BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

Calls cannot be taken at weekends.




Each church will be open between 10am and 3pm on Saturday 15th February.

Our Night Sky in January 2020

Venus is brilliant low in the south West after sunset, setting about 1900, while Mars rises low in the South east about 0500 in the morning. All the winter constellations are well up by sunset, and are a wonderful sight, especially with binoculars.

Japan's Hayabusa 2 spacecraft is now the first spacecraft to retrieve a subsurface sample from an asteroid. On July 11th, the spacecraft touched down for a second time on asteroid Ryugu. This time, the probe retrieved a sample from a crater it excavated with its impactor.

Asteroids like Ryugu are made of the same primordial material that the rocky planets like Earth are made from. But there's a difference between the surface samples and subsurface samples. Surface material is subject to space weathering from the Sun. Over the billions of years since the Solar System formed, that material has changed. It's still scientifically interesting, but the material underneath it has never seen the Sun.

Scientists want to get their hands on it and get it into labs to analyse it, and to hopefully shed some light on the origins of Earth and other rocky bodies.

Hayabusa 2's science phase was due to end in December 2019. At that point, with samples encased in protective canisters, the spacecraft will fire up its ion engines and head for Earth. When it approaches Earth, it will launch its sample return canister (SRC) towards Earth, and parachutes will slow its descent to the surface. From there, it'll be collected and taken to laboratories where eager scientists will subject the contents to a thorough examination.

I will let you know the results as and when they are released.

Sophia came second out of all the girls and Lyra came third. Kitt came seventh out of all the boys. The girls came third overall and the boys fourth. **Super running, teams!**


Reception had a **Healthy Ted talk** from the school nurse.

It is too early to be able to report on the various Christmas events in and around the village, but we hope everyone has fully enjoyed the festive season – beginning as it did in the commercial world around the beginning of November...

There will be two events in the village around the middle of February which deserve some pre-publicity now. 
