Here's a scene we won't see the likes of until next Summer: Hive Beach fringed with sun-bathers and sea-bathers. With Autumn's Atlantic storm swells the waves will grow, the winds will batter the coast, the tides will knock and pluck at the shore. Just to the east of here, one of the wonders of the Chesil Beach begins to become apparent: the pebbles are graded in size, the bigger ones cropping up at the Portland end. It was said that in days gone by, experienced fishermen coming ashore in fog could tell exactly where they were on the Chesil bank by handling the pebbles, weighing them, testing them in their hands. It could well be that many of the fishermen of old would have been illiterate: their skills were tactile, learned through long apprenticeship.

Long before he was made king of Israel and Judah, David was a shepherdboy, learning the skills of flock-keeping. Predators needed warding off using a catapult; the same stone-throwing weapon could head off any flock that was heading in the direction of danger – all David had to do was aim at the leading sheep's nose and alarm the creature so that it changed direction. The rest would follow. When it came to engaging in single combat with the Philistine giant Goliath, David knew precisely which size of stones to select from a streambed, weighing them, testing them in his hands before putting them into the pouch which would supply his sling.

In the 13th century, John, the Abbot of Forde Abbey, preached a sermon in which he compared the shepherd-boy David with Jesus. Jesus selected five stones from the stream of our mortality: hunger, thirst, physical vulnerability, the need for shelter, the frailty that comes from simply being human as we risk disease and illness. Taking up these 'stones', weighing them, testing them in his hands, owning them, Jesus vanquished another kind of giant that looms over the world: death. The stones that both David and Jesus took were, John of Forde says, 'childish weapons' in the eyes of the world. Humility was the key to each of their victories.

Motor neurone disease makes my body feel increasingly stone-like. Bit by bit I'm tending to the earth out of which my substance was formed. But if I can trust that I'm becoming like one of those water-smoothed pebbles young David plucked out of the stream-bed, or one of those five 'stones' John of Forde wrote of, then I feel more secure: safe in the leather pouch of the shepherd-boy, safe in the hands of Jesus who owned the stones that come from the brook called 'mortality': hunger, thirst, physical vulnerability, the need for shelter, the frailty which comes from simply being human as we risk disease and illness.

JOBS TO DO IN OCTOBER

Plant cyclamen, divide congested clumps of hardy perennials and plant out wallflowers to flower next spring. Plant up amaryllis bulbs in pots. Sow next year's sweet peas in a cold greenhouse or frame. Lift and store tender summer bulbs and tubers. In the kitchen garden plant garlic, Calabrese and early-summer cauliflowers; sow hardy broad beans and peas under cloches. Condition soil as you clear it by sowing green manure or adding organic mulches of manure and well-rotted compost. Bring pots of herbs under cover to maintain crops during the autumn; plant out biennial herbs, such as parsley and chervil.

KEEP ON YOUR TOES!

Age UK Dorchester is advising older people living in Dorset, about the importance of caring for their feet. Due to health and

mobility problems, older people can sometimes struggle to reach their own feet, and they will develop some foot problems as they age, simply as a result of daily wear and tear.

Foot pain can be extremely debilitating, and over time it can become a significant health issue. If it becomes uncomfortable to walk for an older person, they are less likely to get out and about and take part in social activities or daily exercise that is vital for health and wellbeing. It is also important for older people to get their feet checked regularly, especially if they have a long-term condition such as diabetes or arthritis, as their feet are particularly vulnerable, and any problems should be reported to the GP as soon as possible. The right footwear is also essential, and wearing comfortable, well-fitting shoes, is important.

Good nail care can also help to keep feet feeling comfortable; however, many older people find it hard to clip their toenails properly, partly as they can be hard to reach, but also because they become tougher with age - nails that become too long can press against the end of the shoe and the constant pressure can cause soreness, infection or ulceration. Toenails that have been poorly cut can also become ingrown.






PUNCKNOWLE, SWYRE AND WEST BEXINGTON BOOK GROUP

This month's book was **'The Secret River'** by **Kate Grenville**. A novel describing the experience of a Thames waterman transported – for a minor theft - to New South Wales. Australia in

1806, and how he settled his family there, was made all the more poignant by the fact that this was a story based on the author's own family history. We all found the book compelling, beautifully written, clearly wellresearched and moving. However, the story, as it charts the poverty, desperation and fears of the family, and the escalating atrocities in conflicts between the isolated settlers and the Aboriginal people, is also a shocking and disturbing read. The book raised many issues and stimulated



a full discussion. We felt that the characters were well drawn, the landscape well understood, and we learnt much from the attention to historical detail. The vulnerability of the family, and other 'emancipists', in an inhospitable, wild landscape, and their different reactions to the threats they lived with, was convincing. We thought that the author handled the issues sensitively yet objectively. A powerful read!

BUS SERVICE

Dorset Community Transport have extended their trial period and will continue to provide a bus service every Wednesday to Bridport following the same route as the discontinued 210 bus service, but you need to book your place in advance. LITTON CHENEY PLAYGROUND PROJECT

Following on from the supply of the new smaller goalposts earlier this year,

repairs and improvements have started on the existing equipment. The two swing seats and chains have been replaced and the frame repainted. There is now a new basketball net and for the first time in many years, with the help of volunteers, the basketball hard standing has been trimmed and swept. The wooden 'castle' climbing frame is the next task which will include replacement timber, new rope, climbing footholds and repainting. There may be a couple of weeks where this will be out of commission while the work is undertaken.

By the time you read this, it will have been announced that the application for funds from the Big Lottery Fund has been accepted. This, along with individual donations and money gained from events held in the village, goes a long way towards reaching the required total of £13,375.24, which is the cost of the new and refurbished equipment.

It is intended to start the actual development in November and further updates will be announced in future editions of the Bride Valley News.
