Welcome to this service for the Bride Valley churches. Today is the third Sunday of Advent. We begin our act of worship with a prayer of awareness:

Light within all light, Soul within all souls, at the breaking of dawn, at the coming of day, in this season of Advent, we wait and watch.

Your Light within the morning light, your Soul within the human soul, Your presence beckoning to us from the heart of life.

The Collect

God for whom we watch and wait, you sent John the Baptist to prepare the way of your Son: give us courage to speak the truth, to hunger for justice, and to suffer for the cause of right, with Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The desert and the parched land will be glad; the wilderness will rejoice and blossom. Like the crocus, it will burst into bloom; it will rejoice greatly and shout for joy. The glory of Lebanon will be given to it, the splendour of Carmel and Sharon; they will see the glory of the LORD, the splendour of our God. Strengthen the feeble hands, steady the knees that give way; say to those with fearful hearts, "Be strong, do not fear; your God will come, he will come with vengeance; with divine retribution he will come to save you."

Then will the eyes of the blind be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped. Then will the lame leap like a deer, and the mute tongue shout for joy. Water will gush forth in the wilderness and streams in the desert. The burning sand will become a pool, the thirsty ground bubbling springs. In the haunts where jackals once lay, grass and reeds and papyrus will grow. And a highway will be there; it will be called the Way of Holiness; it will be for those who walk on that Way. The unclean will not journey on it; wicked fools will not go about on it. No lion will be there, nor any ravenous beast; they will not be found there. But only the redeemed will walk there, and those the LORD has rescued will return. They will enter Zion with singing; everlasting joy will crown their heads. Gladness and joy will overtake them, and sorrow and sighing will flee away.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 11: 2-11

When John, who was in prison, heard about the deeds of the Messiah, he sent his disciples to ask him, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we expect someone else?"

Jesus replied, "Go back and report to John what you hear and see: The blind receive sight, the lame walk, those who have leprosy are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the good news is proclaimed to the poor. Blessed is anyone who does not stumble on account of me."

As John's disciples were leaving, Jesus began to speak to the crowd about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swayed by the wind? If not, what did you go out to see? A man dressed in fine clothes? No, those who wear fine clothes are in kings' palaces. Then what did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written: "'I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you."

Truly I tell you, among those born of women there has not risen anyone greater than John the Baptist; yet whoever is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.

Reflection

'Strengthen the feeble hands, steady the knees that give way; say to those with fearful hearts, "Be strong, do not fear; your God will come"'

What stirring, encouraging words from the prophet Isaiah. They were proclaimed originally to the Israelites who were in exile in Babylon, those who had witnessed the downfall of their king and kingdom and the destruction of the temple in Jerusalem. They had been forcibly uprooted from their homes in the land promised to them and their whole identity as God's chosen people had a question mark over it in their minds – if God was God, how had all this happened? How was it that they were divided from their land by hundreds of miles of desert? How could they worship God in a strange land? Isaiah is trying to help them see that the old ways of being may have disappeared, but God is going to do a new thing. He offers them the wonderful poetic picture of the wilderness bursting into bloom – the parched land blossoming into life. What looks dead and barren will be full of life. Things may not be as they once were, as they once were used to, but see with new eyes what God is doing. There is hope, there is a future.

We might think that these words would also have helped John the Baptist himself, as he languishes in prison and questions who Jesus really is. This is a very different John from the one we encountered last week on the banks of the Jordan, fearlessly preaching and baptizing those who came out to him as preparation for the coming of the Messiah. Now in captivity, John had heard about Jesus' ministry in

Galilee and he sent some of his followers to ask him directly, 'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?' Was John wondering, did I get it right at the river Jordan? — is this man really the one we have been promised by God? John's own message had been one of strong condemnation of the people's sins — perhaps he thought there should have been a lot more condemnation and judgement in Jesus' ministry. Perhaps Jesus' ministry was not what John had been anticipating. Jesus' reply is very interesting — he doesn't answer yes or no, but he says basically, let my actions and words speak for themselves 'The blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them.' In other words, he is showing John that his main task as Messiah is 'the restoration of the needy and the giving of life to the lifeless.' John needed new eyes, a renewed vision, to see what God was doing through Jesus' ministry. Not so much condemnation, but the bringing of new life. There is hope, there is a future.

And what about us? What about our hands and knees and hearts – are they fearful? Perhaps this is a reassuring message for us too in these tumultuous times we are living through. Perhaps we too need fresh eyes to see where God is at work today, this Advent. Perhaps we can be encouraged to stop and pay attention, to open our eyes to see where Christ is at work – to see where new life is being given. I wonder in what ways Christ might be standing among us, in our communities, as one we do not know, or perhaps we see, but do not recognise. I wonder, do we look for Christ in certain places and not in others? Do we expect his influence to be at work at some times of the day and not at others? Are there people through whom Christ might be working for good, bringing new life in the world whom we ignore? Might we be missing him and some of the ways he is working within us, within our communities, within our world?

A prayer to close:

Loving God of hope and of the future, in this waiting time of Advent, please strengthen the feeble hands, steady the knees that give way and say to those with fearful hearts, "Be strong, do not fear; your God will come".

Help us to see with fresh eyes where Christ is at work in the world, in our communities, in our lives. Open our eyes to your presence, open our ears to your call in this waiting time of Advent. **Amen.**
