If you think the hand seen extended in this photograph is real, look again. It is made of earthenware and belongs to the altar in the chapel at Bridport Community Hospital. The chaplain there, the Reverend Philip Ringer, bought this earthenware hand so that it could act as a nightlight holder. This photograph shows Philip explaining to me what happened on the day he brought the nightlight holder to the hospital. Holding it, he was walking between the car park and the



main entrance when a passer-by saw him and remarked on the strangely stony-looking appearance of his hand. Philip then explained in his usual cheery fashion that this was not some sort of prosthetic but an aid to prayer. I like this story for the way it reveals a strong part of Philip's ministry as a priest: in West Bay (his home) and Bridport and in the surrounding area (including our Benefice where Philip has helped lead services) he has a marvellous way in engaging folk in conversation and sharing his faith. Last month, Philip Ringer marked 25 years as a priest. We celebrate with him and thank him for his support of the ministry in the Bride Valley.

THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND DIOCESE OF SALISBURY

RURAL MINISTRY AND MISSION

Renewing Hope through Rural Ministry and Mission is our diocesan programme, supported by the national church, to enable



us to be a beacon diocese for the rural church across the country.

40% of Church of England worshippers are in rural congregations. In this diocese, 90% of parishes and 50% of the population is rural. Rural church has a unique dynamic, deeply rooted in the wider community.

Large rural multi-parish benefices need particular skills, and small congregations may not have sufficient numbers of people to do all the necessary jobs. Yet clergy in the countryside have always had an incarnational ministry and continue to be an important focus in their communities.

We want to continue investing in identifying, nurturing and training rural church leaders who, working with local congregations, will take hold of mission opportunities and move into church growth – in numbers, depth and impact.

We have developed *Renewing Hope through Rural Ministry and Mission* building on the commitment and enthusiasm for the principles underpinning the diocesan vision *Renewing Hope: Pray, Serve Grow*. It is designed to identify, enthuse and equip rural leaders of the future and resources those who now minister in rural contexts.

The four main strands:

- •Rural Ministry Experience Scheme for young adults (18-30) exploring God's call to ordained ministry in a rural setting.
- •A Rural Training Pathway to train and equip people for the specific challenges of ordained ministry in the countryside. The Pathway has been designed in conjunction with Sarum College. Licenced lay ministers

training in Sarum College will also be able to take part in the Rural placements element of this course.

- •Rural Placements to give serving clergy experience of rural ministry
- •A four-year development programme to support ordained and lay rural church leaders, in groups and as individuals as they lead their churches into growth, through local topic-based training and mentoring, seed-corn funding for mission projects and support from new local mission posts.

Perhaps you're worried about your elderly parents, relatives or a neighbour and how they're going to cope with another winter? Or maybe you're concerned about your own situation if your family have long flown the nest and are living away from you with busy lives themselves. Please don't despair. www.agespace.org/local/dorset - a one -stop online resource for people seeking advice and support on all things elderly care - has started in Dorset.

Age Space signposts to local care and health services and organisations, as well as providing practical help, advice and support for anyone dealing with a frail or dependent family member. At the heart of Age Space is a friendly forum to let off steam or seek answers when things get too much.



Co-founder **Annabel James**, 53, whose 83 year old father was born in Poole, and now lives in Wareham, wanted to create a resource that could help bridge the generation gap and encourage families to plan ahead and speak more about this trickiest of subjects.

"We're all living longer, but not necessarily in the best of health, while the NHS and social care services struggle to cope, and with particularly more women working, and having children later and families living further apart – it can be a very difficult time for many.

"Because of my own experience and that of my parents, who are in their 80's, I knew that Dorset would be the perfect area for our second local online hub.

"There is a lot of great information and organisations providing help in the county, but it can be hard to navigate, particularly in a crisis. I wanted to provide a single source and a trusted guide to help people make the best decisions with and for their elderly parents and relatives".

The Dorset site explains what resources you can find in the county and how to find them; how to access funding and what legal matters you should consider. The Dorset site also has information about living well and independently with guides to the help someone might need. Age Space Dorset is supported by Poole -based care agency Prama, Bournemouth based law firm Preston Redman, and financial advisers Poundbury Wealth Management in Dorchester.

Jobs to do in November

Brighten pots with winter bedding; hellebores and heathers perform well in cold weather. Cut back climbing roses. Plant tulip bulbs. Use straw to protect slightly tender perennials from frost and protect planted containers by wrapping them in bubble wrap or bring them into an unheated greenhouse or conservatory. Begin winter pruning, including hedge renovation and fruit trees. Bring prepared bulbs such as hyacinths into a well-lit area for flowers at Christmas. Stake tall stems of Brussels sprouts. Plant raspberry canes in well-manured soil. Plant or divide rhubarb crowns. Before lighting bonfires check they are clear of sheltering wildlife; clean out bird boxes; regularly clean bird feeders and bird baths.





WORMING & MICROCHIPPING DOGS

It seems that rarely a month goes by without the need to talk about dogs. This month there is the sad tale of two cows, Vanity & Bramble. If they had been human Vanity would be quite old, and Bramble would be the wrong side of middle age. Unfortunately Vanity and Bramble are no longer with us, having had to be recently culled from the herd. Both of these cows lost their calves in late pregnancy and have been culled because someone walking on the public footpath through their field couldn't be bothered to pick up their dog poo. In spite of informative signs at both ends of the footpath spelling out the details of what neospora is (a parasite), where it's found (dog poo), what it does (causes abortion), and how to prevent it (pick up dog poo) some delightful souls have chosen to let their dogs have a free rein through the field. 

September's book was **The Hidden Dance**, by **Susan Wooldridge**. Probably better known as an actress in roles such as that of Daphne Manners in Jewel in the Crown, this is her debut novel. Set between the two world wars, the story follows Lady Lily Sutton's escape from an abusive marriage, on the SS Etoile, a luxury liner travelling from Southampton to New York in 1933. Hiding in Steerage, or 3rd class, the clear boundaries of class and privilege are well established, and the historical setting, with an 'unthinkable' progression towards another war are hinted at in the prejudices of certain characters. It was interesting to

reflect on the strictly self-enforced taboos of those times about revealing any personal information, and the difficulty for women to escape domestic violence, especially when a child was involved.

While it was an easy read, it was generally agreed that there were perhaps too many characters and some fairly implausible situations, but, perhaps because of her acting experience, they were colourfully described and their different accents could be clearly 'heard'.
