FROM THE RECTORY

As we listen to the news, one thing that hardly seems to change is the division between the so called 'brexiteers' and the 'remainers'. As I write, the crucial Commons vote on Mrs May's plan is yet to take place, and the various groups in the multi-faceted argument are taking up increasingly more entrenched positions. So much time and energy are spent vocalizing one's own beliefs, that there is precious little time to listen to, let alone engage positively with, the point of view of 'the other'.

Working as a member of a multi-faith chaplaincy team gives me the opportunity to work closely with people whose journey of faith is quite different from my own. It would be easy to put up 'protective' barriers between us, and this would be so counter productive for each one of us as well as for those whom we serve. When we concentrate on what makes the other different, we move towards a form of tribalism; the 'them and us' syndrome which renders dialogue and understanding between the groups difficult.

In our multi-faith team we look first at our similarities; we are all people – we connect through our humanity; we are people of faith – we connect through our spirituality. Also there are the basic tenets of the different faiths; love, peace, charity. Of course, there are major differences and as we discuss them our understanding grows, and the richness of what we can offer within our specific context, and more generally, increases.

The theme for the February Songs of Praise in Burton Bradstock marks the UN Interfaith Harmony Week; an initiative which started in 2007. It called for Muslim and Christian leaders to engage in a dialogue based on two common fundamental religious Commandments; Love of God, and Love of the Neighbour. The World Interfaith Harmony Week extends the Two Commandments by adding 'Love of the Good, and Love of the Neighbour'. This formula includes all people of goodwill. It includes those of other faiths, and those with no faith.

Let us pray that this formula will be adopted everywhere where difference causes division and conflict.

BRIDE VALLEY GARDENING CLUB

The Bride Valley Gardening Club starts its new season on the evening of Monday March 18th with a talk on 'Pest and Disease Control'. At this meeting we will be providing details of the 2019 annual programme, information concerning these will be found on village noticeboards and in the BVN each month.

Jobs to do in February (weather permitting!):

Put a 5cm layer of mulch on pots and borders to suppress weed growth and conserve moisture. Tidy up over-wintering fuchsias by removing dead stems at the base and trim back to healthy buds. Continue planting new flowering shrubs. Clematis that flowers after June can be pruned hard, taking all stems back to healthy buds just above the base. February is a good month to prune all roses except ramblers. Sow hardy annuals under cover to plant out in spring. Continue preparing seed beds for vegetables and warm the soil with cloches. Sow broad beans, brussels sprouts and lettuces under cover. Plant out rhubarb crowns. Sprout early potatoes in warmth and light to produce strong shoots. Cut back any overgrown hedges before nesting starts. Continue to feed the birds and provide them with fresh water.

OUR NIGHT SKY IN FEBRUARY 2019

Jupiter will be rising in the South East at about 0400 in the morning, followed by brilliant Venus at about 0600 with Saturn following close behind, but much fainter. The southern night sky will be dominated by Orion and Sirius the faithful Dog Star twinkling brilliantly with all the colours of the spectrum, a glorious diamond through binoculars. If you have dark skies, look at the sword of Orion through binoculars and you will see a hazy patch which is a star forming region, where perhaps nascent stars like our Sun in its youth, may be forming their own solar system of planets, which brings me neatly onto the next subject of interest.

Well, if we thought that the Japanese mission to an asteroid to pick up and return material from the surface was a mission impossible, try this one for size. You are required, as a space navigator, to plot a mission, 4 years hence, to a small body 4,000 million miles away, using a spacecraft launched in 2006, which had already provided superb images of Pluto, then the furthest member of the solar system visited by a spacecraft. Your spacecraft is travelling at 30,000 mph away from Earth, and it will take a radio command to it from Earth, travelling at 186,000 miles per Second, 6 hours to reach it. Your target is a Kuiper Belt Object (KBO) and it has been imaged only by the Hubble Space Telescope, and then only to confirm its rough position and orbital details. If you make a mistake of a few seconds, your spacecraft will miss its target by a huge amount. That was the task given to The New Horizons spacecraft operators in 2015 after the successful fly by of Pluto, and it was accomplished magnificently when on the 1st of January, the spacecraft shot 2000 miles over Ultimate Thule, a strangely peanut shaped object, the information from which will provide astronomers with years of work to puzzle over the gigabytes of data slowly emerging from 4 billion miles away. More than encouraged by the success of this mission, the New Horizons team is now looking for another KBO to fly past. However, it becomes ever more challenging as the distance from Earth increases by 30,000 miles every hour, and the problems for the Space Navigators increase with it. I wish them every good fortune in their endeavours!

Next month, the Chinese lander on the far side of the Moon. How can we keep up with this plethora of space goodies?

who had time to stay in the Church for a few minutes afterwards.



The Light Between Oceans by M L Stedman.

The "Light" of the title is a lighthouse on a small island a hundred miles off Western Australia, between the Great Southern and Indian oceans. Tom Sherbourne, traumatised by his experiences in the First World War,

becomes a Lighthouse keeper. The solitude is challenging but he comes to love his job. But on leave, he falls in love with Isabel. They marry; she joins him on the island. They are happy until their baby is stillborn; she is devastated.

Soon afterwards, a boat is washed ashore bearing a dead man and miraculously, a live baby girl. There is no communication with the mainland until the boat comes to relieve them, and by then, they love the baby as their own and they let others believe she is theirs.....But later, when the child's true identity becomes known, heartbreak is inevitable. A tug of love ensues which no one can win. The small community is shaken as its beliefs are tested and the lives of the protagonists are changed for ever.

Members enjoyed the description of lighthouse-keeping but were generally less impressed by the second half of the book.

2017 Grand Draw Update



Hall Caretaker Vacancy

Do you want to get involved in Village life and earn some money at the same time? The Village Hall is at the heart of a wide ranging set of activities from many Village based groups and is looking for a caretaker to provide a small range of services.

The main responsibilities are to ensure equipment needed by users such as tables and chairs are available inside the Hall, regular weekly safety checks of fire alarms safety lights and defibrillator, putting bins out to schedule, leasing with contractors on larger repair jobs and carrying out minor repairs as they arise (light bulbs, batteries etc). The role does not involve interior cleaning, which is handled separately. Currently the role qualifies for a monthly payment of £200.

It is estimated at being on average about 4 hours a week, in a number of short visits, so would suit someone local to the Hall. The only physical requirement is the ability to move tables and chairs from storage sheds to Hall and back. There are wheeled trolleys to assist.

Those who have filled the role before say it gets them really involved with a lot of Village activities. It is currently being handled on a rota basis by committee members, who agree that 4 hours a week on average is correct.
