
ROADS TO BE GRITTED BY THE DORSET COUNTY COUNCIL (DCC) IN THE EVENT OF ICE/SNOW

In the event of icy roads this winter the DCC has committed itself to keeping various roads fit for driving. The main routes, the A35 and the B3157, will be gritted by the DCC. When snow is forecast the DCC plan will grit the following local route:

- From the B3157 though Swyre as far as the junction of Clay Lane and Looke Lane.
- The length of Rectory Lane to the T junction with Litton Lane.
- Along Litton Lane to Litton Cheney.
- Through Litton Cheney to Long Bredy.
- Left at Long Bredy to Littlebredy.
- At the V junction bearing left (Longlands Lane) to the A35.

Various roads in Puncknowle are not covered by the DCC plan. In an attempt to cover this the Parish Council has called forward and stored sufficient salt. The likely trouble spots in our village have been identified and volunteers living close to each of these trouble spots have taken charge of a sufficient quantity of salt to cover these areas.

IMPORTANT NEWS – We are changing back to Thursdays for our Film Screenings from January; there may be some new clashes, but hopefully it will be more convenient for


most people. We are still awaiting TV schedules and availability. We hope to be showing **Victoria & Abdul** and **Goodbye Christopher Robin** soon.

GOODBYE CHRISTOPHER ROBIN

MOVIE

Nick and Carol Pollard from EthosMedia.org share **MOMENTS** thought-provoking reflections on the latest films.

Comfort in our troubles

'His childhood was sacrificed to make other childhoods better' says Will Tilston about the title character he plays in Goodbye Christopher Robin.

This is the latest film providing a surprising back-story to a popular children's book. But unlike Saving Mr. Banks. Miss Potter and Finding Neverland (which primarily focus on the mind of the writer) Goodbye Christopher Robin also shows the impact on the story's main character, who is a real person - the author's eight-



year-old son. This young boy has been experiencing the pain of living with emotionally disengaged parents. His father is shell-shocked from the First World War, and finds it difficult to express his feelings. His mother cannot properly attach to her son because she is convinced that another such war is inevitable and he will be called up to fight, so she showers him with affection one minute and ignores him the next.

Then, in a magical few days when Christopher is alone with his father in the woods surrounding their Sussex house, the two of them bond together through imaginary stories about a group of toy animals. Christopher's father is A. A. Milne, who writes these down as the tales of Winnie-the-Pooh, and the whole family finds themselves swept up in the success of the books. But young Christopher Robin cannot stay little forever.



As he grows, these childhood stories make his adolescent life a misery.

We can't detail the end of the film without spoilers but can highlight that, in the final scenes, we discover that the tales of Winnie-the-Pooh, which had comforted the young boy, became comforting to others in their own distress. Perhaps, as we watch this powerful and moving film, we might reflect on the biblical message that God 'comforts us in all our troubles, so that we

can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive.'

Littlebredy has a new (possibly temporary and certainly very long lost) celebrity...

Many visitors to the Church will have noticed the [possibly somewhat overblown] memorial tablet to Jane Williams (born Chassereau), who died in 1841 aged nearly 102. Now

it appears (from the preview of a new book tracing the phenomenon of those who live to be 100 or more) that she has been authenticated as the very first centenarian in the country. [Many thanks to Robin Barbour of Baglake for drawing the book review to our attention.]

To put this into context, the book's author has discovered that there are 14,000 centenarians living in the UK today, as against 2,000 in 1980 and 200 in 1950. By extrapolation, it must indeed have been a rarity in 1840, but no doubt now the book is in print the author will get many claims on behalf of others challenging Jane's supremacy! Just as a reminder, within the new boundary fence there is to be a new basket swing, a 'tractor' apparatus with small slide, a 'galleon' with rope climbing frame and new picnic benches. 
BURTON BRADSTOCK WI


