Readings:

Genesis 17.1-7,15,16

17When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram, and said to him, 'I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. ²And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous.' ³Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, ⁴'As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁵No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁶I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. ⁷I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you.

15 God said to Abraham, 'As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her.'

Romans 4.13-end

13 For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

16 For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' ²³Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him', were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

Confession and Forgiveness

The first commandment is this:

Prayers

In Lent we ask again what you require of us, and we get the same answer – 'to do justice, to love kindness and to walk humbly with our God'. May that call ring true in the life of our church. Keep us turned outwards in service of others and inwards in love of you. We pray particularly for those making decisions about when and how to resume services in church buildings.

Lenten Lord, hear our prayer.

It's been said that Lent is Easter in disguise, but remind us, Lord, that Easter doesn't come cheaply, that Lent can't be trivialised. Ask us the hard questions of lent – how are we living before you? How does it go with your soul? If we have to give things up, enable us. If we have to take more things on, show us. If we have to relish life more fully, give us opportunity.

Lenten Lord, hear our prayer.

Lent reminds us of our own poverty, if we measure wealth in terms of spiritual well-being, emotional maturity and moral confidence. But we pray also for those who know the sharp poverties of money, livelihood, opportunity and health. We pray especially for those who are ill and uncertain about the future, for those facing medical treatment this week, and for those whose lives have been reduced to a bed or a chair. We bring particular people to you now ...

Lenten Lord, hear our prayer.

Help us Lord, to be attentive this Lent, to listen to our hearts, to the preoccupation of others, and to your quiet voice speaking through everything. We are so easily distracted, so keep us n the case, being attentive, listening to the truth, loving. Here, Lord, is a token of our attentiveness – a minute of silent prayer, bringing our lives before you, asking for grace ... (silence for a full minute).

Lenten Lord, hear our prayer.

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.

Collect

Almighty God, by the prayer and discipline of Lent may we enter into the mystery of Christ's sufferings, and by following in his Way come to share in his glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

He did not cling to equality with god,

That at the name of Jesus
Every knee should bow,
And every voice proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord,
