READING Luke 20:27-38

Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to him and asked him a question, 'Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. Now there were seven brothers; the first married, and died childless; then the second and the third married

her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. Finally, the woman also died. In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her.' Jesus said to them, 'Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. Indeed they cannot die any more, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive.'

REFLECTION

Sadducees did not believe in the resurrection, and in our reading, some Sadducees came to Jesus with a story about a woman who had seven husbands, one after another. They wanted to know whose wife she would be in the resurrection. Their question was limited by human understanding, and Jesus countered this by explaining that in the life that they would enter, everything would be different. The Sadducees based their question on an obscure Old Testament law whereby if a woman was left a childless widow, her late husband's brother had to marry her and give her children. This applied, even if he was married already! In other words, the law of Moses ordered people to practise polygamy in some circumstances. Jesus cleverly avoided disagreeing with Moses, by counter-attacking the Sadducees attitude to resurrection. Like so many of the Jewish laws, this law sought to foster human well-being; without the support of a family, widows were likely to starve. Polygamy was necessary in a society where many men died in battle, leaving women unprotected unless they were taken as someone's second wife. The situation had changed by Jesus' time, when most marriages were monogamous. We talk about the unchanging Christian attitude to marriage, but in fact, our attitude has changed many times.

From the men of the Old Testament who had multiple wives, to the Romans for whom mistresses as well as a wife was often the norm, particularly with the ownership of slaves. From there, to the Feudal systems of the Middle Ages when serfs were at the beck and call of the Lord of the manor who often 'exercised his rights' despite already having a wife. And thence to the shameful abuse of African slaves by those who did not even count them as people; all the while retaining their respectability with their wife. (And don't forget the Church's involvement in slavery.). And through all of this, what Jesus said about self-sacrificing, caring love remained constant.

In our own day, the situation has changed again. Many people divorce and remarry; many couples don't bother to marry because they believe that 'living together' makes it easier if you ever want to split up. Homosexual relationships, which until relatively recent times were illegal in this country, and therefore had to be hidden can now, thankfully, be openly acknowledged and celebrated. We can't help who we fall in love with, and true love is surely something to be cherished by everyone.

Jesus condemned easy divorce, but that was to protect women, who, in his day, could be abandoned to starve on the flimsiest of excuses. He wasn't so much concerned with strict

rules, as with healthy relationships. Children feel more secure if their parents can stay together; men and women need the emotional security of knowing that their partner is loyal, and not sharing their affections with somebody else. So, the Christian attitude to marriage shouldn't consist of condemning irregular life styles but should concentrate more on relationships than on rules. Love, for the Christian, is a matter of behaving in caring way towards someone, whatever your feelings may be. Falling in love is something that can happen to anyone; it is an emotional response, and we have no control over it. Growing in love as the years go by is only possible if both parties make an effort to work at the relationship and show commitment to it through good times and bad. And the marriage service is a public declaration of that commitment.

So, despite the changing face of marriage down the ages, the message that Jesus gave remains unchanging. Jesus taught, and demonstrated that love must always be unselfish, unconditional, and even self-sacrificing. **Amen**
