Some members of the local community will already be aware that in recent months I have been using the social media platform 'Instagram'. I have been making use of Instagram to post photographs and drawings and text, much of it related to my experience of being cared for through these phases of Motor Neurone Disease.

I was contacted by the Diocesan Communications Officer, Gerry Lynch, to see if I would be agreeable to making my posts more widely available and in time I was asked by the Church of England Communications Office to give them information so that I might be featured in their outgoing material. And so sharing my 'Instagram feed' with the wider church.

I thought it might be interesting to share with the benefice the questions you were asked for in this process.

Q – 'When did you start attending a C of E church and why?'

A – 'As a child I was a chorister at my local C of E church and in my 20's I decided to return to regular worship prompted by the desire to explore the tradition I felt had been passed on to me as a younger person.

Q – 'What was one of the best moments of your life and how did the church feature in this?'

A – 'Being invited to Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge and Peterhouse to give talks. On one of these occasions in Heffers bookshop I plucked up courage to talk to Professor George Steiner who was in the queue at the checkout. In the course of conversation Steiner affirmed that a self-education 'is the best kind'. While realising that I'm an autodidact I have not been comfortable with the thought of being a self-learner but I was able to embrace this aspect of my character through the learning tools I was given by the Church of England in my training to be a priest. As well as this I have been made happy by being able to offer my artistic gifts through my vocation and in solidarity and collaboration with my wife Frances Hatch who is an artist @francesahatch

Q – 'What was one of the worst moments of your life and how did the church feature in this?'

A – 'In 1988, a year after the start of the first intifada, Frances and I were in East Jerusalem on pilgrimage when we were caught up in a serious incident that created panic in a souk. Fleeing tear gas we were beckoned into the home of a Palestinian Christian family. Their hospitality and shelter bridged the language gap and extended a love toward us that was unforgettable.'

Q – 'What does the Church of England mean to you?'

A – 'A radical bearer of scripture, tradition and reason. The Church of England at its best manifests the possibility of continued conversation between those who hold very different positions in terms of faith.'

Q - 'What is the relationship between faith and your career?'

A – 'The Church of England has enabled my innate gifts (as an artist and wordsmith) to remain mobile and open to refreshment and renewal as well as critique. As Lewis Hyde said: a gift is not a gift if it isn't on the move. I am thankful that these gifts have been exercised within marriage and community.'

Jobs to do in May


Cutting back certain perennials such as sedums, phlox and heleniums now will encourage them to produce better growth in the summer. This month it is important to harden off tender plants (flowers and vegetables) before planting out and have fleece at hand to protect them should we get a late frost. Feed spring bulbs, take cuttings from tender perennials e.g. pelargoniums and fuchsias. Put in supports for border perennials prone to flopping. Finish planting summer-flowering bulbs. Keep fruit bushes, trees and strawberries well-watered. Continue successional sowings of vegetable crops. Plant summer and autumn cabbage cultivars outside. Protect crops from carrot root fly. Pinch out the tops of broad beans, when they flower, to discourage blackfly. Sow coriander outside, sowing every 2 weeks to maintain a fresh supply.

BVCS COFFEE STOP MORNING 2018

The Bride Valley Car Service is a much valued volunteer scheme available to all residents of the Bride Valley who find it difficult to transport themselves to get to medical

appointments. This includes appointments to a GP surgery, hospital, dentist, optician, physio, chiropodist, etc.

It is a door-to-door service and drivers wait for you however long the appointment may be. The cost is 50p per mile plus a standard charge of ± 1.50 which is payable to the driver, in cash only, at the end of the journey. A receipt is given. Everyone involved with BVCS is a volunteer and all drivers have DBS clearance. This is a non-profit making scheme.

We are attracting more people who wish to use the service whilst at the same time have lost some of our drivers after many years dedicated driving. We, therefore, need to recruit more volunteer drivers – would you be able to give some of your time once or twice a month? Drivers find it very rewarding.

The BVCS is hosting the next Coffee Stop Morning in Burton Bradstock village hall on **Wednesday 23 May** from 10-12 noon, and is open to everyone. Do please come along to enjoy a coffee, cake and chat with friends, and at the same time find out more about this volunteer scheme. You will be made very welcome.

NEWS FROM PORTESHAM SURGERY

We've been through the busiest three months any of us can remember, and there is still a two-week wait for routine appointments, something none of us are used to! We have added extra clinics and appointments in an effort to catch up, and if our appointments are booked the duty doctor will ring you to assess your needs. Some things can be sorted out over the phone, or we will make a space for you to be seen if it is urgent. So we thank you for your patience, and your understanding if our staff ask for a little more information to help the doctors assess the urgency of your call.

If you have a regular prescription you will know that you need to have an **annual medication review** with your GP to ensure that it is safe to carry on prescribing. Some medications require regular monitoring such as blood tests, blood pressure checks or weight measurement. You can check on your repeats list to see when your annual review is due for each drug (some



require more frequent review) and we will remind you when we print the last script of the year so this gives you 30 days to arrange a medication review and any tests you need. Please make the appointment(s) promptly to avoid any delays in getting your next prescription.

The **General Data Protection Regulations** come into force in May. This pulls together other pieces of legislation and makes it clearer what your rights are. We have to tell you what records we keep for you and who has access to it. There is no longer a fee to access a copy of your medical record (although we may charge copying costs). If you are registered to use SystmOnline (to book appointments and order your medications online) you can already view your full record – please ask us for details if you are interested. We have leaflets in the surgery if you want to know more about the medical data we hold for you.

Our **Friends of the Practice group** seeks to represent all our patients, but the volunteers tend to be those with more time on their hands. So they are seeking to recruit and involve some of the younger patients and young families so that the views and suggestions of all our patients are wellrepresented. Jill Askew is the FoP contact for young people and young families and you can contact her with your thoughts and suggestions on 01308 898147 or j-askew@hotmail.com.

We will be holding our first "**Tea and Chat**" on **7**th **June at 1pm**, where patients are invited to pop in and talk to staff and Friends of the Practice informally. This may be particularly relevant to those who are new to the area or feeling a bit isolated, such as those who are carers. We will have information on what groups and services are available in our communities, whether it be the community bus and car services, or a bridge or walking group. If it is successful we will hold more during the year,and there will be cake!

AXE VALLEY AND WEST DORSET RING & RIDE

This service has been in operation since September 2001 and is a Registered charity running community transport for the West Dorset and East Devon areas. It is provided for people with a special need for transport facilities because they are elderly, disabled, parents with young children or people living in isolated areas where there is no adequate public transport.

The door-to-door service offers passengers security and comfort, taking a lot of the strain out of shopping. The fares are very reasonable with morning shopping trips to Bridport, Dorchester, Honiton, Axminster and Chard costing just £5.00 return.

Word of mouth proves over and over again to be the best source of

advertising and many of the Ring and Ride passengers have told both neighbours and friends who have subsequently joined.

There is also a Passenger Club for each zone that offers a weekly afternoon trip and a day trip on one Saturday each month and is very popular with members. The annual membership fee is just £10 and gives the opportunity to visit destinations such as Sidmouth, Otter Nurseries, Sherborne, the Somerset Levels and Abbotsbury Swannery with day trips to Lynton and Lynmouth, Glastonbury, Wells, Swanage and many others.

The service encompasses isolated rural areas and offers a lifeline to many who may find other forms of transport inappropriate or simply lacking. For further information and details about any of the trips available please contact our office on **01404 46520** and we shall be happy to assist you.

BUS SERVICE – WEDNESDAYS & ALTERNATE SATURDAYS

The good news is that the weekly Wednesday and alternate Saturday bus service provided by Dorset Community Transport will continue through to at least the end of August when all routes will come up for review. Thank you to all who have supported this service sufficiently, enabling DCT to justify continuing the service. 
