#### A Reflection by the Reverend Jane Williams

Picking up on Sue's theme of waiting from last week: 'What are you waiting for?' A very good question. What would my answer be?

It's Pentecost Sunday so surely I am hoping for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit to empower people to preach and proclaim the Gospel as happened on the first day of Pentecost. But, what is the point of waiting for something that has already happened? The Holy Spirit has already been poured out and you have received power now that the Holy Spirit has come upon you to be God's witnesses.

Now don't get me wrong, waiting for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit is not like waiting for a train, and if it has already come and gone there is no point in waiting for it. Of course, we are encouraged to wait on God again and again and to spend time in his presence seeking him before we go in His name to do whatever. But there comes a point for us just like the disciples where we have waited for long enough I know that I have said this before, but I won't ever stop saying it – Jesus said GO! (into the world and preach...) but before he said 'Go' he said 'Come'. Come to me all you who are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Come to me you who are thirsty, and I will give you rivers of living water, come to me you who are lonely and be welcomed into my family, come and receive life in all its fullness. And it is so important that we come to Jesus before we go in his name, because otherwise we won't be being transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit within us and we won't have anything to authentically witness to.

In this time of lockdown we have an amazing opportunity to spend time waiting in God's presence without the usual distractions. I know that there are new distractions, and new challenges, but what if we really used the remainder of this period however long it might last, to set aside time to just waiting in God's presence however you find that best to do. To ask him if he has any questions to ask us as individuals. To present to him any brokenness and pain that we carry, to feed and build ourselves up in his Word by reading the Bible, and to spend time in worship – which for some of you will be listening to hymns, for some to new and nearly new songs of worship, and to some it will be medieval chants, and for some all of those things! Whatever it is that makes your spirit soar in worship to God, just do it.

When this time of lockdown or waiting is over, we will need to be ready to Go. To make such a racket like the disciples and to be so noticeable because of our joy and love that others will be changed as a result. We will be different. Society will be different. The way we 'do' church will be different. But the need of humankind is just the same as it was that first Pentecost, to hear the Good news of freedom and restoration, to be the people that God made them to be.

We will be people in love in two senses; firstly that we are in Christ, who is love (2 Cor 5:17; 1 John 4:16), and secondly that we are people who have the freedom of knowing that we are loved for who we are, and that we love God, so we behave like people who are in love. Yes, sometimes that does mean floating on air – or being so happy that you are accused of being drunk. Anyone who has been in love for a long time will tell you that there are moments of euphoria, especially at the beginning, and then there are times when love is a choice, and you stick at it, because you just know that it's the truth. Love brings us to life, and the glory of God is a human being fully alive (Irenaeus). And people will notice, and want to know why.

'Love is as strong as death, it burns like blazing fire, like a mighty flame. Many waters can't quench love, rivers cannot wash it away' as the writer of Song of Songs put it. We usually only use the word 'incandescent' in the context of rage, because the word means emitting light as a result of being heated, or full of strong emotion; imagine if we were all incandescent with love. People couldn't help but notice.

What are you waiting for?

Pray with me: Lord send revival and start with me, fill me afresh with your Holy Spirit of Love, draw me into your presence, so that I can know your transformation and hope. Amen

God of Spirit and creativity, bless the creative pursuits of your people – the artists and musicians, the poets and writers, the dramatists, sculptors and graphic designers, the potters and film-makers and all the creative industries. Bless us too as we create albeit on a lesser scale, tend our gardens, take our photographs, cook our signature dishes. May the Spirit find us willing co-workers in the creation of all things authentic and beautiful.

Come, Holy Spirit and renew us in your service.

God of Spirit and community, this is the day the church was born. We know the church is still in draft form; you want much more for us. May your Spirit mould us into the likeness of Jesus so that we live the way he lived and love the way he loved. And all in the fellowship of his body, the Church. Come, Holy Spirit and renew us in your service.

God of Spirit and joy, melt the frost around our hearts and fill us with the warmth of Pentecost. Search us with your Spirit until faith is burned into our lives and we dare to live differently. Save us from conventional faith and send us out to live and work, led by the Spirit, to your praise and glory. **Amen.**
