

## From the Rectory

Last month we were able to say farewell to the Venerable Paul Taylor who has retired from his post as Archdeacon. Here in this part of Dorset we have many reasons to be grateful to Paul for his ministry among us, not least his help and support to the benefice as my illness unfolded. Indeed I owe a personal debt of gratitude to Paul for his guidance and wisdom during the protracted period of being diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease.

One of the marks of Paul's ministry has been his wonderful sense of humour, bringing a spirit of good hearted levity to situations that have a serious face. Meetings convened by Paul have, for this reason, been a pleasure to attend. I'm thinking especially of a gathering which Paul called during the week after my first hospice respite. It was an odd sensation being driven in my mobility vehicle (thank you Philip Ringer!) back to Dorchester to a meeting place just across the road from the Weldmar Hospice where I'd been staying only the day before. The meeting itself looked pretty serious. It was a gathering of clergy from the Archdeaconry and representatives of the local undertaking firms. We had been called together to discuss issues of mutual concern as well as points of good practice. Only Paul Taylor could select the bar of the Dorchester Football Stadium Social Club where he is Chaplain! (if you come across him, ask Paul whether he was Chaplain to the bar or the team!). I didn't do any counting that night but I'm guessing that as far as clergy and undertakers are concerned there were probably about eleven per side. The game was a friendly one!

Thank you to Paul for his practical wisdom, charm and very good humour.



# JOBS TO DO IN JUNE

Place hanging baskets in a sheltered sunny spot, water and feed them regularly. Transplant pot-grown dahlias and cannas, exotic bedding, half-hardy annuals, tender summer bedding and perennials outside. Prune spring-flowering shrubs. Sow biennial Sweet Williams, wallflowers and foxgloves in a nursery bed in preparation for flowering next year.

Take soft shoot-tip cuttings of perennials e.g. penstemons and fuchsias. Plant out squashes/pumpkins/courgettes, runner beans, sweetcorn, leeks, outdoor tomatoes and melons. Sow annual and biennial herbs fortnightly.

# THE GLASS ROOM BY SIMON MAWER

This novel, a previously read favourite with at least two of us, drew very mixed reactions from the group. Although Mawer does not make this explicit - it is a fictionalised account of the building of a modernist house in the Czech town of Brno.

In fact the villa is real and was constructed in the late 1920's by architect Mies van der Rohe for a prominent Jewish family. In the novel, as in real life, the villa was abandoned when the family fled to safer territory as the nazi threat advanced. It was used by the occupying German military and after the war by the Communist authorities of the Russian satellite Czechoslovakia. It is now a museum.

The house is the star of the novel and all the main characters interact with it in some way. It witnesses distressing scenes of drama, betrayal, heartbreak, bomb damage and cultural neglect. However the house is a survivor as are most of the characters described. Some of us felt the characterisation was underdeveloped, others admired the historical narrative. Several of us noted that the story was very filmic - almost begging to be turned into a screenplay. It was fascinating to hear from one of our group, who back in 1968 when the Russian tanks rolled into Prague - was hosting an exchange Czech couple who lived in Brno very close to the actual villa.

# ST PETER'S CHURCHYARD

The village has a historic church, surrounded by a beautiful landscape and an abundance of wild flowers. It is frequently admired by visitors.

However, it may not generally be known that the church and the churchyard are completely separate areas. The churchyard is ground for anyone to be buried in, whether religious or not, and the village is responsible for its upkeep.

Out of respect for people buried there, and relatives who visit graves from other areas of the country, it is fitting that the area is cared for.

# **NEWS FROM THE BELFRY**

Sadly, you will not have heard the bells of St Peter's ring out for a few weeks. At the beginning of April there was a mishap with bell No 3 when a gudgeon sheared off during ringing practice (a gudgeon is a strong pin fixed either side of the headstock and carries the weight of the bell into the bearings on the bell frame). This caused the 391 year old, 7 cwt bell to drop onto the main bell frame, fortunately no damage was caused to the frame or the bell as it did so. The bell was made safe and the headstock and bearings are now at the bellhangers in Bridport undergoing repair.

Despite having worked hard in the past to have funds in hand for the care and maintenance of the bells and tower, such an expensive repair as this was not envisaged. Therefore the ringers are actively fund raising again.

A date for your diary is **Sunday, 23rd September** when we will be holding a **Harvest Lunch** in the village hall. More details nearer the time but we do hope you can join us.

# PARISH SPRING CLEAN

Long Bredy & Kingston Russell Parish Council held their annual village spring clean in March. The heavy snow fall thwarted the first attempt, so things were moved to the 17<sup>th</sup> March. Despite the bitterly cold conditions 21 people, including 4 children, turned up and walked the highways and byways picking up litter. Around 20 sacksful of assorted rubbish were collected including plastic bottles, an exhaust system, crisp bags, a bicycle inner tube and assorted tins. It is such a shame that unthinking people cannot be bothered to dispose of their rubbish in an appropriate way. Refreshments provided by parishioners followed and the rubbish was kindly taken away by Dorset Waste Partnership.

# THE HORSE COURSE

Some of you may know that I used to be a reporter on The Bridport News but after 17 years I thought it was time for a change and, nothing daunted, abandoned a 37-year career as a journalist and went to work for a local charity called TheHorseCourse.

The charity was started in 2010 by **Harriet Laurie** from Askerswell who went to Portland Young Offenders prison to see if using horses could help the young men there – and it did.

Academic studies and astounding statistics (a 27% reduction in reoffending rates) validated the success of what was essentially a three-year experiment.

Since those days TheHorseCourse has moved more into working in the community helping people from the age of 8 upwards who are struggling with a variety of issues from anxiety, depression, ADHD, ASD, veterans with PTSD, or people who have been victims of child, domestic or sexual abuse or addicts struggling to commit to rehabilitation.

Everybody who does our flagship five-day ReStart course has to be referred to us by mental or social work professionals, the NHS or schools. The results speak for themselves – 81% improve in the eight core skills we work on (calmness, assertiveness, empathy, taking responsibility, communication, realistic planning, focus and perseverance and engagement/confidence as a learner).

We are rigorous about collecting evidence and know that 77% go back to education, training or work, there's a 78% reduction in problem behaviours, 81% improvement in relationships and 78% improvement in self-esteem and confidence.

And those are the best reasons to get out of bed and go to work every day I can think of.

I not only help teach these courses I am responsible for community fundraising and in that capacity I'd love to come and talk to groups in the hopes of getting them to 'adopt' The Horse Course as their chosen charity. We are also looking for people to join our fundraising committee – people with bags of enthusiasm who'll believe as passionately as we do that our revolutionary approach to improving mental health improves the lives of some of the most disadvantaged people in society.

We are planning a get together on Tuesday June 19 from 6 to 7.30pm at our HQ, at Top Yard, Littlemead, Weymouth DT3 5DL of people at our Weymouth HQ who might be interested in joining the committee or wanting to fundraise for us.

You'll see and get a chance to experience a bit of what we do with the horses first and then have a chat with our CEO Harriet and me.

# ST. MARY'S CHURCH:

# ST. MARY'S BELLS – PROJECT COMPLETE

Back in 2014 a survey of the bells in St. Marys revealed that one of the bells was cracked and some refurbishment and maintenance was required on the other 7 bells. Fund raising was started and a variety of events held to raise the £23,000 required. This was completed by the summer 2016 and the bells were decommissioned in September. Two of them were removed from the tower and taken to a workshop in Loughborough. Restoration of the complete peal was finished on  $24^{\text{th}}$  December 2016 just in time to ring Christmas in.

As well as restoring the bells a number of other jobs were completed; the ringing room and staircase re-painted and the electrics much improved with new lights. The last job was the replacement of louvers and shutters in the belfry windows. The old ones were in a bad state, so much so that it was impossible to close the shutters without them breaking up. There are now new ones installed on all four sides of the tower. Our appreciation and very grateful thanks go to **Russell Randall** for the work he put into building and installing them.

And so, with the installation of the louvers and shutters the work to refurbish the bells, started in 2014, has been completed.



Finally, we have to thank once again, the many villagers who gave donations in time and money to the project. There were so many that this was indeed a village project. Together we have made sure the church has bells for at least another 50 years.






