BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

For those of us with a Christian faith, it is always reassuring to know that our lives are in the hands of Almighty God.

At times, life with God is like being on a fast moving boat - perhaps like being on a trapeze on a catamaran. It is exhilarating and exciting, seeing, and being involved with, the Lord answering big prayers and transforming situations.

News from Portesham Surgery

2020 promises to be an exciting year, as we welcome a new GP partner to the team at Portesham Surgery from 1st March.

Some of you will have already met Dr John Jitan as he has locumed with us previously, and we are delighted that he has chosen to come to us now he is ready to become a partner. We will therefore have a strong 4-GP team here and, at a time when many surgeries are struggling to recruit GPs let alone partners, it puts us in an excellent position to continue offering a first-class service to our patients.

Sadly this means we will be seeing less of our other locums including Dr Debbie Rose. We are incredibly grateful to our loyal band of locums who support our patients (and us!) when our GPs are training or on leave.



Dr John Jitan writes: “Following my undergraduate degree in engineering at Bristol University, I went on to study medicine at the University of Warwick, qualifying in 2013. I spent the first two years of my career living and working in Bath, predominantly at the RUH (Royal United Hospitals). Subsequent training jobs have been here in beautiful Dorset, both in hospital and general practice. Since completing my GP training in 2018 I have worked in a range of local practices. I enjoy the variety and complexity of general practice and look forward to joining the team at Portesham.

Outside of work I enjoy spending time with my lovely wife and daughter, playing music with friends, singing with the Dorchester Choral Society, and getting my hands grubby in the garden or on the allotment.”

Other staff news: we have welcomed seven new members of staff in the last six months! Some have replaced leavers and others have been recruited just to help with the increased workload. Michele and Caz have joined the dispensary team; Anna Meakins became our second practice nurse in November 2019 and Hari is our new phlebotomist; and Kendal, Kacey and Sharon have joined our reception team.

We hope that these will be the last changes in the team for a while! We

thank you for your patience as our new team members learn their roles in this increasingly complex work environment.

The role of the GP: On 2nd January over 11 million people throughout the UK were having to wait more than 3 weeks for a routine GP appointment, and some waiting times were as long as 10 weeks. We sometimes hear comments such as “it’s not the same as when Dr Pouncey or Dr Baird was here” and patients lament the old days when GPs had time to do “social” home visits. As medicine develops, so the role of GPs has changed. Forty years ago GPs often only saw their patients when there was an emergency. Now we have a hands-on role helping to keep our patients healthy and forestall those emergencies through all kinds of complex interventions. We will continue to work hard to make sure we are always as accessible as possible.

Do you need extra help? Or can you offer some time to help your neighbours?

Our carers’ lead, Jackie, is developing links with those in our community who need extra help and those who can offer it. She has already recruited one “patient champion” who is starting to work with us using her expertise in adult social care and offering to visit patients who are struggling, perhaps because of isolation or infirmity.

Similarly if you are struggling with getting help at home, or feeling isolated, or wanting to be more active but not knowing where to start, or any other non-medical problem, have a chat with Jackie to see if we can help.

Our Night Sky in March 2020

Venus remains brilliant in the South West after sunset, and sets about 2200 in the middle of the month. For the early risers, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn form a neat little group in the South East at 0500 until they disappear in the glare of the rising Sun.

The Origins, Spectral Interpretation, Resource Identification, Security-Regolith Explorer (OSIRIS-REx) spacecraft is orbiting a near-Earth asteroid, called Bennu and is planned to bring at least a 2.1-ounce sample back to Earth for study. The mission will help scientists investigate how planets formed and how life began, as well as improve our understanding of asteroids that could impact Earth.

After a year studying asteroid Bennu's boulder-scattered surface, the team leading NASA's first asteroid sample return mission has officially selected a sample collection site. The site had to have the greatest amount of fine-grained material which the spacecraft could easily access while keeping the spacecraft safe. Of the four candidates, site Nightingale best met these criteria and, ultimately, best ensures mission success.

The mission also selected site Osprey as a backup sample collection site. The spacecraft has the capability to perform multiple sampling attempts, but any significant disturbance to Nightingale's surface would make it difficult to collect a sample from that area on a later attempt, making a backup site necessary. The spacecraft is designed to autonomously "wave-off" from the site if its predicted position is too close to a hazardous area, and this might disturb the material being collected. In any situation where a follow-on attempt at Nightingale is not possible, the team will try to collect a sample from site Osprey instead.

Having selected the final primary and backup sites, the mission team will undertake further reconnaissance flights over Nightingale and Osprey, begun in January and continuing through the spring. Once these flyovers are complete, the spacecraft will begin rehearsals for its first "touch-and-go" sample collection attempt, which is scheduled for August. The spacecraft will depart Bennu in 2021 and is scheduled to return to Earth in September 2023.

The ability of the space engineers to manoeuvre a spacecraft millions of miles away from Earth, fills me full of admiration. Not only must they deal in 4 dimensions, but the time delay for signals travelling back and forth greatly complicate matters. For someone occasionally challenged to park his car in two dimensions I am only glad I do not have their problems to solve!

Jobs to Do in March

Prune hardy fuchsias, bush and shrub roses, buddleia and late-flowering clematis.

Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials and herbs.
Replenish alpine displays by removing any rotting specimens and replace with fresh young plants.

Plant summer-flowering bulbs.

Sow hardy annual seeds.

In the vegetable garden sow short rows of beetroot, broad beans, carrots, lettuce, peas, spinach and radishes; plant onion sets, shallots and first early potatoes if the conditions are good enough.

Protect vulnerable young plants with fleece or cloches if cold weather is forecast.

THE LITTON CHENEY TRUST

The Litton Cheney Trust continued to serve individuals and the community during 2019. Payments totalling £5350 covered Christmas gifts to older residents on limited means, and grants to young people going into higher and further education or moving from school into employment. Grants were also made towards refurbishment of the Chalk Pit Lane finger signpost (£250) and the renovation of the floor in Litton and Thorner's Community Hall (£1466).

Income for the year amounted to just over £7500, comprising rent for a grazing field owned by the Trust, dividends on investments and bank interest. The Trust's investments performed strongly during the year, showing capital growth of 15% to a total of just under £145,000.

Lambing/Loose Dogs

A timely reminder that we are coming up to the main lambing season, and dogs must not be let off the lead in fields where there is livestock - ever. A farmer has the right to take whatever action they feel is appropriate if a dog is worrying their flock, and this includes shooting the dog. Picking up after your dog is important and necessary wherever you are but particularly in fields where there is livestock – dogs are carnivores and livestock vegetarians, and diseases can be transferred between species via poo – but you know that and there is really no need for this reminder.

Alan Hale of the British Lifesaving Society conducted the session, demonstrated how the machine works and reminded us about CPR (cardio pulmonary resuscitation), i.e. how to restore breath to an inert casualty. Very worthwhile, and thanks also to the Moxoms who arranged the session and are mainly responsible for us having the defibrillator in the first place.

The Old Forge (next to Phil Hallett's workshop), previously occupied by Phil and Lucie Milner for their Fresh Face furniture and art business, is now again available as an office, studio or small workshop space. The main area measures about 22 square metres, and there is a secondary or reception area of about 11 square metres. In addition there is a w.c. and separate area for boiling a kettle, etc. Heating is by electricity. 



Community Speed Watch- you will have noticed that the new Community Speed Watch Scheme is now out in force in the village. The CSW team are made up of concerned volunteers giving up their time to raise awareness and to help reduce speeding in the village. The CSW scheme is on a 3-month trial to collect data. Also, the survey data collected by Dorset Council with their radar and speed surveys will help build a picture so the PC and DC can look at what changes could be made to the access into the village as traffic calming measures. Further information is required from DC in order to make a decision on the SID which will be a cost of over £3000 to the Parish Council plus volunteer time to deploy it.

Dorset Digital Champion and cyber security expert releases new book to help protect you from crime

An essential guide to help people take steps to protect themselves from cyber and identity crime is released this month from the British Computer Society.

The guide has been co-written and edited by Andy Taylor, a volunteer Digital Champion with Dorset Council who also works full time as an independent information security adviser following a career in the Royal Navy.

Andy is based at Sherborne Library on a voluntary basis, providing free support and advice to anyone needing help with basic digital skills. He is one of 75 Digital Champions volunteering in Dorset libraries to help people with computers, tablets, phones and more. Most have gained experience from their professional careers.

Take steps to protect yourself against cyber and information crime

Consider using Paypal, it is very secure - <https://www.paypal.com/uk/home>

Never put any financial information including banking or credit card details in an email, it is not secure.

Be quick to install the latest versions (patches) in software. Criminals look for the weaknesses in the old versions to exploit.

Always use websites with https:\\ the 's' actually stands for security and will generate a padlock, make sure it is not crossed out. If the website does not have the 's', do not shop there.

Protect your documents. Always shred all discarded documents that contain personal information (including name and addresses) and recycle using a trustworthy document destruction company. An advantage that identity and cyber criminals have on their side is the time to sift through and pull together information from everywhere.
