As Christians, we are called to be servants of God and of one another. Service calls for unselfishness and generosity, and we don't always find these easy. It is the Lord who calls us to service, so let us turn to him, and ask forgiveness for our failings, and for the help we need.

Lord Jesus, you call us to be good and faithful servants.

The Collect (special prayer for today)

Lord God, your Son left the riches of heaven and became poor for our sake: when we prosper save us from pride, when we are in need save us from despair, that we may trust in you alone; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore, from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, 'as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.'

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Luke 12:32-40

'Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

'Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks. Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves. 'But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.'

REFLECTION

An Irish priest once wrote, 'there are two ways of approaching life; one is either a planner or a pilgrim.'

According to him, the planner likes to have total control over his life, and to be able to plan each stage according to pre-set goals. Planners take their cue from what society considers success, and spend most of their time trying to match the lifestyle and values of others. They then become bitterly disappointed if they fall short of these objectives.

The pilgrim, on the other hand, is someone who accepts life as a gift that unfolds as we live it; for however hard we may try, we can never have complete control over what happens. The pilgrim is not deterred by failures and disappointments, but sees them as opportunities for spiritual growth. Unlike the planner, the pilgrim never feels entirely comfortable or at ease with society's values. It is by faith that the pilgrim lives. They know that life is full of risk, yet it is something they affirm; sensing the full insecurity of the human condition, the pilgrim rejoices in it. They put themselves into God's hands, thereby being fully open to the grace of God's protection. As Jesus said, 'Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom.'

Abraham is the great biblical model of faith; the quintessential pilgrim. Trusting totally in God, he uprooted himself, and his family, and set out for a land God promised to show him, and where he

would become the father of a great nation. It was a journey into the unknown; no satnay, no map; the only compass he had was his faith in God.

As spiritual descendants of Abraham, we are called to have faith like his. Life is full of uncertainty, and like Abraham we are journeying into the unknown. None of us knows what lies around the next bend in our life's journey. Yet, in spite of frustrations and failures we are called to journey on trusting in the strength and protection of God, homesick for his kingdom.

Meanwhile, like the servants Jesus talks about, we must strive to be faithful to God and to one another. The real test of faith is to be faithful in spite of setbacks and failures, even when that just means being faithful in small things, believing that our life **does** matter, and that we **can** make a difference. Amen
