PCC Meetings

The PCC met 7 times during 2015 with an average attendance of 83%

Review of the Year

The Church Electoral Roll- the number on the electoral roll is 88 (2015 - 88), 87 within the parish and one outside the parish. 3 names have been removed from the Roll and 3 added.

The average Sunday attendance at services through the year was 53 adults + 3 children (52 + 2 children). The attendance on Easter Day was 103 adults + 15 children (89). The attendance on Christmas Eve was 81 + 13 and Christmas Day was 67 + 9 (52). There were 3 (4) Baptisms and 3 (5) weddings during the year.

Organists:

David Woodford continued as our regular organist throughout the year, supported by Julian Piper and Heather Rogers. We thank them for ensuring we have organ music for our regular services.

Highlights of the year included:

- (a) The Summer fete which raised £7038 (£6061) in August
- (b) Carol singing around the village was very successful again this year and raised £210.09 (£198.99) for the Children's Society

Chairman's Overview

This Spring's memorial service at Sherborne Abbey for Gil Williams who for ten years chaired the Salisbury Diocesan Board of Finance served as a reminder of the way in which discipleship involves the harnessing of our individual gifts with the needs of stewardship. Gil, who was successful in business as an early entrepreneur in the computer industry freely gave of his gifts in advising and leading financial strategies for Salisbury Diocese. Gil was one who did not separate financial responsibility from mission. And along with the PCC's commitment to review and consolidate the flow of finances through St. Mary's goes the responsibility of seeking forms of outreach and mission which will help the church to grow here. A forthcoming weekend focussed on Stewardship and an 'away-day' for the newly constituted PCC will help us form strategies and responses to future needs, in respect to both finance and mission, as well as our worshipping life.

Christian giving, of course, does not rest only in the way we direct our finances; there are many ways folk here in Burton Bradstock give their support to the ongoing life of the Church. One of these is bell ringing. The village is blessed in having a solid team who practice each week and who ring before services as well as for significant civil anniversaries. Thank you to our bell team for their expertise and excellence. And the recent efforts in church cleaning was eloquent of the intertwining of church and village life: there was great support from a wide range of people who gave up their time to direct their energy toward a thorough Spring clean that left St. Mary's gleaming from its flooring to its roof timbers.

A big thank you to all, especially our churchwardens Ian & Chrissie and our Benefice administrator Lesley and my colleagues here in the villages for their support during my first year as Rector in the Bride Valley.

The money raised through the BVN means that the parishes have less to pay to support the work of the clergy in the Benefice. Burton Bradstock's contribution this year was maintained at last year's level, £2520.

Treasurer's Report for St. Mary's Burton Bradstock with Chilcombe 2015 Financial Review

Throughout this report the following definitions apply:

Unrestricted Funds may be used by the PCC for any of its ordinary purposes.

Designated Funds represent sums set aside, out of ordinary unrestricted funds, for specific designated purposes, but they can be transferred back at any time.

Restricted Funds may be expended only on those restricted objects specified in the original bequest or specific purpose for which donations were invited.

Total receipts on unrestricted funds were £38,344 of which £18,992 was planned giving, £9,605 unrestricted voluntary donations and £4,321 from Gift Aid.

Special fund raising efforts resulted in a further £2,277.

Restricted receipts of £11,684 were received largely owing to over £7000 (net) raised for the fabric fund at the Church Fete and 1 legacy received for the maintenance of the Clock and Bells.

Planned giving through envelopes and banker's orders increased by 12% and total income went up by 12% also.

£44,634 was spent from unrestricted funds to provide the Christian ministry from St Mary's & Chilcombe including the £32,746 contribution to the Diocese parish share (88% of which is spent on Parish Ministry, including stipends and housing, and Parish Resources).

The parish share sum that the churches in the Deanery have to find is shared between the churches according to a formula that is based mainly on a head count of the church membership multiplied by a categorised average amount per member. We have to find more of the sum than most of the other churches in our Deanery as our membership number of 65 is greater than most. Whilst acknowledging that some members can give more and some less, the Diocese categorises our church at £415 per member per year (£8 per week). Our planned giving receipts in 2015 equated to an average of £300 per member (£6 per week).

£9532 was spent from restricted funds as detailed in the Financial Statements.

The net outcome for the year was a shortfall of receipts over payments on *unrestricted funds* of £6,289 and an excess of receipts over payments on *restricted funds* of £2,227 giving an overall reduction in our reserves of £4138.

The shortfall in *unrestricted receipts* over payments caused difficulty in paying our Parish Share which brought about a review of funds with the assistance of the deanery treasurer. Some money that was not restricted at donation but had been designated to the Fabric fund was identified along with transfers that could be made to cover previous fabric work payments. The PCC actioned appropriate transfers which increased the unrestricted funds available.

Looking forward to 2016 the challenge for the Church is to pay the requested Parish Share of £31,261 from our unrestricted annual receipts so as not to further diminish reserves, whilst still being able to meet our other obligations as well as to develop church growth, service & ministry. The PCC is working very hard to improve the current financial situation. Looking at reducing payments, maximising Gift Aid and the introduction of the Gift Aid small donations Scheme (GASDS) are examples, as is the introduction of an annual Stewardship campaign and Gift day.

Reserves Policy

It is PCC policy to try to maintain an unrestricted balance on funds which equates to 6 month's payments. This is equivalent to £27,000. This is held to smooth out fluctuations in cash flow and to meet emergencies. This reserves level is currently being met.

Transfers between Funds

The shortfall in *unrestricted receipts* over payments caused difficulty in paying our Parish Share which brought about a review of funds with the assistance of the deanery treasurer. Some money that was not restricted at donation but had been designated to the Fabric fund was identified along with transfers that could be made to cover previous fabric work payments. The PCC actioned appropriate transfers which increased the unrestricted funds available.

Following a question raised by a trustee as to whether Insurance payments should be made from St Mary's Fabric Fund from 2014, professional & legal advice was sought and, to cover the possibility that insufficient notice may have been given, the 2014 Insurance payments were transferred back to the Fabric Fund. Insurance payments from the start of 2015 onwards are to be taken from the Fabric Fund.

At their meeting on 23rd of Nov 2015 the PCC approved a net transfer from the restricted Fabric fund to the unrestricted General fund of £16,472

The Organ Fund shown within the Fabric Fund prior to 2015 is shown separately from Nov 2015.

Rectory Redecoration took place in the spring. Financial donations towards this were received from all the Parishes in the Benefice along with substantial volunteer assistance. Following the redecoration un-designation of the Designated Rectory Redecoration Fund was suggested which the PCC approved.

Lyme Bay Deanery Synod Report.

Matters concerning the Church of England and the views of Parishes in the Deanery are brought together here for transmission to the Diocesan Synod and to the parishes. The Deanery Synod representatives can also elect candidates to the Diocesan and General Synods.

Of particular note this year was the discussion on Parish Share which was reported to the PCC. The matter of church insurance and the monopolistic position of The Ecclesiastical Insurance Company raised in 2014 appear to have been settled in 2015 by the greater involvement in the market of competing companies.

School Report

School Organisation

At present we have 84 pupils on roll. Two thirds of our intake is now outside our catchment area and we rely on parental choice.

The children are split into four classes as follows:

Sails Class - 13 Reception and Year 1 pupils taught by Mrs Procter.

Boats Class - 21 Year 1 and 2 pupils taught by Miss Sanderson.

Class 3 - 23 Year 3 and 4 pupils taught by Mrs Wardle.

Class 4 - 27 Year 5 and 6 pupils taught by Miss Varndell.

Each class also has a teaching assistant who also deliver interventions, such as Speech and Language, Emotional Literacy Support and Maths and English. In addition we have 4 teaching assistants who work with children on a 1:1 or small group basis.

We have a full-time school secretary/finance officer who works in the office. Other staff include two midday supervisors, three kitchen assistants, one caretaker and two cleaners who job-share. Since the previous meeting there have been no changes to our staff.

Governing Body

Mr Julian Piper continues in the role of Chair of Governors this year with Mrs Pat Lewis-Badgett as Vice Chair.

School Development

This year the school has been working on the priorities in the School Development Plan, as highlighted in the Ofsted report following our inspection in June 2015. These are:

- To improve writing skills by extending opportunities to write at length in literacy.
- For pupils to consistently apply their knowledge of spelling, grammar and punctuation in written work.
- To improve teachers' feedback and marking to ensure pupils know how to improve their work and have time to act on the advice.
- For pupils to improve their handwriting and presentation of their work.

Curriculum

This year the second cycle of our two-yearly programme of Learning Quests has been introduced. The children have thoroughly enjoyed the work and focussing on the local area has brought the learning alive for them. This year the Learning Quests have been:

	Journeys. This Learning Quest was introduced with a whole school visit to Seaton Tramway.
	Houses and Homes. As part of this Learning Quest we welcomed Bruce Upton, from Bridport
Museu	m, to help the children research homes and families of Burton Bradstock in the past. To end the
Learnii	ng Ouest the whole school visited Montacute House.

Food and Farming. A visit to Washingpool Farm is part of the programme for this Learning Quest.

After School Clubs

The school offers a number of after school clubs through professional providers, school staff or volunteers. This year the range of clubs include Football, Tag-Rugby, Drama, Crochet, Netball, Choir, Keyboard and Recorder. The children have requested a Chess club so the school is looking for a volunteer to enable this to take place.

Friends of Burton Bradstock School

The Friends of the school continue to work tirelessly to fundraise for the school and to organise community events for the children and their families. In 2015/16 The Friends donated £4000 to the school to purchase a new handwriting scheme and new laptops for the children. This is in addition to subsidising transport for visits and trips to reduce the cost to parents.

Links with the Church

We continue to have strong links with the church and we have welcomed Reverend Canon Stephen into the school. Our Friday assemblies are led by the 'Open the Book' team and give the children the opportunity to hear the major Bible stories accompanied by relevant prayers and quiet reflection. We also hold our major celebrations in the Church - Harvest Festival, Christmas, Easter and our Leavers' Service.

Links with Parents and the Local Community

We have weekly Good Work Assemblies where the children lead and share their work and achievements. We have a Parent Forum that has been set up to enable parents and school to work together for the benefit of the children.

We hold regular events in the village and welcome support from the community. These include our Christmas Fair, The Annual Duck Race and this year for the first time a Bingo night. The children also take part in the Remembrance Sunday Poster competition run by the British Legion, the Village Flower and Produce Show and competitions run by the village Library.

Minerva Learning Trust

As a school we have close links with other schools within the Pyramid. In the last 18 months some of the schools within the Pyramid have come together with the intention to form a Multi-Academy Trust. It is hoped that by developing this Trust there will be greater collaboration between the schools for the benefit of all our pupils. The planned conversion date is 1st April 2016. At this time the school will become an Academy and be part of the Minerva Learning Trust, with The Sir John Colfox Academy, Bridport Primary School and St Mary's School.

Sacristan's Report

First I will give a brief reminder of the role of the Sacristan.

The Sacristan is responsible for the care of the communion linen, and the white altar cloths, together with the laundering of these along with the smaller cloths used on the credence tables.

Preparation for the services of Holy Communion; that is to say putting ready wine, wafers, and the water, the linen, and candles.

The sacristan also looks after the altar frontals, which are changed according to the liturgical seasons, along with the matching bible ribbons.

Report: A significant event this year has been having an Assistant Sacristan, and I am very grateful to Liz Orza for having taken on this role.

In the Sacristy the altar hangings, linen and Communion vessels remain in good order. Having said that, much of the linen is quite old and is not therefore easy-care fabric. We appreciate the extra care which has to be shown in handling this in order to maintain our high standard of presentation.

Though we have had the candlesticks modified this year the candles continue to present problems which we are still endeavouring to overcome, and again thanks must go to all those who persevere with them week by week.

Fabric Report

Our church insurers Ecclesiastical Insurance paid us a useful visit this year, which spurred us on to check all our property affairs and documents. The advice from our insurers helped us to formulate some new policies and we now have:

- Health and Safety Policy
- Fire Risk Assessments for Chilcombe Church
- Fire Risk Assessments for Burton Church and its tower and vestry
- Evacuation Policy for Burton Church.
- Gas and Electric tests are up to date and we have carried out required electrical remedial work at Burton.

From the Quinquennial Reports, we learnt of outstanding building works required at Chilcombe church for which we obtained competitive prices and this work will take place during 2016. In addition, the support framework to the Chilcombe bell has recently collapsed and this may be dealt with as part of the Chilcombe repairs.

There were no major building issues for St. Mary's church, Burton so any jobs required will be dealt with as additions to any other work, which may take place.

There was mention in the Quinquennial reports of woodworm and beetle infestation at Burton and in two chairs at Chilcombe. Quotations have been sought from organisations, which deal with such infestations and those returned are being considered.

The churchwardens, together with the new Rector, the Vice-chair of the PCC and other willing helpers carried out a full inspection of the church, the rectory and the burial ground this year. This revealed several pressing matters to be addressed as a matter of urgency. These included:

- Defective ironmongery to the main gate
- Work to be carried out on the main door, to reduce noise when being opened during services
- The communion rail
- The wall to the rear of the churchyard, which required safety work

These works have now been completed and are a great improvement to our church.

An unfortunate incident resulted in the small gatepost and wall being knocked down, by a lorry driver. Fortunately, an observant neighbour was able to identify the company for whom the driver worked and all repairs have been carried out, at no expense to the church.

In 2016 (and therefore not represented in the accounts which refer to 2015 only) our clock face has been restored, thanks to an anonymous and generous donation and separate legacy. It is now restored to its normal position.

The stonework of the windows in the Burton south transept is suffering from water penetration and remains a problem to be considered in the near future.

The PCC is also responsible for the Rectory garden walls and the Shipton Lane burial ground.

Prior to Easter 2016, St. Mary's was subject to a thorough clean. All surfaces were cleaned, using scaffolding in some areas, and all the storage spaces cleared and rationalised. We offer a very great thank you to all those who assisted in this exercise and to all who look after the fabric and the furniture of our two beautiful churches throughout the year.

Bells

As it seems to be customary with these annual reports, I can report that St. Mary's bells are in good order. This year our bells have also been inspected by both our insurers and the local professional Bellhanger. Both gave our bells a clean bill of health, although the Bellhanger did point out some adjustment will be needed to the clapper on one of the bells sometime in the future. Also, due to normal wear and tear, we have had to replace the rope on the tenor bell (which is the heaviest at 10 ½ cwt).

As is usual, I would like, on behalf of us all, to thank the team (Jane and Roger in particular) for the way the Belfry and Ringing Chamber are kept so clean and tidy – a fact that is often commented upon by visiting ringers. However, the cleaning doesn't stop there. The team regularly clean the tower steps from top to bottom (some 98 steps). So special thanks are due to them for that. Lastly but by no means least, we all walk by our Church and look up at the clock – but who winds it? – the bell ringers do, twice a week.

Finally, over the last year or so, due to health/physical problems, four of our team have been forced to give up ringing although they are still included in our team for our social activities. Despite this, we are still able to meet all the calls for the Bells to be rung which is solely due to the willingness and dedication of those ringers still active in the Band. We are always willing to teach anyone who would like to take part in what is a most rewarding and sociable exercise. If you are interested, contact myself or any of the ringers known personally to you. You can of course just turn up any Thursday evening at 7.00 pm.

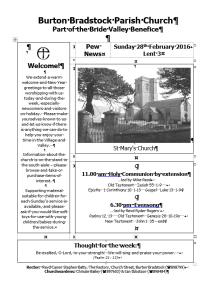
