First Reading

Jeremiah 11: 18 - 20

It was the LORD who made it known to me, and I knew; then you showed me their evil deeds. But I was like a gentle lamb led to the slaughter. And I did not know it was against me that they devised schemes, saying, "Let us destroy the tree with its fruit, let us cut him off from the land of the living, so that his name will no longer be remembered!" But you, O LORD of hosts, who judge righteously, who try the heart and the mind, let me see your retribution upon them, for to you I have committed my cause.

Mark 9: 30 - 37

They went on from there and passed through Galilee. Jesus did not want anyone to know it; for he was teaching his disciples, saying to them, "The Son of Man is to be betrayed into human hands, and they will kill him, and three days after being killed, he will rise again." But they did not understand what he was saying and were afraid to ask him. Then they came to Capernaum; and when he was in the house he asked them, "What were you arguing about on the way?" But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me."

Reflection

'Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all.'

Jesus asked his disciples, 'What were you arguing about on the way?' But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest.

I wonder how many similar scenarios are being acted out each morning. Children squabbling over who can sit in the 'best' seat in the car going to school, but falling silent and glaring at one another when mum asks them what all the row is about. Newly promoted Cabinet ministers jockeying for position, and trying to trump what their neighbour at the Cabinet table has just said, but not voicing the desire they feel to 'come out on top' – I am sure that never happens!

Isn't it interesting that the disciples fall silent when Jesus asks them directly about the reason for their arguing. None of them wants to own up because they know this isn't what Jesus is about. He has been teaching them, more than once now as they travel together, that he will be betrayed and killed and after three days rise again. But they just don't understand – perhaps they can only hear about the betrayal and the death – and are afraid to ask him what he means. They want to be part of something successful and they want to know that they will have the top jobs in the success story. 'I'm the king of the castle, get down you dirty rascal!'

I find it really interesting too how Jesus reacts to his arguing followers: he waits until they return to their base in Capernaum before he gets involved in the situation. He doesn't wade into the argument when the disciples are all steamed up and desperate to outdo each other. Instead he addresses the issue a bit later, when they have cooled down and there is therefore more chance that they will be able to hear what he is saying, and learn more from the experience. For Jesus realises that the argument has taught him something too – his disciples need more help from him to understand what he is really all about.

And so, in the calm of the indoors, away from the heat of the road, Jesus asks them a question. Jesus asks hundreds of questions in the gospels (and answers very few himself!) Asking good questions is a great way to enable learning. As we have seen, this question goes to the very heart of the issue – and silence is the telling response. Into that silence, Jesus speaks and acts to show that the values of the kingdom of God are the reverse of what they might be expecting. Did you want to be the greatest? Do you want to be on top of the pile? Do you think you are someone important? Watch out, because you could find yourself at the bottom! 'Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all'. Such very difficult words for the disciples to hear and perhaps for us too – who wants to be last? Who wants to be a servant of others? Not them! Not us? But that really is the way to greatness in God's kingdom. And Jesus offers them another way of looking at things. He brings a child into their midst and takes it in his arms - a moving picture of tenderness. I wonder what we can learn from a child. A child knows that she isn't fully grown and that she has lots to learn. A child has little in the way of defences – he can be easily be overpowered and carried away by someone bigger and stronger. A child will pick up very quickly whether the big people in her life accept and love her as she is and the messages she receives then will stay with her and can shape her ongoing life for good or ill. How we treat children and others who are vulnerable in our families, our communities and our society as a whole is so important. The pandemic has brought this to the fore over the last 18 months. Many of us will know people living in care homes. For many residents, relatives and staff it has been a desperate time and the shortages of PPE and other equipment has been stark. There has been concern too expressed by those with learning disabilities that even though many of them are more vulnerable to Covid, yet they have received less care – in some cases in hospital, their lives have been deemed less valuable than those of the able. It is as if the pandemic has shone a light into parts of our society that are more often in the shade and easily overlooked. The image of Jesus with the child in his arms suggests to me that the spotlight should not be turned off when the pandemic subsides and at last we are in a position to live with Covid as we do flu.

Many people of all faiths and none would share a humanitarian concern that the most vulnerable in our society are cared for with dignity and compassion. For those who seek to follow Christ day by day, the words that Jesus says whilst holding the child give an even greater significance to our treatment of others. For what he says is this,

'Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.' By welcoming a child in Jesus' name, by welcoming someone who is vulnerable, not 'on top of the pile', we are welcoming God. Perhaps we can get a greater sense of what Jesus is saying by playing a little. Could we imagine that he said, 'Whoever welcomes one such member of royalty in my name welcomes me'? Think of all the care and the energy expended when a royal is expected in town. I wonder what sort of welcome Jesus has in mind for children.
