private ceremony, Bettie's ashes were scattered in St Martin's garden of remembrance, joining those of Harry's.


The next get together for Swyre villagers and their guests will be the **Harvest Supper** to be held at the beginning of October, a definite date to be set by the next Bride Valley news.

Service at 11.00 a.m. on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> August leading into a Candlelight Vigil Service at 8.30 p.m. on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> August, the date on which Britain entered World War I. Please join us to mark, commemorate and remember the lives of those who lived, fought and died in the First World War.

There will be a display in the church commemorating not only the four young men from Shipton who gave their lives in the service of their country, but also the many more who served in the armed forces and survived the war.

On **Remembrance Sunday, 9 November**, we will hold our annual Service of Quiet Contemplation and Reflection, for all those affected by conflict. Please look out for further announcements through BVN, the Shipton Gorge web site and posters around the village.

# BURTON BRADSTOCK INSIGHTS INTO VILLAGE SOCIETY TALKS PROGRAMME 2014-15

A most varied talks programme starts on **19th September** with a return visit by **Phil Wilkinson**, speaking this time on '**Women at War'**, including a short analysis of Russian women's fighter and bomber squadrons in WW2. **October 17th** sees the return of wildlife specialist **Brian Pettit**, talking on the birds, wildlife and scenery in France and Spain, where he has lived and has very close knowledge.

On **14th November** we hear from **Havana Marking**, speaking on her 10 years as a film director and producer, during which she directed the award-winning '**Afghan Star'** film (living in Kabul for 5 months). She has also interviewed a leader of a Balkans-based international network of jewel thieves, the '**Pink Panthers'** - the resultant documentary '**Smash** & **Grab'** was screened on BBC TV. So what next?!

Attenders of the talk by **Mike Crankshaw** on the **Royal Yacht Britannia** thoroughly enjoyed his presentation and would have liked to have seen

We round off the talks' year with **Bob Ayers** discussing 'Old Father Thames' on March 13th, including news of 5 impromptu fairs held between 1683 and 1814 that were staged actually *on* the frozen Thames; and finally an arresting talk on **April 17th** by an intrepid woman stunt performer for films and TV, **Denise Edwards**. ## HALL IMPROVEMENTS

The new curtains for the main stage have finally arrived and are up. The general reaction to them has been very positive. Previously, when the stage



## BRIDE VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

At our May meeting our speaker was **Sam Saines** who introduced us to **Horn Park Gardens**, Beaminster. He showed us photographs of the garden and invited us to identify some of their more unusual specimens which are planted in terraced, herbaceous, rock and water gardens. The talk was in preparation for our visit there



In June we had a talk from **Clive Russell**, from the **Iris Garden**, **Pilsdon**, who introduced us to the wide varieties of Iris which enable the gardener to have them in flower for almost the whole year.

We are now having a summer break in August and will be looking forward to **Geoff Hobson** from **Westbury** speaking to us on Monday 15th September about looking after **Orchids**. If you have problems keeping your orchids then this is a meeting not to miss!

#### Jobs to do in August

Ensure camellias do not dry out – they are forming next year's flower buds at this time. Keep feeding container plants with a high potassium feed for them to continue flowering. Cut back hardy geraniums and other perennials that have finished flowering, for fresh leaves and flowers in the autumn. Take cuttings from tender perennials. Continue to sow spring cabbages at intervals. It's still worth sowing some salad crops and even an early variety of peas outdoors, not all of them will mature but you should get some fresh leaves and a small crop of peas in the autumn. Sow green manure crops on vacant ground. Pot up chives to grow on for use during the winter.

The Dorset Historic Churches Trust, a registered charity in partnership with the National Churches Trust, exists to help preserve, maintain and enhance Christian churches and chapels of all denominations. Each year recently it has raised and distributed in excess of £100,000, the major part of which comes from the annual Ride + Stride Event.

Last year's Ride + Stride was a real triumph.
