## FROM THE RECTORY

#### Encourage one another

On 12th June it will be 52 years since, as a fresh faced 19 year old, I stood on the corner of Regency Street, S.W.1 waiting to walk the few paces to Peel House and join the Metropolitan Police. Throughout my police career it was always my privilege, and indeed my duty, to give and receive encouragement from a variety of sources, including, quite often, the British public.

That attitude to life has stayed with me right until the present time - encourage one another. To offer criticism and negative feed back is almost too easy and, therefore, the easy option in many situations. However, to encourage someone, by what we say or do, or how we react, can be far more challenging.

On 11th June the Church remembers Barnabas, who was a great encourager and is said to be the patron saint of policemen. He is known for his work as a peacemaker and that quality renders him entirely appropriate to be associated with the police service, who essentially are concerned with keeping and preserving the peace.

The name Barnabas means 'son of consolation'. Although not one of the twelve, he is known as an Apostle and especially honoured for his work with Paul in the early Church. After Paul's unexpected conversion, Barnabas persuaded the nervous Apostles to trust their old enemy. He was chosen to encourage and instruct the young church at Antioch.

Through the ages there have been many people who have actively encouraged others to pursue the way of faith, I am sure we could all make a long list of those who have encouraged us on our journey over the years.

Today, my ministry as the Hospital Chaplain is mainly about encouraging others: patients, their families, members of staff and volunteers on their journey of faith. Listening unconditionally to their stories is a privilege and one I value enormously. My response to their often quite unusual requests always has to be given in a spirit of encouragement.

So please pray for the work of the Hospital Chaplaincy, as we pray regularly for all of you, and encourage one another.

#### Jobs to do in June

Plant out pot-grown dahlias and cannas; tender summer bedding; halfhardy annuals and tender perennials in containers. Sow delphiniums, lupins and hollyhocks outside. Support young sweet pea plants; train clematis and climbing roses. If possible leave a few nettle patches to provide essential food for the caterpillars of some of our best known butterflies.

Keep sowing salad vegetables. Plant out runner beans against supports, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes and sweetcorn. Plant out brassicas and protect them from birds and caterpillars. Sow annual herbs like basil, parsley and coriander.

## From Dorset Council - Final stage in the preparation of the Mineral Sites Plan – <u>Are you affected?</u>

The Mineral Sites Plan, once adopted, will include site allocations and policies to maintain mineral production in the future. This includes sites for quarrying sand and gravel, crushed rock and building stone. The Plan should ensure that we protect Dorset's environment whilst building a sustainable economy for the future.

Over the last six months an examination has been taking place to assess whether the Mineral Sites Plan has been prepared in accordance with legal and procedural requirements. This included a series of public hearing sessions during 27 September to 3 October 2018, with an additional hearing session held on 14 February 2019.

# Between 9th May and 20th June stakeholders will have the opportunity to comment on the modifications that arose through the examination process.

Following the consultation, the modifications will be passed to the Inspector who will consider them when preparing the final report. The Councils then hope to adopt the Plan later in 2019.

## Our Night Sky in June 2019

Jupiter is now beginning to put in an appearance, but will always remain low in the South during the night, but at least it is now visible after nightfall, although darkness is now at its latest. It is followed by Saturn, fainter than Jupiter but still unmistakably a planet, since it shines with a steady yellowish light rather than twinkling like a star. Both are well worth observing through a telescope, and even the smallest will show the 4 Galilean moons in their daily dance round Jupiter, and the sight of the rings round Saturn have started many an astronomer on his later career. Venus is now lost in the dawn sky, and we will have to wait until December for it to reappear as an evening "star".

Now we all remember how delightfully warm the Sun was during the Easter break; however, for the Parker Solar Probe, things were definitely hotter. It has successfully completed its second close approach to the Sun, called perihelion, and is now entering the outbound phase of its second solar orbit. On April 4, 2019, the spacecraft passed within 15 million miles of our star, and during this perihelion, the Parker Solar Probe was traveling at 213,200 miles per hour, and is the first spacecraft to get this close to the Sun. The mission includes 24 orbits around the star, with its closest and final approach bringing it to within 3.7 million miles from the Sun's surface. This is shorter than one-eighth the distance between the star and Mercury.

While one might think the sun is cooler as you move away from its centre, that's not the case: The corona, which is the outer layer of the Sun's atmosphere, is significantly warmer than the solar surface underneath it — about 300 times hotter. An important mission objective is to sample the plasma of the corona to see what physical processes are going on that create this puzzling temperature inversion.

But how do the spacecraft instruments survive the blistering temperatures on the outside? It has a solar shield, mounted on the Sun-facing side of the spacecraft, 2.3 m (7.5 ft.) in diameter, 11.4 cm (4.5 in) thick, and is made of reinforced carbon-carbon composite, which is designed to withstand temperatures outside the spacecraft of about 1,370 °C (2,500 °F) while keeping the instruments at a pleasant and working 15 degrees C.

So far, the probe has been a tremendous success, but it has yet to endure the even more extreme conditions when it carries out its final orbit.

I hope to tell you of some of its fascinating discoveries in a later article.



## BURTON BRADSTOCK CE SCHOOL Ofsted Inspecton

The Spring Term ended with a two day Ofsted Inspection and we received our report at the start of the Summer Term. We were overjoyed to find



that the inspector graded all areas of the school as securely 'good' and there is a great deal within the report that is worth celebrating.

The inspector described our school as having a 'welcoming and inclusive school culture' and it was recognised that 'parents are highly supportive of the school" and that they 'value the nurturing school culture and the good communication that exists between home and school.'

The inspector also recognised how effective our Governors are and commented that they are '*highly committed*' and '*bring a range of skills and experience*' to their role. In addition, he recognised the benefits and the support that we have gained from being part of the Minerva Learning Trust.

The staff were praised for having '*high expectations of pupils' behaviour and what they can achieve'* and that the '*dynamic, positive atmosphere'* in the classrooms support our pupils to become successful learners.

Our pupils demonstrated to the inspector what amazing young people they are and I am proud that their achievements, behaviour and commitment to learning were praised in the report. These include:

• 'Pupils are keen to follow the guidance they receive from their teachers about how they can improve their work. Pupils want to produce the best work they can'

- 'Pupils are polite, friendly and good-natured. They are inquisitive, curious and keen to try different activities'
- 'Pupils across the school make good progress because they are well taught and enjoy their different subjects'
- 'Pupils are attentive to staff and each other, they are well equipped and settle to tasks quickly'
- 'Pupils take pride in the work they produce and present it to a high standard, regardless of their ability or background'
- Early Years staff have high expectations of children and establish routines for learning from the outset.

This approach helps children to 'hit the ground running' and make good progress'

## The Litton Cheney Trust

The Litton Cheney Trust was formed in 1992, combining several historic charities in the Parish. While its formal purpose is to relieve "either generally or individually persons resident in the Parish of Litton Cheney who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress by making grants of money", the trustees have more recently also made grants towards projects which benefit the village generally.

In 2018, grants were made to young people going into higher and further education or apprenticeships, and as Christmas gifts to older residents on limited means. Grants were also made towards the re-hanging and lighting of the village tapestry in LATCH, the re-thatching of the bus shelter, and construction of a retaining wall in the parking area below the church.

In addition to the Rector of the Bride Valley Benefice the current Trustees are Freddie Spicer (Secretary - 482617), Richard Jones (Treasurer - 482602), Penny Dewar and Lyn Lacey. The trustees welcome enquiries and grant applications, which should be made to the Secretary. The accounts for 2018 may be inspected on application to the Treasurer.

The trustees invite applications for a grant, which are readily available, from students resident in Litton Cheney who will be proceeding to higher education and those leaving school or college who will be commencing full time employment or an apprenticeship. Please apply in writing giving brief details of your plans on leaving school. Those who have already received a grant from the Trust and are continuing with a second or subsequent year of study are invited to reapply for annual payments.

#### **Reflection of a Local Maundy Money Recepient**

I'm not exactly sure how you're meant to feel when an envelope from Buckingham Palace drops on your door mat containing an invitation to be a Maundy Recipient but maybe disbelieving, honoured, privileged, daunted and of course excited would have to feature.





A few months, and several security checks, later the day was upon us – Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> April 2019. The day dawned a little cold and foggy but soon cleared into a beautiful spring morning. From the car park, after passing security, we were transported past the moat and the bank of primroses, by bus, to just outside St George's Chapel, Windsor. We were shown to our seats on the south side of the chapel and were briefed by the Lord High Almoner before the service began. At this point I felt incredibly nervous but once Her Majesty

joined us and the service was underway the peace of the chapel and the worship calmed things no end.

The Queen distributed the Maundy Money in two groups. We were in the second group and so had plenty of time to watch those who went before. What stood out time and time again was the moment that the Queen took to look each recipient in the eye and to congratulate them, ensuring that each person felt recognised and treasured. The whole service was

punctuated with deeply moving moments as people processed what it means to serve and to be served – reflecting upon the service of Christ washing his disciples feet at the last super and his service upon the cross; alongside the Queen's life time of service to the country.

After the service, we attended a reception in the State Room Apartments of Windsor Castle which allowed ample time to mingle with and chat to other recipients from across the whole of the UK (and beyond) and to hear their stories as to why they had been chosen.

I am still none the wiser as to why I was actually recommended but when asked, I explained that our Bride Valley Churches have been through a hard time with the loss of two serving rectors in quite close succession. I said that the benefice churches are supported, especially in extended interregnum, by a whole host of volunteers who serve practically in the church, help with maintenance, fetes, churchyard upkeep, serve on the PCC or as church wardens. So I was, in effect, representing the whole benefice of the Bride Valley churches in receiving recognition for services to church and community.

It was a truly memorable and marvellous day – a great and wonderful privilege.


