Old Testament Reading: Genesis 45 verses 1-15

Then Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, 'Send everyone away from me.' So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of Pharaoh heard it. Joseph said to his brothers, 'I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?' But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

Then Joseph said to his brothers, 'Come closer to me.' And they came closer. He said, 'I am your brother Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. And now do not be distressed, or angry with yourselves, because you sold me here; for God sent me before you to preserve life. For the famine has been in the land these two years; and there are five more years in which there will be neither ploughing nor harvest. God sent me before you a remnant on earth, and to keep alive for you many survivors. So it was not you who sent me here, but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt. Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, "Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me, do not delay. You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. I will provide for you there—since there are five more years of

famine to come—so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty." And now your eyes and the eyes of my brother Benjamin see that it is my own mouth that speaks to you. You must tell my father how greatly I am honoured in Egypt, and all that you have seen. Hurry and bring my father down here.' Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin's neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 15 verses 10-28

Then he called the crowd to him and said to them, "Listen and understand: it is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but it is what comes out of the mouth that defiles." Then the disciples approached and said to him, "Do you know that the Pharisees took offense when they heard what you said?" He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." But Peter said to him, "Explain this parable to us." Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands does not defile."

Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.

Reflection

Here in the book of Genesis we have Joseph, at the height of his career in Egypt, sending everyone away so that he can be alone with his brothers and have a private word. He can stand it no longer, the tension of them not knowing who he actually is. In view of what they once put him through, the way they disposed of him because of their jealousy, you would totally understand it if he was incandescent with rage. While his experience in Egypt brings good to him in the power and prestige it gives him, it is at least debatable whether that makes it worthwhile to have been thrown into the cistern, sold into servitude in a foreign country and put into jail.

But no, Joseph is in a position to see the bigger picture, as if he is surveying the scene from above, like an eagle or an albatross, and he recognises God's hand in how his life has turned out. The good that God brings out of these experiences is not only the good it brings to Joseph personally (let's say, the maturing of his character), but the good it brings to his family. The point is that this is the family through which God is going to bring blessing to the world. It's important to keep this family alive rather than let the famine starve them to death, because they are called to God's purpose in a special sense.

Looking back, as twenty first century readers we owe our salvation to the fact that God kept this family alive, so that Jesus could be born from it. For Joseph this means God doing such an extraordinary thing through his suffering that it compensates for what he went through, it's a pattern repeated in Jesus' story.

God knows all about our human weakness, and wrongdoings, and Joseph's dream about lording it over his brothers which in turn makes the brothers give in to the temptation to 'get him' for it. But God's intentions prevail which makes it possible for Joseph to live with the way his brothers treated him in the same way that make it possible for Christians to accept the role that Judas, Pilate, the Jewish leaders and the Roman soldiers played in Jesus' death.

Likewise, whatever is going on in your life today, maybe as a result of suffering in the past or even right now, we can be certain that God knows all about it. Not only that, God will be using our experiences to bring about his purpose for our life today, here and now.

That's the good news of the gospel. Today, as the story of the Canaanite mother shows us, because of the difficulties with her disabled daughter she has the confidence to approach Jesus. Her perseverance, trust and hope are fuelled by what her family are going through. The disciples may be looking down on her and even Jesus seems to be turning her away ... but she is nothing but persistent and ultimately Jesus is stunned by her faith and the end result, her daughter is instantly healed.

We may be looking back on our lives with a realisation that God's plan has prevailed, or we may be wondering how on earth God will use what we're going through now for his purpose, to bring about his kingdom here on earth, our hopes and dreams fulfilled. We must be confident in God, have faith in his plans: **"For we know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose"** Romans 8 v 28

From the Electric Bible: "Joseph, Egypt's master and dispenser of her wealth, was raised to this high office, to save the nation's health. His brothers stood around him, and begged for precious grain; then Joseph knew his private dreams were part of a greater aim. *Joseph, the dreamer, God was calling you. He had plans you did not know until your dreams came true.*"

Let us affirm our faith in God in the words of the Apostle's Creed:

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit And born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, Was crucified, died and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again, He ascended into heaven, And is seated at the right hand of God the Father. He will come again to judge both the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, The holy catholic church, The communion of saints, The forgiveness of sins, The resurrection of the body And the life everlasting. Amen. Lord of the Church, thank you for our church – the place, the people, the history and what it's meant to generations of people living near. Thank you for the people that have flowed in and out through the doors, faithful or searching, joyful or sad, hopeful or anxious. Thank you for the role the church has played in the lives of so many and the way the love of God has been made known in worship and service of others.
