FROM THE RECTORY

God is love and those who live in love, live in God and God lives in them. 1 John 4.16

I have just conducted my first wedding as Rector of the Bride Valley and I can't begin to describe what an absolute privilege marrying couples is, celebrating their love together with family and friends. There's a very special moment during the service when the priest 'declares' that they are now husband and wife. Of course, it is not just the actual wedding day, it's getting to know them beforehand and being involved with the couple from the time they book their date, helping them to plan their special ceremony and to think about what marriage means to them as individuals and as a couple is also an honour. It's amazing what I get to find out!

I love the part of the marriage preface which reads: "Marriage is a way of life made holy by God, and blessed by the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ with those celebrating a wedding at Cana in Galilee. Marriage is a sign of unity and loyalty which all should uphold and honour. **It enriches society and strengthens community.**" Earlier this year I travelled to Cana as a pilgrim and visited the site where this miracle is believed to have taken place.

Next year is a leap year and as we are known as the 'Bride' Valley I thought that it would be great to have a sort of celebration of weddings across our churches. (Yes, I know it's about the River Bride really, but let's play on words for a bit of fun!) We are going to hold a Wedding Festival, a real celebration of weddings in all of our churches. A different theme in each one. Predictably we have chosen Valentine's Day to kick the whole thing off.

Save the date: 14th - 16th February 2020!

The plan is to start the celebration with a special service and then each of our churches will be responsible for a wedding themed display. If you'd like to be involved with this, especially if you got married yourself in one of our churches and have some photographs or memorabilia, please get in touch with one of the churchwardens or myself. I'm hoping it will be something we can all enjoy together and we will be encouraging the couples who are getting married next year in our churches to join in as well.

We have some beautiful churches across the Bride Valley, each one with its own unique story to tell. Churches are more than bricks and mortar, they are a community of people gathering together in relationship with God through Jesus Christ, attempting to live out their faith. The question is: what does this actually mean for us all here and now in the 21st century?

In an attempt to explore just that, during October I will be holding 'Listen and Learn' sessions in each of the villages and hope this will be an opportunity for me to get to know more about what's shaped our churches' recent history and to learn together which direction we think God will be taking us in the future as a community. If you would like to be part of these important conversations, even if you don't currently attend church, even if you've never been to church, then please get in touch to find out more and/or to book a place. I'd love to hear your views.

Jane has been appointed to her first position as Rector having previously been an Assistant Curate at Wareham. Originally from Pembrokeshire Jane and her husband Nigel settled in Dorset 15 years ago with their three young daughters. An experienced nurse specialist, she then became Matron of Swanage and Wareham Hospitals. Following a call to ordination she trained at Ripon College, Cuddesdon in Oxfordshire, studying



Theology, Ministry and Mission. Jane was ordained at Salisbury Cathedral in 2016. Jane is excited about joining the Bride Valley Benefice and looks forward to getting to know everyone and discovering together God's mission for the area.

The Bride Valley Book Club Review

The Martian by Andy Weir

This is a sci-fi book for people who don't like sci-fi. What would you do if you were part of a manned mission to Mars and through a freak accident you were left behind, alone? How would you survive? Could you be rescued?

This is the dilemma faced by Mark - Andy Weir's astronaut - whose diary of his existence on the red planet forms much of the book.

This is interspersed with the scientists at NASA who, when they realise he's not dead, frantically try to work out a rescue plan. His crew mates, in their ship on the way back to Earth are not told of his survival for some time, then their involvement also forms part of the story.

It's a riveting read with a lot of technical scientific detail - Weir is the son of two scientists and also works on computer games. He researched the science to make it as accurate and realistic as possible. There's plenty of humour too and suspense.

We all agreed it was a rattling good read. You may recall the film version that came out a few years ago with Matt Damon - a good adaptation but the book is well worth a read.

BRIDE VALLEY GARDENING CLUB



In July we split into two groups to visit Ourganics, in Litton Cheney, the off-grid market garden and home belonging to Pat Bowcock. Pat introduced us to the concept of 'permaculture' where, based on the ethics of 'Earth Care, People Care and Fair Share', the sustainable system is designed to maximise yield using least energy.

On September 16th we will be welcoming Neil Lovesey to speak on 'The Year at Picket Lane Nursery'.

Visitors are always welcome to our meeting which begins at 7.30pm in the Village Hall in Puncknowle, entrance $\pounds 2$.

Jobs to do in September

Plant new perennials so they can benefit from the warm soil, but tender perennials may need to be dug up and overwintered indoors if early frosts are forecast.

Keep your late-summer flowering plants in bloom for as long as possible by deadheading them regularly.

Prepared hyacinth bulbs can be planted now for flowers at Christmas.

Gather and destroy leaves from roses with blackspot or mildew to stop spores spreading.

Sow hardy annuals for flowering next year. Replace summer bedding with winter pansies, polyanthus and wallflowers.

Plant out spring cabbages, garlic and autumn onion sets. Sage, marjoram, hyssop and thyme will all root easily from cuttings taken now. Establish new strawberry plants while the soil is warm. Prune blackberries and summer raspberries by removing old canes.

Net ponds in preparation for leaf fall.

Our Night Sky in September 2019

Jupiter will be setting by 2100, with Saturn following by midnight Venus is still too close to the Sun to be visible. However, the winter constellations will be rising in the east to compensate.

While we have had Jupiter all summer low in the southern sky, it is worth remembering how its huge gravitational attraction helps to protect Earth and the inner planets from marauding comets and asteroids.

It was 25 years ago that we were able to witness the dramatic break up of the comet Shoemaker Levy in July 1992, followed by the pieces hurtling into Jupiter's upper atmosphere leaving black marks which lasted for weeks.

This was the first collision of two solar system bodies ever to be observed, and the effects of the comet impacts on Jupiter's atmosphere have been simply spectacular and beyond expectations. Comet Shoemaker-Levy 9 consisted of at least 21 discernible fragments with diameters estimated at up to 2 kilometres. Had the comet struck the Earth, the resulting nuclear winter would probably have wiped out the majority of life, including human beings.

So the next time you look at Jupiter shining brightly, you might want to offer him a little thank you for protecting us from that particular disaster.

C2 School Bus- Little Bredy, Long Bredy, Litton Cheney, Askerswell, Shipton Gorge.

It seems highly possible that the **C2** school bus service that has up until now been serviced by single-decker buses will morph into a double-decker bus at the start of the school year in September despite numerous protestations from several Bride Valley Parish Councils and affected local residents. Should this indeed come to be, please pass on to your parish council any information regarding incidents and service related issues so this in turn can be passed to Dorset Council and the bus company.

Bride Valley Bus Service provided by Dorset Community Transport As from Wednesday 4th September the service will change to alternate Wednesdays and alternate Saturdays. Therefore during the month of September there will be a Wednesday service on 4th and 18th September, and a Saturday service on 14th and 28th September. The next Wednesday service in October will be on 2nd.

All present subscribers have been informed by letter of these new arrangements which will be for a trial period until the end of December. The future of this service will be dependent on the support the service receives. **Bride Valley Dial-a-Bus Service**

Sadly this service has been discontinued supposedly through lack of use and because it is partly duplicated by other services on offer. The Axe Valley & West Dorset Ring & Ride service is not affected and can be contacted on 01404 46520.

Bridport Museum Trustee Keith Hatch said: "It was a real coup for the Museum to bring Turners painting to Bridport, and it has been inspiring to see so many local people get involved by attending the exhibition and the many linked events around town. At 1.30pm on 24th September 1919, most of the village of Cerne Abbas was put up for sale at auction in Dorchester Town Hall by the Pitt-Rivers family who had owned it since 1705. **The same family owned Burton Bradstock until the 1950's**

With the assistance of a grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Cerne Historical Society is organising a major exhibition to mark this pivotal moment in the history of the village.

This will take place in Cerne Abbas Church, situated on Abbey Street, between the 25th September and 4th October, daily between 10am and 5pm, except for the 28th September. Admission is free.

The Sale included houses, shops, farms, pubs and plots of land. Sold in 73 lots, the Sale raised $\pounds 67,402$ for the family. Using original sale particulars and plans, maps, newspaper articles and photos, the exhibition will take visitors back in time to explore what the village was like in 1919.

St Michael and All Angels

Although we were not among our new Rector's first few services here, we can at least claim that on the 26th July Littlebredy subjected her to the first of the many PCC Meetings which will be a feature of her time among us. Let

us hope it has not put her off these essential but sometimes less than rivetting occasions for good...

By the time these words are read, the scaffolding should have been removed from the Church and the roof should be watertight once again. The new stone slates look glaringly white for the moment, but no doubt they will weather with time, and we hope they will last for two hundred years, as have most of their predecessors. Many thanks indeed to Crumbleholme Builders, who carried out the restoration works, and who have accepted an invitation to our Harvest Thanksgiving service and Harvest Supper – see below.

The Harvest Thanksgiving will take place on Sunday 13th October, with the service in Church at 5.00 p.m. (no 11.00 a.m. service here that day), followed by the Supper at about 6.00 p.m. Between now and then, villagers will be contacted to see whether they can come and, if so, what contribution to the Supper they can bring. Ben and Charlie are envisaging another "Bake-Off", with villagers' offerings of home-made bread being laid on the altar and later judged before consumption at the supper, but details must await the next edition.

In the meanwhile, there will sadly be less of a village contribution than usual towards the <u>Dorset Historic Churches Trust "Ride and Stride" event,</u> <u>which will take place on Saturday 7th September</u>. However, Tim & Angela Laycock are hoping to contribute in some way, and will welcome offers of sponsorship for whatever they undertake: please contact them on 482443 if you would like to help towards the cause (50% comes back to our Church). It will be recalled that the DHCT has made a generous grant towards the roof repairs, as advertised by their roadside notice, so we should reciprocate with continued support for this valuable charity if we can. It is a pity that, with our Patronal Festival, Michaelmas Day, exactly falling on a fifth Sunday in the month this year, and without there having been a summer fifth Sunday for the customary service and lakeside picnic here, it is not Littlebredy's turn for the Valley's United Service that day. At the end of June we rang for the funeral of Margaret Cook, the oldest resident of Long Bredy. It was an honour to do this for her and her family,

Bottleknapp Burials

After two weeks' hard work, the archaeologists have departed and Bottleknapp field has now returned to its normal status as sheep grazing. The sheep do not realise that beneath their feet rest three skeletons buried there possibly 3000 years ago and the recent archaeological dig has raised more questions than answers at this time. Dr, Martin Papworth, the National Trust Archaeologist for the South West, and his team were unendingly patient answering questions from all who visited the site. They have agreed that when the results of various tests come back and information is collated they will come back to Long Bredy and give us a talk, most likely not until next year.

Dog Owners

The Parish Council are aware of a number of concerns raised by residents relating to dogs. There are three areas of complaint:

Excessive Noise (Barking)

Dog Fouling

Unsupervised Wandering

Excessive barking, often at night, is causing a disturbance and is affecting quality of life.

Fouling of footpaths and public spaces is unpleasant, unsightly and a health hazard.

Dogs wandering alone are a danger to traffic and potentially a risk to livestock.

Dog owners are asked to consider these concerns and to take steps to prevent any of these behaviours by their animal(s). Residents who feel they are affected by any of these issues are reminded that a polite request to the owner of the offending dog is usually effective but the following avenues can also be pursued if the situation persists.

Excessive noise , Dog Fouling and Dogs Straying can be reported on line to Dorset Council, Environmental Health, Dog Warden Services by visiting the Dorset Council Website and searching for Dog Warden Services. There is some very helpful and clear advice on this site.

In the case of a dog worrying livestock the matter can be reported to Dorset Police.

The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday, September 30th at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.




