FROM THE RECTORY

Since the middle of March, our entire nation has been in a state of getting and giving conflicting advice, contradictory notifications, and counsel which has left most of us feeling that we are being pulled in two different directions. How do we stay safe and yet have access to fresh food, supplies and medicine? How do we keep in contact with others when we have to stay indoors and possibly have not yet mastered new technology? How do we still prioritise the things which up until mid-March seemed so important and yet now are not available to us? How do we keep our mental health buoyant when others around us seem to be crumbling?

The Church here in the UK has come under a lot of scrutiny recently and many opinions have been aired as to what part churches have played in keeping us safe as a nation but also spiritually nourished. Many people have exceeded all expectations to ensure that worship continued during Lockdown, although possibly in a new way than has ever been seen before. This was a brief time in history when new skills had to be mastered and delivered at lightning speed and everyone was expected to work outside of their normal comfort zones. We have learned how to get the perfect angle for laptops, taught people how to turn their microphones and their camera on whilst helping people access Zoom and other online support. Some of us have even attended online choir practice and created the most beautiful sounds for use in our services so that we are able to have hymns even though we are not able to currently sing in our churches.

As we slowly see restrictions being lifted, new challenges arise and we have to make decisions as to what is best for our own context and circumstances. Worship has taken place in our churches almost without interruption for hundreds of years and yet we've realised that we cannot just re-open our doors for public gatherings and services like we did before we had even heard the word Coronavirus.

Various people from the congregations have discussed how we would be able to open for private prayer and public worship, putting into place all that needed to happen to do that safely for those who find the building a sanctuary and especially at this stage need to access the church and sit quietly.

What I have witnessed is a genuine concern to do the right thing and create a safe space for prayer and worship to continue, be that in our own homes via the telephone service or back in our church buildings. My hope is that we carry on at our own pace discovering the best way for us all to encounter God, hear his still small voice and shine our lights for Jesus wherever we are. As we take small steps into the future, I am reminded of this prayer by Barbara Glasson:

We are not people of fear: we are people of courage.


We are not people who protect our own safety: we are people who protect our neighbours' safety.

Our Night Sky in August 2020

Jupiter followed by Saturn will be visible as soon as it is dark, and will dominate the southern sky throughout the night. Mars will be following, rising about 2300, and again visible throughout the night, its red colour obvious as it approaches its closest to Earth. Venus will greet the early risers at about 0300 in the morning, rising as a brilliant "Morning Star" in the North East, and remaining a brilliant object until dawn breaks.

I wonder how many of you were fortunate enough to see Comet Neowise which appeared last month. The comet cruised just inside Mercury's orbit on July 3. This very close passage by the Sun cooked the comet's outermost layers, causing gas and dust to erupt off the icy surface and creating a large tail of debris. Comets are unpredictable objects, sometimes producing magnificent tails, and sometimes just a disappointing blob in the sky. This happened to the last appearance of the famous Halley's comet which when it appeared in the early 20th century, sported the finest tail seen for many years. However, on its much heralded return 70 years later it could hardly be seen at all, having exhausted all its ice on its previous encounter with the Sun.

Comets are cosmic snowballs of frozen gases, rock and dust that orbit the Sun. When frozen, they are the size of a small town. When a comet's orbit brings it close to the Sun, it heats up and spews dust and gases into a giant glowing head larger than most planets. Most originate in the Oort cloud which is the most distant region of our solar system. Even the nearest objects in the Oort Cloud are thought to be many times farther from the Sun than the outer reaches of the <u>Kuiper Belt.</u>

Unlike the orbits of the planets and the Kuiper Belt, which lie mostly in the same flat disk around the Sun, the Oort Cloud is believed to be a giant spherical shell surrounding the rest of the solar system. It is like a big, thick-walled bubble made of icy pieces of space debris the sizes of mountains. Because the orbits of long-period comets are so extremely long, scientists suspect that the Oort Cloud is the source of most of those comets. Comets are occasionally diverted into the inner solar system by a gravitational tug from one of the outer planets, and it is one of these that has not been round the Sun before that can produce a fine tail if it has plenty of ice from its birth. Comets are important since they consist of pristine material formed at the time of the birth of the Solar System 4.5 Billion years ago and, because they are so distant from the Sun, they have not been affected by its radiation.

Comet 67P/ Churyumov-Gerasimenko made history as the first comet to be orbited and landed upon by robots from Earth. The <u>Rosetta</u> spacecraft, carrying the Philae lander, rendezvoued with this comet in August 2014 and escorted it on its journey to the inner solar system and back out again. The comet's nucleus is thought to be quite porous, giving it a density much lower than that of water. When heated by the Sun, it is thought to emit about twice as much dust as gas.

When a comet transits the orbit of Earth round the Sun, it leaves a cloud of debris through which the Earth travels each year. This cloud of debris provides the meteors and meteorites that flash across the sky at regular times of the year, and August is famous for the appearance of the Perseids between 11 and 13 August. Well worth lying out on a sunbed, wrapping up well and gazing up at the sky to see these brilliant leftovers of a comet that passed through Earth's orbit long ago.

Jobs to do in August

While August is the month when the club takes a break and encourages

everyone to 'take a well-earned rest and enjoy the garden' there are always jobs to do. Keep watering and feeding flowers to maintain your displays. Cut back hardy geraniums, prune lavender and rambling roses. New plants can be established from cuttings of tender perennials such as pelargoniums and fuchsias or by collecting seed from many border plants. Remove any seed pods from sweet peas to prolong flowering. Take cuttings from tender perennials. Keep camellias well-watered.

Feed salad crops in containers with a high-nitrogen liquid fertiliser; use a high potash feed for tomatoes to encourage ripening. Harvest or pinch out basil frequently for bushier growth.



Sam McLaren is one of the finalists. He is a Service Improvement Analyst and has been shortlisted as Young Digital Leader of the year. Sam said it's good for Dorset Council to be recognised, for not only one award but three: "Dorset Council have the ambition to be a digital council in a digital place and for somewhere rural like Dorset it's important to improve the rural communities with better infrastructure and newer technology. "I think the main reason we were nominated is because we are passionate and ambitious and doing things outside the box, like developing a podcast or an internal network. "We developed the first digital local government podcast which we've been using to get our voice out and start having discussions about what digital is and how we can improve.

The local authority also has two finalists in the Digital Public Service Innovation of the Year category.

They've been working on the project 'supporting children and young people', to help identify vulnerable learners, giving them a better start in life and the right education at the right time.

The Project has also been shortlisted as a finalist this year in the Cabinet Officer Smarter Working Awards in the technology category under 'Small Scale Project'.

Deputy Leader of Dorset Council, Peter Wharf said:

"The recent COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the value that digital can bring to our lives and the need for collaborative working. I am proud to say that as a county we are clearly in good hands. What a great achievement to have three finalists in the awards this year, all of whom represent our vision to position Dorset as a leader in digital transformation."

We have now got a simple food offering every evening, and are hoping to start opening weekday lunchtimes again soon, at least for the summer. Fish Fridays have been great and are here to stay! Give us a call to book your slot!

Sunday BBQ's will also continue through the summer holidays, weather permitting, then we'll switch to our ever popular Sunday roast.

Takeaway Curry Night is also going well, but we are planning to add a pub menu to that shortly. Watch this space.

Prescriptions can now be collected during pub opening times.

We hope you're all well and we look forward to seeing you in August - Andy & Liz.

Burton Bradstock Village Hall Village Hall re-opening


News from Friends of the Post Office/Farm Shop
