#### Bible Reading: Ephesians 3. 14-end

For this reason, I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, for ever and ever. Amen.

## Gospel Reading: John 6.1-21

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

## Reflection

Hunger ...

Like most of you, I suspect, I have listened to and read this gospel story over and over again throughout the years, but reading through it afresh this week I have gained a new sense of the hunger these people were experiencing.

I don't mean the obvious, that they needed the physical nourishment which was so miraculously provided. Loaves of bread and fish aplenty!

What I see is these people, who have been following Jesus around, observing everything he does. They have been watching him at work in their midst, seeing the signs. **This man is something else!** These crowds are obsessed with Jesus, looking at the signs, the healings and the miracles. This man **must** be the chosen one, the Messiah, here right in front of their eyes.

No wonder they are persistent in following him. Who wouldn't want to be in his presence, watching out for the next miracle. And their persistence pays off ... as they witness yet another miracle, another sign of the power of God at work, this time Jesus breaks the bread and provides nourishment to the multitude surrounding him.

## Jesus, in the breaking of the bread, satisfies their hunger ...

They had a choice and they chose to stay and be blessed.

You may have had second thoughts about coming to church today, you may have felt disappointed at the way things are going to be, but despite all that's going on in the world, round and about us ... **you are here,** something brought you to this place, to receive from God, to be nourished by the power of the Holy Spirit, and to receive from our Lord Jesus Christ.

And learning to respond to our Creator God is what the passage in Ephesians is all about. Listen again to verse 17: "that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love."

The world is big, with all the intricacies and complications that go with it. We are often overwhelmed by it all, certainly by what's been going on for the past 18 months. God is bigger, much bigger, beyond our understanding, far more than we can imagine. If we look around, not very far, we see him at work ... we see the signs of creation, everything around us speaks of being made, being created by our heavenly Father. If we stop and listen long enough we hear the buzzing of the bees and the rustling of the leaves on the trees. Even before we're awake we hear the song of the birds.

Think on this, that same creator made you, an individual, with a will of your own, God's unimaginable love lavished on you.

# God's abundant love, enough for all the world.

We recognise it, we see God at work, we are not here to control it, that's not our role.

We have a choice though, ignore what God is doing ... or join in. Co-operate. As we gradually learn to breathe in the air of Holy Spirit, we instinctively learn what the wind and the waves already knew – we are made to respond to God. **Amen.**
