FROM THE RECTORY

As this magazine is issued the process to appoint a new Rector for the Bride Valley will be well underway. Unlike most other jobs where people travel to work from a place they call home, clergy move (with their spouse and sometimes family) to an entirely new location. Therefore there is huge discernment going on, both by those who may feel called to the role vocationally, and by the Benefice as a whole as to who will be the right person for the post at this time.

The Benefice Profile, carefully prepared, will give a clue to anyone looking as to the kind of place the Bride Valley is, and to the people you are. It will give an indication of the worship pattern across the churches, and the role as discerned by local church leaders. Each time a post is advertised the role becomes slightly different, as the demography of our churches and the local needs change. Role descriptions have to be outward facing, reflecting the needs of the church to connect with those in the local community (whether permanent, temporary or visitors), as well as those who connect regularly with a local congregation.

A church leader in the 21st century has to be both a holy man or woman, and someone who connects with everyday life in a place – be that the farming community, the local pub or business, or those who holiday at the caravan and camping parks. It's not an easy task and fulfilling everyone's expectations is impossible, hence the importance of prioritising.

The whole appointment process has therefore to be grounded in prayer, because above all we need to believe that God is now preparing the right person to come and serve you here. We could all sit down and write our own list of what we would like the local vicar to do, and what kind of personality they should have, trusting God is much harder. Therefore I offer you a prayer to use during this time:

Loving Heavenly Father, we ask you to send us a new Priest who loves you, is faithful and prayerful, who will teach your Word who has real love for people, who will lead your church effectively. Guide all who help find this person, lead them not to the one we think we want, but to the one you know we need. In this whole process may your will alone be done. In Jesus' name. Amen

BOOK CLUB REVIEW

September Review "A Little Life" by Hanya Yanagihara

This was a challenging read, very long and especially harrowing in its second half. This Hawaiian American author has won prizes for this novel and much admiration in the literary press. The main character, Jude St Francis, is a compelling man who becomes a celebrated corporate lawyer rising above a neglected and abused childhood much of which is initially shrouded in mystery. Jude has three close college friends who also go on to be successful, even famous, in their fields.

The novel is set in contemporary New York with the cultural life of the city powerfully brought to life. Yanagihara manages to include food, the judiciary, artist studios, the property market, the film industry, architecture and even mathematical theorems into her narrative. However Jude cannot escape the past which has left him so emotionally and physically traumatised. He is much loved, by some of his friends unconditionally loved, but he continues to be a victim, self harming and refusing to believe in his right to be happy and successful.

The second part of the novel dispels the mystery of Jude's past and many of our group found this very difficult to cope with. This prompted an interesting discussion about how far writers should go when describing horrific issues such as abuse and self harm.

St Jude is the patron saint of lost causes and I think Yanagihara wanted to write about such a lost soul who is unable to redeem himself.

Jobs to do in October

Continue to plant spring bulbs (except tulips which should wait until November or early December). Bring indoors tender perennials: lift and store tender summer bulbs and tubers. Plant cyclamen, divide congested clumps of hardy perennials and plant out wallflowers to flower next spring. Sow next year's sweet peas in a cold greenhouse or frame. Collect flower seeds - dry the flower heads upside down in a paper bag before storing the seed somewhere cool and dry ready to sow next spring. In the kitchen garden plant garlic, sow hardy broad beans and peas under cloches. Condition soil as you clear it by sowing green manure or adding organic mulches of manure and well-rotted compost. Bring pots of herbs under cover to maintain crops during the autumn; plant out biennial herbs, such as parsley and chervil.

Home Front, Home

Bridport An exhibition at Bridport Museum - Home Front, Home, Museum commemorates 100 years since the end of World War I. The exhibition explores how the World's first 'total war' affected women in Bridport, through the stories of 7 individuals. It explores the challenges they faced and

looks at how they had to adapt to maintain a resilient home front.

The exhibition has been researched by a group of Bridport Museum's volunteers, led by Professor Karen Hunt, Professor Emerita of Modern History at Keele University.

Alison Jackson-Bass was one of the volunteers undertaking the research for the exhibition, she said: 'The exhibition shines a light on the lives of these women, at a time when society was transformed by war. I would like to think that visitors gain an insight into the hardships that these women faced, and a sense of what it was like to live at a time when there was such a marked inequality of pay between male and female workers.'

Museum Director Emily Hicks said: "This exhibition is an exhibition with a difference. Visitors are invited to sit in the 'parlour' that we have created and immerse themselves in the lives of these women. We invite visitors to sit, read and consider the challenges they faced."

The exhibition has been generously supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund World War I Centenary Grants scheme.

Entrance to the Museum and exhibition is free, but donations are extremely welcome to help support the Museum's work as a registered charity.

Many congratulations indeed to **Charlie McCormick** who mopped up numerous prizes at the **Melplash** and **Dorset County (aka Dorchester) Shows** at the end of August. Nine first prizes altogether, mainly for dahlias and a marrow (of which more in a minute), plus eight second prizes and eight

thirds. A remarkable haul – well done, especially in such difficult growing conditions this summer.

As for the marrow, which won a first prize and was the heaviest exhibited at both Shows (at least, I assume it was the same one), it weighed in at an incredible 27.4 kilogrammes (which is about 60 lb, i.e. well over 4 stone). It must have been an effort for Charlie to carry it, let alone display it. What a whopper!

Maybe the marrow can again be on display at the village **Harvest Thanksgiving Service**, which was originally planned for September 23rd but for various reasons has been postponed until **Sunday 28th October at 5pm**. No doubt the Church decorators will have been busy in the meanwhile, and Charlie would also welcome offers of help from anyone interested.

As usual, the service will be followed by a **Harvest Supper in the Village Hall** to which everyone is invited. Invitations will be sent out shortly, with a request for contributions to the **Bring & Share** event – we hope of course for a good attendance at this traditional convivial gathering.





Steering Group members: At the same time we will be inviting anyone in the Parish to become shareholder members of the CLT at a cost of £1.00. This is to give support to the provision of affordable housing in the community, to ensure democratic process giving members the right to vote at general meetings and also be eligible to put themselves forward as a Board Member.


