Gospel reading John 10 verses 1-10

The Good Shepherd and His Sheep

10 "Very truly I tell you Pharisees, anyone who does not enter the sheep pen by the gate, but climbs in by some other way, is a thief and a robber. ² The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³ The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep listen to his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴ When he has brought out all his own, he goes on ahead of them, and his sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵ But they will never follow a stranger; in fact, they will run away from him because they do not recognize a stranger's voice." ⁶ Jesus used this figure of speech, but the Pharisees did not understand what he was telling them.

⁷Therefore Jesus said again, "Very truly I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. ⁸ All who have come before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep have not listened to them. ⁹ I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved. ^[a] They will come in and go out, and find pasture. ¹⁰ The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.

This is the gospel of the Lord. Praise to you O Christ.

Reflection by the Reverend Jane Williams

"Living life to the full!" adapted from John 10.10

I'm almost certain that some of you will have looked at that title and will be thinking to yourself – you must be mad, Jane, how can we live life to the full, when we have all these restrictions placed on us, when we are living in fear of an awful virus that's affecting the whole world. We can't even go and worship God in our own church, in our own familiar way?

Well, believe it or not, at the beginning of lockdown, when it was all so uncertain and felt so limiting I felt exactly the same way, but not anymore.

Certain things have changed my mind.

There are lots of reasons why my thinking has changed and many of you reading and listening to this have brought some of the answers to me.

We are now on Day 42 of lockdown and what I have been seeing and hearing about from across the Bride Valley has been nothing short of amazing.

Each of the villages has a community within it who are looking out for each other. Neighbours, some who haven't spoken together for ages, carrying out errands, fetching and carrying, checking in and generally looking out for the most vulnerable and in fact everyone in their neighbourhood. There is evidence of care and compassion like most of us have not witnessed in our lifetime. And even for those who have, it was a very long time ago. This is what it was like during the war Jane, is what I'm hearing.

During telephone conversations or when passing people by in my car on an essential journey or walking during my daily exercise. Even on Thursdays when I'm clapping for the NHS and all keyworkers with my neighbours, I hear all sorts of hopeful stories, of answered prayers and I'm beginning to get to know this community better, in a deeper and more meaningful way than would have been possible before.

A question I'm often being asked is "Where is God in all of this?"

I'm a firm believer that God is everywhere and now more than ever I feel that He is right here with us, in amidst of all the fear and uncertainty, looking out for each and every one of us.

Just like that Good Shepherd of the sheep we have read about in John's gospel, all we need to do is listen out for him. He knows each one of us by name and will 'lead us out'.

Jesus gave us a picture of that group of sheep feeling safe in their sheepfold. Waiting for the voice of their shepherd, their master to lead them. I think God's voice is saying to each of us — "Be still for the presence of the Lord, the Holy one is here".

Where is God? He is here with us, we can see him in the faces of our helpful neighbours, in the way that all those keyworkers feel compelled to support us all by stepping out into the unknown danger to fulfil whatever role they have to keep the country going. We can see it in the face of the Mums and Dads who carry on reassuring their children even though they are fearful themselves. We can see it in the teaching and support staff at our schools. Some of us are privileged to see it in the faces of prison officers when dealing with the prisoners in their care or the funeral directors doing all they can to support a grieving family and in carers trying their very best to protect the cared for. Despite the difficulties of life at the moment, what I'm seeing is people living life in a very meaningful way, appreciating the surrounding beauty more than ever before, connecting with others at a deeper human level. Surely this has to be life in all its fullness! Amen.
