The Wedding at Cana John 2 verse 1-11

2 On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ² Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³ When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." ⁴ And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." ⁵ His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." ⁶ Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. ⁸ He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. ⁹ When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom ¹⁰ and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." ¹¹ Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Reflection by the Reverend Jane Williams

An invitation: we are invited to the wedding supper!

This time last year we were preparing for our wedding festival weekend. It was hard work, a lot of effort was put in, some were sceptical about it and yet in the end most of us were completely overwhelmed, thrilled at how it turned out. Both of our schools got involved and we acted out the Wedding of Cana, focussing on Jesus' first miracle when he did something completely amazing, much bigger than anyone at the wedding could have even imagined. Even his mother, Mary, had no idea what he would do, how he would solve the problem, but she had complete trust that he would, you hear it in the way she told the servants "Do whatever he tells you".

During the wedding festival last year, we were privileged to spend time with the couples planning their weddings during 2020. It was exciting at the time, but of course we now know that the reality for most of them was that they had to postpone the celebration, despite all their hard work in preparing. In fact, only one of those couples did get married in the end and that was on a much smaller scale than planned. Their guest list went down to 30 and then eventually it was paired down again to only 15! But do you know what, ultimately it turned out to be such a great celebration for them. Despite all the disappointments of the year, the way that their big day wasn't anything like they'd planned, they didn't even have their original bridesmaids, yet (and I'm sure those who witnessed it would agree) – it ended up being incredibly special, very intimate, clearly the most important people were there and I have to say, though it rained, not just rained, but at the time of the bride arriving at church it was absolutely bucketing down; it felt like a truly blessed occasion, an incredible moment for them as a couple and indeed for the whole family.

This year has left me wondering; when life is paired back to just the essentials, keeping it simple, only the most important things, it reveals something beyond us. Sometimes it feels as though God is actually blessing us in all the simplicity. John, in the book of Revelation speaks of a great multitude crying out "Hallelujah" - praising God, getting ready to embrace just as a bride meets her groom, as the church greets her beloved Jesus. I could get carried away in this call to praise ... It reminds me of that worship song: "Lord I come, longing to know you, longing to see your face, for you've called me to come into the holiest of place"

Jesus is a guest at the wedding at Cana and he brings a dimension of happiness that would otherwise be lacking, only Mary and the disciples and stewards see what has happened, how it came about. John says it reveals His glory, gives them an insight into what kind of God they are serving – for me the story is full of promise and hope of a future full of expectation. Imagine being the guest at a wedding where Jesus is not just the guest, he is the bridegroom, in Revelation we are invited to the wedding of the Lamb! Imagine the party, we are invited to celebrate with him, to revel in His glory. Indeed, we were created to wildly rejoice in His presence, born to praise Him. Hallelujah! We are truly guests at His table. Amen.
